

GUILTY OF MORE CRIME

Bandit Neidermeier Confesses to Robbing Passenger Train

ON BALTIMORE AND OHIO

Was Leader of Gang and Hid in Same Old Dug-Out

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—Peter Neidermeier confessed tonight he had been guilty of robbing trains in addition to his other crimes. He admitted he was the leader of the gang that held up and robbed the Baltimore & Ohio passenger train near Miller, Ind., about two years ago. The robbery was committed near the spot where the three men were discovered yesterday by the police and Neidermeier said tonight the dug-out in which he and his companions were found yesterday was the exact spot where he and his partners in the train robbery had hid before holding up the train.

Chicago, Nov. 28.—Indictments were voted by the grand jury today against Harvey Van Dine, Peter Neidermeier and Emil Roeski, the three young bandits who were arrested yesterday. An indictment was also voted against Gustav Marx, who murdered Officer Quinn and was with the others in the majority of their crimes.

Cognizance cannot be taken in Illinois of the murder of Brakenham Sovea in Indiana, Friday, nor of the shooting of Detective Develock and Zimmer in Indiana. The intention of State Attorney Dineen is to bring the men to trial as quickly as possible. It may take two trials, as all four of the men worked together, but it happened that when the greater crimes were committed that one of the number was absent.

Roeski was not at the robbery of the car barn and had no part in the murders committed at that time. Marx was alone when he killed Officer Quinn and was in jail yesterday when the murders were committed in Indiana. Either one of these two, therefore, will probably have a separate trial, unless the general plea of guilty is made by all four men.

COSTS \$22 A MINUTE

THEATER OWNERS PAY NEARLY \$2,000 TO INDUCE PATTI TO APPEAR

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—A theatrical firm of this city has probably paid as high a price to hear a concert as was ever paid in this country. It cost them between \$20 and \$25 a minute to hear Mme. Patti sing. Mme. Patti when she made her contract for her present American tour fixed on \$5,000 a concert as her remuneration, and previous to each concert the money was to be advanced to her or her legal representative in due form in the box office before she went on the stage.

Yesterday Mme. Patti sat in her apartments and received a message from her lawyer that the advance sale of seats had only brought in \$2,180, so she refused to go to the theater. The local manager of the theater pleaded with Mme. Patti to sing. He told her it meant the disappointment of a great many people and an injury to the reputation of his house. But she would not unbend.

RACE ACROSS ATLANTIC

STEAMERS WILL STRIVE TO DELIVER MAIL FIRST AT LONDON

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Although the officials of both the American and Cunard Steamship Companies make denial, it is the belief in shipping circles that the steamship St. Paul and Lucia will start on a race with the mails across England today. Since the American line two weeks ago changed its sailing day from Wednesday to Saturday, the vessels of the two lines have succeeded in getting the mails to London at about the same time.

The St. Paul will have an hour's start of her rival, but this advantage is overcome because of the shorter route traveled by the Cunarder to Liverpool. The St. Paul has to make Southampton before delivering the mail.

Much interest is manifested in the race in London. The Cunard line has issued a circular, warning its captains against crowding on steam above the usual rate of speed. The American line carries most of the mail of the United States. It receives a subsidy from the Government. The Cunard is paid by the sack.

TO BE BURIED AT PLAINS

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 28.—The remains of Charles Kuykendall, whose body was found floating in Clarkford

river Tuesday and the manner of whose death is still a mystery, will be buried at Plains, the original place of interment, the body at Eugene, Or., having been abandoned. Dr. J. B. Kuykendall arrived from Pomeroy last night and is investigating the death of his brother to ascertain whether any evidence of foul play exists. He is loath to believe his brother was drowned while in the act of setting water to extinguish the fire in the ranch buildings, which were found burnt to the ground. The dead man belongs to a prominent Oregon family. Dr. William Kuykendall, of Eugene, Or., Oregon State Senator, is a brother of deceased. Another brother, Edward, is County Clerk in one of Southern Oregon's counties.

