

DON'T FIT TITLE

THEREFORE THE LAW OF 1870
ENACTED BY LEGISLATURE
IS HELD VOID.

Attorney General Renders an Opinion in Which He Holds That Bank Officials Are Not Compelled to Furnish Assessors With List of Depositors For Purpose of Taxation.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Upon the request of District Attorney Geo. M. Brown of Roseburg, Attorney General Crawford yesterday afternoon rendered an opinion in which he held that "while the legislative assembly has the power to compel the officers of any banking institution, or express company or association doing business in the state to furnish a list of depositors to the assessors," the act which was passed by the legislature of Oregon during the session of 1870 is void in that it does not state in the title the object for which the act was passed. In other words the title of the act is "An act to empower assessors to deposit bank deposits," while in the body of the act the assessors are required to call upon the bank officers and procure a sworn statement of the names of the depositors, and to file the officers if they fail to furnish it.

The legality of such an act, however, according to the Attorney General's opinion, is based upon an opinion handed down by the Supreme Court of the United States, in the case of the First National Bank of Youngstown vs. Hughes, et al., in which it is held that "A National Bank may be compelled to disclose the names of its depositors, and the amounts of their deposits, under the compulsory process of a state court, in order to ascertain whether any money deposit therein, subject to taxation within the county, has not been duly returned for that purpose by the owners."

Continuing, the opinion says: "This was under a statute which authorized the auditor (assessor) to issue compulsory process to require the attendance of witnesses and to examine them on oath, and providing for punishment for contempt in case of refusal to obey subpoena to testify."

"Our statutes confer no authority on assessors to issue compulsory process to compel witnesses to attend, but in the light of the foregoing decision the legislative assembly could so provide and I have been unable to find that said decision has ever been disapproved. While the act is indefinite in many respects, it might be held good by the courts if it had been duly enacted. The legislative assembly has, in my opinion, the power to compel the officers of any banking institution, or express company or association doing business within the state to furnish a list of depositors to the assessor, but in the present instance I think the attempt to pass such an act, failed. The title of the act is, 'An act to empower assessors to assess bank deposits.' The body of the act is to compel the officers of the bank to furnish a list of its depositors, and providing a fine if they fail to do so on the request of the assessor. The test as to whether the subject of the act is expressed in the title, as laid down in the case of Spaulding Logging Co. vs. Independence I. Co., 42 Or. 200, as stated by the court at page 398 thereof, is, 'Whether taking from the title, the subject we can find anything in the body which cannot be referred to that subject.'

"The subject of the act under consideration is to authorize assessors to assess bank deposits. The body of the act requires the assessors to call upon bank officers and procure a sworn statement of the names of depositors, and to file such officers if they fail to furnish it. The finding of the officers is not included in the title, to authorize assessors to assess bank deposits. Any person reading the title would naturally conclude that the purpose of the act was to confer the power upon the several county assessors of the state to assess money deposited in banks, and they would not for a moment suppose that it was intended to compel bank officials to furnish lists of depositors to assessors, or to punish them by a fine if they failed to do so at the request of the assessor."

"In my opinion the body of the act is not germane to the title, and the act is void."

WILL BE SAFE

THE GRAND OPERA HOUSE WILL
BE IN CONDITION TO
AVOID DISASTER.

There Will Be a \$300 Asbestos Curtain, More Hose, Babcock Extinguishers, Water Pails, Fire Drill and Many Minor Precautions Taken.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

John F. Cordray, manager of the Grand Opera House in this city, the Albany opera house, Cordray's in Portland, and interested in other theatrical ventures on this coast, was in Salem yesterday, having also visited Albany. He was looking over the Albany and Salem houses with a view to discovering defects in the matter of safety from fire, and taking measures to remedy them. He found the Albany house a safe one, with a few minor changes that will be made.

In talking with a Statesman reporter about the Grand Opera House here, yesterday, Mr. Cordray said he considered this one of the safest little houses on the coast; safest from the possibility of a disaster from fire.

A Lot of Precautions.

But this did not prevent Mr. Cordray from deciding upon taking several precautionary measures, in addition to those already employed.

In the first place, the wiring was thoroughly gone over, and some minor changes made. Special wires will be put in to light the exits, so that in case of accident to the lights on the stage, these will not be affected. They will remain lighted just the same.

Then a new \$300 asbestos curtain will be put in at once.

There will also be a new set of fire hose, to supplement that already employed. Also, Babcock extinguishers on each side of the stage, with fire axes and buckets of water placed conveniently for use.

Besides all these things, Manager Cordray will attempt to have all the exits to the theatre used, in order to accustom the people to them. There are several exits that have never been used, in fact, that have not been noticed. There are exits, for instance, from the boxes on each side, exits from the gallery, and several others that may be used in case of accident.

The windows in the fly loft will be so arranged as to take up the draft in case of fire, so that the draft will not rush to the exits.

It is also proposed to ask the city council to pass an ordinance against the smoking of cigars, pipes or cigarettes about the opera house during the times of performance.

There will also be a fire drill of the ushers, weekly. Mr. Cordray declares that if the audience in the Chicago theatre had been quietly informed that there was a small fire on the stage, and that while there was no use getting excited, it would be well for each one to get up and quietly walk out, there would have been no disaster. Instead of this, the people were told to keep their seats, which they did for fifteen minutes before the great danger was realized and the panic ensued, costing so many lives.

In a case of this kind, the members of the audience can use their coupons to come back and witness the balance of the performance.