CHINESE WOMAN ABSCONDS. BILLINGS, Mont., Nov. 28.—Chinese proprietors of the Eugene restaurant of this city have appealed to the police to assist them in a search for a Chinese woman whom one of the restaurant men brought to Billings to make his wife. In some manner the female Celestial learned the place where the wealth of the establishment was concealed and several days ago the woman disappeared with \$400. The Chinese declare it the work of highlanders.

IS GROWING VERY SERIOUS

Colombia Growing Very Active in a Warlike Way

PASSPORTS ARE REFUSED

To Vessels Leaving Colombia Ports To Lemon or Costa Rica

RIVER BOATS ON MAGDALENA ARE ARMED AND CONVERTED INTO WARSHIPS—URIBE-URIBE AND HERRERA OFFER THEIR SERVICES TO GOVERNMENT.

COLON, Nov. 28.—The Panama Star and Herald says: "We learn from a reliable source that even passports to Port Limon, Costa Rica from the Colombian ports on the Atlantic are now not allowed to be issued to the Colombians. River boats lying on agalena have been armed and converted into warships. Liberal Generals Uribe-Uribe and Benjamin Herrera, have offered the government their services for the taking of the isthmus. Conservatives, however, oppose the acceptance of these offers fearing such action would result in the overthrow of the government."

The Exchange at Barranquilla is quoted at 15,000 and at Bogota 20,000. Today was anniversary of the declaration of independence of the isthmus, but there was no sign of the customary celebration.

Looking For a Graft. Paris, Nov. 28.—The Republic of Colombia is endeavoring to induce France to renew the work upon the construction of the Panama Canal. The Colombian financial agent Samper, who is chief delegate to the administrative council, is now in Panama. The French Canal Company has published a statement in which it declares the offer of the United States is ridiculous and places high value upon the company's property and concessions.

Net in Right Humor. Panama, Nov. 28.—Today was the anniversary of the declaration of independence of Colombia from Spanish rule. The day was formerly enthusiastically celebrated but the only indication that today was the anniversary, was the official declaration of the holiday.

TOOK WRONG BOTTLE

JOHN LAVIN SWALLOWED CARBOLIC ACID, BELIEVING IT CASTOR OIL.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 28.—John Lavin, well known throughout the St. John, is dead at Sandon, having paid with his life for his carelessness. He had been feeling out of sorts and on returning from work to his hotel, purchased a small bottle of castor oil. He put behind the bar and was ready to take it. On getting ready to retire he went to the bar, took down the supposed castor oil bottle, poured the contents into a glass of beer and gulped it down. He had got a carbolic acid bottle by mistake, and only lived long enough to receive the consolations of the church from Father Jeannotte while lying on the barroom floor.

TACKLED WRONG MAN

HIGHWAYMEN POILED BY GRANTS PASS LABORER OF QUICK ACTION.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Nov. 28.—Bold holdup men are at work in Grant's Pass and burglars are succeeding in plundering residences and stores. Samuel Hoyt, a workman, while coming home from his work a few evenings ago, was accosted by two men, and at the point of a revolver told to hold up his hands. Instead of obeying the command, Hoyt swung his dinner-pail with full force on the head of one of the robbers, and buffed by the unexpected attack, both thieves made their escape. Hoyt had over \$50 in his pocket at the time of the attempted holdup.

SENATOR DIED AT OMAHA. OMAHA, Nov. 28.—United States Senator Charles H. Dietrich is in the city, attending to some matters preliminary to the coming trial. He goes to his home in Hastings this afternoon and will return to Omaha some time next week. "There is nothing to expect here," said the Senator, "except that I have been in consultation with my attorney, General Cowie. We are going to have a trial as quickly as possible."

REFUSES TO MEET MINERS

Vice President Kramer Says Company Has No Desire or

NOTHING TO ARBITRATE

Claims Strike Was Declared To Enforce Recognition of Union

SAYS PURPOSE IS TO EXCLUDE ALL COMPANY'S EMPLOYEES FROM WORK TO FORCE THEM INTO UNION-COLORADO COAL MINERS' STRIKE OFF.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Nov. 28.—Vice President Kramer, of the Utah Fuel Company, has replied to Governor Wells' telegram asking if he would meet a committee from the Miners' Union and endeavor to settle the coal miners' strike in Carbon county. In his reply Kramer positively declines to meet the representatives of the United Mine Workers of America, on the ground that the present condition of affairs was brought about "for the sole purpose of aiding their organizers in installing their union in its supremacy to law, order, dignity and peace of the state and the absolute exclusion from work of all the employees of the Utah Fuel Company who would not join the union."

Johnstown, Pa., Nov. 28.—A general order issued by the Cambria Steel Company, taking effect Monday, will place a single turn of employees on the nine hour basis. The order affects 12,000 men. The idea of curtailing the working hours rather than shut down the plant to preserve the organization so that when the busy season arrives the shops will be effectively manned.

Louisville, Colo., Nov. 28.—The miners of the Northern Colorado coal fields tonight voted to return to work on the terms granted by the operators, which embrace a compliance with every demand made by the unions. This is the third vote taken on the proposition and the mines have all been kept in good condition and the work will be started Monday. It is estimated 1,300 men will go to work, and the capacity of the mines is 7,000 tons per day.

HIS BULLETS GO WILD

CHICAGO MAN SHOTS AT BURG-LARS AND KILLS SON OF POLICE.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—George Reynolds, the 17-year-old son of Captain Peter Reynolds, of the St. Louis Police Department, was shot and killed early today by a bullet fired by John Wheeler, a photographer, who had shot at burglars whom he had caught riding his showcase and set to flight. One of the bullets struck Reynolds in the mouth, and he fell to the pavement unconscious. Wheeler did not know until after Reynolds had been found by the police and taken to the hospital that his bullets had found a mark. Reynolds died in the ambulance.

LOGS STORED IN SLOUGH

ST. HELENS, Or., Nov. 28.—Several million feet of logs are stored in Williams Slough, a short distance above St. Helens, for the reason that there is an oversupply of logs in the Portland market. The Columbia Timber Company at Goble has dozens of raft stored at different places in the river on this side of Portland, and several anchored at the dumping place at the terminus of their logging railway. This company recently closed down for a short time to get rid of the surplus production. The Yeon-Pelton Company at Rainier, has also closed down for a few months. The large camp of County Commissioner Colvin, at Marshfield, is still running, as is also the Columbia & Nehalem logging railway camps at Columbia City. The latter company is extending its line of railway a mile further into the woods. The majority of the small camps are still running.

TRIED TO TEAR DOWN JAIL

JUNCTION CITY, Or., Nov. 28.—Yesterday a breeze of excitement was caused by the attempt of one Earl Eastman to escape from the City Jail by means of removing the brick floor. He was discovered just in time to foil his attempt. Eastman was locked up yesterday morning in compliance with a request by wire from the Sheriff's office Eugene, which carried the information that the man wanted was a forger and that he had passed checks aggregating \$260 on business men in Eugene. The man was returned to the county seat yesterday to face his accusers.

ECHO, Or., Nov. 28.—A rabbit drive to get a supply for the new cannery here, will be held at Charles Bartholomew's farm, two miles from here, tomorrow. The first drive of the season was held Thanksgiving Day, just outside of Echo, in which 2000 of the fleet footed animals were captured. The animals were in a good fat healthy condition. The drive Sunday will be participated in by some of the sportsmen of Pendleton, some from Heppner and others from surrounding towns. It will probably be the largest drive of the season.