At Cordray's, in Portland, after a recent performance, the house was entirely emptied in two and a half minutes, and there were seventeen hundred people present. There are never more than half that number in the Salem house. It should not take more than two minutes for the people in the Salem house to walk out. And if they are assured that they are going to be able to get out in that time, they will never get excited and climb over one another in attempting to escape from the building.

Doing Very Well.

Mr. Cordray says that while the Salem house is not a gold mine, in fact so far he has not so far had a cent for all his investment, yet it is doing very well, and the prospects are that it will in time become a paying house. In three or four years or so, perhaps he will have enough left after paying the expenses to buy some of his necessities of life, if not his luxuries.

WITH OPEN ARMS

WILLIAM H. TAFT, NEW SECRETARY
OF WAR, IS RECEIVED
AT WASHINGTON.

Met at the Depot By a Committee of Officials and Escorted to the War Department By Troop of Cavalry—He Is Enthusiastically Received By the Gathered Throng.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—William H. Taft, the new Secretary of War, arrived here over the Pennsylvania road at 5:15 this afternoon. He was enthusiastically welcomed by a large crowd at the station. General Chaffee, Assistant Secretary of War Oliver, and Colonel Clarence Edwards, formally greeted the new head of the war department. Governor Taft was escorted down the long train sheds. When he reached the gates and passed through a lane formed there was a prolonged outburst of cheering which was repeated vociferously by the crowd gathered outside.

Governor Taft, with General Chaffee and Colonel Edwards, both in full uniform, entered one carriage and Secretary Oliver followed in another, and led by Troop E, Fifteenth Cavalry, which had been drawn up in the plaza in front of the station, they were rapidly driven to the War Department, where Secretary Root formally welcomed his successor. From there the new Secretary was driven to the Arlington Hotel.

INVITATIONS OUT

SOMBRE-BORDERED CARDS ANNOUNCING THE APPROACHING DOOM OF EGBERT.

Superintendent James Distributed a Number to Reporters and Friends Yesterday—Condemned Man to Be Executed During Noon Hour on Friday—Is Reconciled to His Fate.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Superintendent C. W. James, of the penitentiary, has returned from Baker City, where he witnessed the execution of Pleasant Armstrong on Friday of last week, which, he said, passed off without a hitch and was very humane so far as capital punishment goes. He brought part of the execution apparatus back with him, that is the straps, hood, etc., which will be used in the execution of Harry D. Egbert, at the penitentiary this week.

Superintendent James was down town yesterday afternoon and distributed invitations to this event among the newspaper representatives and a few friends whom the law permits him to invite. The hour set for the execution is 12:30 o'clock p. m.

Those who have received the black-bordered cards admitting them to the execution chamber do not appear to be numerous, and the cards are considered valuable because rare. They are not transferable, and therefore cannot be used by other than the individual to whom issued.

The mandate of the court sentencing Egbert, fixed the time of execution between the hours of 10 o'clock a. m. and 4 o'clock p. m., and the superintendent to comply therewith and at the same time avoid any possibility of any difficulty with the inmates of the institution due to excitement of the occasion, has fixed the time of execution at 12:30 p. m. At that hour all the prisoners are in their cells, and without any unusual practice the cell doors can be locked without creating undue excitement.

Everything is now in readiness for the execution and the prospects are that it will come off without any trouble. The scaffold is equipped with two traps and they are both in perfect working order. Egbert will be executed on the trap upon the right.

As the death cells have not yet been constructed in the "death house," Egbert is still, and will be up to the time of execution, confined in the cell in the south wing of the prison and the procession will be formed in the chapel of the prison and march outside and to the rear of the main building to the execution chamber. Egbert is bearing up well under his sentence and the officers of the prison think he will maintain his nerve to the end.

MYSTERY EXPLAINED.

Drivers of Livery Team Which Ran Away Said to Have Been Drunk.

The mystery surrounding the runaway team which dashed into the city from Polk county minus a driver at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning was partly cleared up when "Butch" Cornell and Ben Dice made their appearance last evening, somewhat bewildered, but apparently none the worse physically for their night's experience. It is said Cornell and Dice hired a team and buggy from Gilliam's livery barn on Tuesday afternoon and drove to Independence where they spent the remaining part of the afternoon and evening in supplying the inner man with intoxicating drinks. By midnight they had succeeded in bringing themselves to an advanced stage of intoxication and shortly after started for Salem, from which time on no definite particulars of their escapade could be obtained.

It is evident, however, that both fell or were thrown out of the buggy somewhere between Independence and Eola, as the team was running at full speed and pulling an empty buggy when it passed the Brown farm about a mile beyond Eola. Whether the buggy was upset or whether the occupants fell out while in a stupor could not be learned, nor is it known where Cornell and Dice spent the day yesterday.

Both were still too much under the influence when they walked into the city last evening to give an account of their experience, in fact it is doubtful if either knows just what did happen during the latter part of the night. It is more than likely the pair slept off part of their spree somewhere in the Polk county hills and when sufficiently recovered last evening managed to reach home.

It is fortunate that the innocent horses sustained no injuries in their mad flight; as to the drivers they would have been deserving of but little sympathy had the result of their night's debauch been more serious.

Large Export Order—

The Salem Flouring Mills yesterday shipped 1500 sacks of "Salem Steamers" flour by the steamer Altona, and will this morning make another shipment of 3,000 sacks, which will complete an order for 10,000 sacks for export to China by the steamer Indramana, which will sail in a few days. The mill will complete the order early this morning, and at 5 o'clock will shut down for the present. Salem is becoming rather an important point exporting flour, and the product manufactured at the Salem mills finds a ready market in the Orient.