Some of the old Nile lakes which were formerly dry salt plains in summer and covered with a few inches of alkali water in the wet season, have been reclaimed by the British government and are now worth from \$200 to \$300 per acre. They produce magnificent crops.

The longest telephone wire span in the world is 2,200 feet from pole to pole, spanning the Susquehanna at Lancaster, Penn.

LIKE SPRING IN THE SOUTH

GRANTS PASS, Or., Nov. 28.—Weather that has the fragrance and warmth of spring has followed upon the three weeks of rain and snow in Southern Oregon. An unusual occurrence in the blooming of many wild flowers, and in the gulches and ravines of the mountains many dogwood bushes are in full blossom. Even for balmy Southern Oregon this is unusual for the latter part of November. Butterflies are in the air, and the grass is growing in the meadows as luxuriantly as in the early spring.

INFLATION AND BANQUET

GRANTS PASS, Or., Nov. 28.—An auspicious event for Grants Pass and Southern Oregon will be the presentation, next Monday, of the charter to Melita, Commandery, Knights Templar. Grand officers will be present from Portland and Salem, as well as visiting Masons from all sections of Southern Oregon, to aid in the presentation ceremony. Melita Commandery was organized in Grants Pass several months ago. A number of candidates will be initiated, and a grand banquet will close the festivities.

SENTENCE TO BE REVISED

Captain Dreyfus Latest Efforts Crowned With Success

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE

Has Transmitted Petition For Revision To President of Commission

DREYFUS OWES CREDIT FOR FAVORABLE ACTION TO MINISTER OF WAR ANDRE-ALASKA COPPER COMPANY WINS SUIT FOR VALUABLE MINES.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—The efforts of Alfred Dreyfus to secure a judicial examination of his case have at last been crowned with success. Minister of Justice Val has transmitted the petition of Dreyfus for a revision of his sentence, to M. Durand, the president of the commission instituted by the Ministry of Justice.

This commission will pronounce upon the admissibility of the request for a revision of the sentence. Dreyfus owes the favorable action taken to the careful consideration given the case by Minister of War Andre, whose conclusions are regarded as in the highest degree favorable to Dreyfus, since they determined the Minister of Justice to refer the question of revision to the commission.

Valdez, Alaska, Nov. 28.—Judge Wickersham today gave his opinion confirming the title of the Alaska Copper Company to the complete and undisputed ownership of the Bonanza mines back of Valdez, the key to the Copper River Railway situation. The decision undoubtedly means the building of the road, as the Havermeyers are the financial backers of the vicious company. The estimated value of the Bonanza mines is \$17,000,000. Senator Heyburn, of Idaho, Congressman Cushman and Andrew P. Burleigh, formerly receiver of the Northern Pacific Company, represented the defeated plaintiffs in the big suit.

A PUBLIC NUISANCE

S. K. ENRIKEN ARRAIGNED BEFORE JUSTICE J. R. SHEPARD IN WEST SALEM

(From Sunday's Daily.)

Friday afternoon Mr. S. K. Enriken, proprietor of Taylor's fish market on Court street, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace J. R. Shepard in Polk county, on the complaint of some citizens of West Salem that he was dumping the offal from the fish market within 300 yards of the approach to the steel bridge. They complained that it had become a public nuisance and should be removed. A warrant in Justice Shepard's court and placed it in the hands of Constable B. S. Ferguson, who secured the endorsement of Justice Horgan, and conducted Mr. Enriken to Polk county, where he was given a preliminary hearing before a court held in D. W. Matheny's house. Mr. Enriken entered a plea of "Not Guilty," and through his attorney, W. H. Holmes, filed a demurrer to the complaint, the argument for which will be heard by Justice Shepard Tuesday morning, and in case the demurrer is not sustained the case will be tried in Mr. Matheny's court Friday afternoon.

P. S. KNIGHT THE NOMINEE

Is Chosen by The Citizens As Candidate For Mayor

INDEPENDENTS HELD HARMONIOUS CONVENTION AT CITY HALL LAST EVENING—MAYOR BISHOP ELECTED CHAIRMAN—RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.

At the convention held by the citizens at the council chamber, in the city hall last evening, Rev. P. S. Knight was unanimously chosen as candidate for mayor on the citizens ticket.

There was a full attendance of the delegates elected at the primaries held in the different wards of the city on last Saturday afternoon, and the proceedings of the convention were conducted in a most harmonious manner.

The meeting was called to order by R. P. Boise, Jr., who placed Mayor C. P. Bishop in nomination for temporary chairman. Mr. Bishop was chosen by unanimous vote of the convention. In accepting the office, the mayor said:

"I thank you, gentlemen, for the honor, and I am glad to have this opportunity to say something to you, and through you to the people of Salem, who have honored me by electing me three times to the office of mayor."

"While we have received many kicks during the past five years of my incumbency, we have also received many words of encouragement, which helped to a large degree to lighten the burden."

"I wish to say a word in explanation of my action in tendering my resignation as mayor of the city of Salem. I did not resign, as has been reported, because I intended to move away from Salem. I have no such intentions. I have more interest in Salem than in any other city, and I want to live here and propose to stay here."

"I did not resign on account of a lack of confidence in an independent municipal government—I have more confidence in such a government now than ever before. Being mayor has given me an opportunity to study the affairs of the city, and while my first thought was, when the citizens movement started, that an independent government was only applicable to small towns, my mind as to this has experienced an entire change. I believe there is nothing more degrading to politics and the young voters than extreme partisanship in governing the municipal affairs. You have had a sample of independent goods during the past five years and it is now for you to determine whether you want a continuation of the same kind or something different. We have done the best we could, and I am proud of the record."

"It has been said that if a haysed council were elected that there would be no forward move, that the city's progress would be blocked, but if you will look back you will find that there has been more improvement, more houses built during the past five years, than in many years previous. If the working men think that an administration is going to come in to turn things over, raise wages and make large expenditures, with other people's money, they will be deceived. What you want is a straightforward, business-like administration."

"I do not believe in an absolute cheese-paring policy. I believe in improvements, but I do not want to see the city take hold of the matter at this time to bring in a new water system, not until we have money enough to put it in. Our present system is as good as nine-tenths of the cities of the size of Salem."

"I favor an appropriation of \$500 out of the city's funds toward the improvement of Marion Square, and a like sum toward the improvement of Willson avenue. I am willing that Salem shall have an efficient fire department, but I am opposed to leading the people to believe that there will be a wholesale spending of money."

"Now then in conclusion I will say that the reason why I have tendered my resignation as mayor of Salem is that my business interests have developed until they demand my whole time. After a brief rest, if the people so elect, I shall be willing to serve them as councilman, street commissioner, or in any capacity they may choose."

At the conclusion of Chairman Bishop's address, upon motion of M. O. Buren, Jos. H. Albert was chosen as temporary secretary.

Upon motion of Oliver Jory a committee of three on credentials was appointed, as follows: Oliver Jory, W. F. Boothby, Silas Riggs.

Upon motion of John M. Payne, the following committee of three was appointed on resolutions: John M. Payne, R. P. Boise, Jr., D. A. White.

A recess of ten minutes was taken to allow the committees to prepare their reports.

The committee on resolutions

brought in the following report which was unanimously adopted:

Their resolutions. Mr. Chairman: We, your committee on resolutions, beg leave to report the following:

Whereas—Long years of mismanagement of city affairs has culminated in piling upon us, at the end of the year 1898, a debt of two hundred and thirty-eight thousand one hundred and eighty-one dollars, and

Whereas—About all the city had to show for this great sum was a city hall, a few sewers, an interest in the bridge across the river and the fire apparatus, costing in all one hundred and thirty-five thousand dollars in round numbers; and

Whereas—The old coterie that was responsible for this condition, was running the city behind at the rate of about \$8000 per annum, and

Whereas—Valuable franchises had been presented to corporations without any equivalent and our city's financial condition was going from bad to worse, and

Whereas—A large majority of our citizens in the year 1898, and at the city elections held since, realizing that city politics was responsible for the city's deplorable condition, organized, and have since maintained successful non-partisan movements that have taken the management of city affairs out of the hands of the ring that had brought it to the verge of financial ruin, and

Whereas—The conduct of city matters for the past five years has been a pronounced success as an economic example, in every particular, saving to the overburdened taxpayers the large sum of fifty-eight thousand dollars, and

Whereas—The residents and taxpayers in the suburbs of our city that have been recently annexed were promised a continuance of the economical management of affairs, and protection against the further piling up of indebtedness, as the burden now laid upon them is grievous and hard to bear; therefore, be it

Resolved—We, as independent citizens, acting in a non-partisan capacity, do hereby pledge our nominees, if elected, to continue the good work that has been done in the five years last past.

Resolved, Further, That we pledge our candidates, if elected, to strive, through economical and honest management, to so reduce our municipal indebtedness and interest charges, that a greater portion of current revenues than can now be utilized, may be applied to the improvement of our streets and in beautifying our parks and to do many other things we would wish to do and yet live within our income.

Resolved, Further, That we, as citizens and taxpayers of Salem, having seen the efficacy of the rule of "business before politics" in municipal affairs, commend both the rule and its practice and pledge ourselves to adhere to it for the public good.

Resolved, That the first command of the people of Salem to the men placed in municipal authority five years ago was to bring this city to a minimum of annual expense and keep her within her legal income, and this command having been faithfully obeyed, it is, so far as her immediate future is concerned, still in force and still imperative.

Upon motion of Thomas Burrows the temporary officers were made the permanent officers of the convention.

Reverend Knight Nominated

The chairman announced that the

convention was ready to receive nominations for mayor, whenupon City Recorder Judah, placed in nomination Rev. P. S. Knight, who upon motion of Oliver Jory was, by a rising vote, declared to be the unanimous choice of the convention.

Recorder Judah, in nominating Rev. P. S. Knight for the mayoralty, said in substance:

"Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Convention:

"I have been awarded a most agreeable task, and I fancy that shall be lacking by way of eloquence or power to make good the deficiency. I am about to offer to you the name of a man who, for half a century, has been an honored citizen of Salem, who during these fifty years has fulfilled the task of citizenship without reproach; whose brain and heart and hand has labored with unceasing energy and the best of good faith in all that has contributed to the good of the city; who has been a builder in every sense of the word—a builder of homes, of commercial enterprises, of municipal history, and of community morals—and who, in building, has always builded well."

"I speak of a man who was the colleague of the grandfathers of many who are present in this hall; the friend, companion and guide of three generations of Salem citizens, whose counsel and helpfulness have always been for the good of the city and the citizen; of a man who has married, with a loud cheer, endorsed the people of this city for years and years, and who still lives with us to serve and aid us in all ways, that tend to individual and communal safety."

"Gentlemen, I have the honor to nominate Rev. P. S. Knight for the office of mayor of Salem."

Nominations Ratified. Attorney John Payne as an outsider, by permission of the chairman, moved that the nomination be ratified by a rising vote. The delegates and outsiders rose to their feet and with a loud cheer endorsed the nomination for mayor of Salem. The nominations for aldermen in the different wards were also ratified by the convention.

Recorder Judah moved that a committee of three be appointed to wait upon Rev. P. S. Knight and inform him of his nomination as the candidate for mayor on the citizens ticket. The motion was carried and the following were appointed by the chairman: N. J. Judah, G. Steiner, and John Payne.

A motion was made and carried that the committee on conduct of campaign be made a permanent executive committee for the citizens' movement in Salem, to serve during the coming year.
