

## BEST IN WORLD

ONTARIO SALMON HATCHERY FULLY EQUIPPED AND IS RUNNING FULL BLAST.

No More Danger of the Extinction of the Salmon—Salmon Canning Industry Will Grow Instead of Diminishing to Benefit of State—Great Future For Eastern Oregon.

(From Wednesday's Daily.) The state of Oregon owns and operates the largest fish hatchery in the world. It is located at Ontario, Malheur county, on the Snake river, and is now turning out its first batch of young salmon.

About 25,000,000 young Royal Chinook salmon, or sixteen times as many as are annually caught in the Columbia river, will be turned loose at Ontario this spring. The fish are now scarcely more than an inch long. They will grow down the Snake and Columbia rivers and out into the Pacific Ocean, where they will grow to maturity. Four or five years hence many of them will return weighing on an average of thirty pounds each and worth to the fishermen 5 cents a pound. If only one out of every twenty returns, the hatchery will more than keep up the supply of salmon.

Last Saturday evening the State Fish Commission, composed of Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Dunbar and State Treasurer Moore, went to Ontario to make a visit of inspection to this important institution. They were accompanied by Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen and one or two others. They found the hatchery plant in excellent working condition, and were much gratified to learn that the first season's operation has proven the wisdom of the selection of that site for a hatchery.

The eggs taken at Ontario are from the best specimens of Royal Chinook salmon, thus increasing the number of fish that make the best canned product. The reputation of Columbia river salmon, already the best in the world, will be further strengthened by this artificial propagation of the best variety.

The site at Ontario has the advantage of a never failing water supply and distance from the ocean. The fish that ascend the streams the farthest are the ones that come into the river earliest, and have flesh or the best flavor.

In speaking yesterday of the trip to Ontario and of his observations there, one of the party said:

Good Money Well Spent.

"The state never made a better investment than when it appropriated \$15,000 for the construction of that hatchery. The appropriation is inconsiderable in comparison with the benefit that will be derived therefrom. The fact that the salmon will be exterminated is now a thing of the past, for the state and government hatcheries on the Columbia and its tributaries are now turning out 70,000,000 young salmon every year. The salmon canning industry will grow instead of diminish, furnishing employment for more labor and more capital. What the state spends in keeping up this industry is as wisely spent as the money which the farmer invests in grain for seed. The return is gathered in the harvest.

"Our trip to the farther border of this great state of Oregon was a very pleasant one. The people of Eastern Oregon are open-hearted in their hospitality and try to make things pleasant for visitors in their midst. The mayor of Ontario, Representative Test, District Attorney Miller, and Hatchery Superintendent Frank C. Brown, met us at the train and took us in carriages to the hatchery, which is about a mile and a half from town. In the evening the mayor and the city council gave a banquet in honor of the members of the Fish Commission and proved themselves to be royal entertainers. About forty persons were present at the banquet. The people of Ontario are taking great interest in the hatchery work and are co-operative with the state officers in every way.

"That great Eastern Oregon country has a future awaiting it that is very little appreciated now. By means of irrigation, that sandy, sage brush land is made to produce six tons of alfalfa per acre every year. There is no plowing and seeding every year. All the farmers have to do is to cut the alfalfa and stack it. In the winter the sheep come along and buy the stacks and feed the hay to the flocks right there. The hay sells for \$5 per ton and this year it brought more than that. With very little expense, the farmer sells hay enough to bring him \$30 an acre a year. No wonder the land sells readily at \$100 per acre. Without the water the land would be worth about \$1 per acre.

"Irrigation is still in its infancy in Eastern Oregon. There is plenty of water yet unused and plenty of land to put it on. Of course, there are vast tracts of land in that section of the state that are too high to be irrigated, and such land is very little. But the day is not far distant when the area of irrigated land will be multiplied many times and the inland Empire will be a region of enormous industrial wealth."

## NOT A MEMBER

HENRY ST. RAYNOR MAKES APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION TO OREGON BAR.

Upon Charge of Obliterating Testimony in State vs. McDaniels Case He Was Disbarred From Practicing in Oregon—But It Was Subsequently Found He Was Not a Member of the Bar.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Henry St. Raynor, of Portland, who, during the year 1895, upon a certificate of the supreme court, of Nebraska, was admitted to practice as an attorney at law before the bar of Oregon for a period of nine months, and having passed the probationary period, now petitions the supreme court for permanent admission to the bar of Oregon. This is decidedly an entirely new phase upon what is considered one of the most interesting cases to have developed before the Oregon bar.

St. Raynor, it will be remembered, after having practiced law in the courts of Oregon since 1895, was disbarred from practice by the supreme court, upon complaint and prosecution of the grievance committee of the Oregon State Bar Association, upon conviction of the charge of having obliterated evidence in the official testimony in the case of the State vs. McDaniels, for the alleged purpose of turning the tide of evidence in favor of his client, the defendant, who had been convicted of the murder of Miss Clara Fitch, in Portland, on July 20, 1899, and for which crime he is now serving a life sentence in the penitentiary. Mr. St. Raynor was disbarred on November 10, 1902. He then filed a petition for rehearing on March 28, 1903. This petition was denied April 13, 1903. Later Mr. St. Raynor applied for reinstatement and the matter was referred to the State Bar Association and the grievance committee made its report to the supreme court and this report is still under advisement.

Mr. St. Raynor's application for admission is supplemented by two petitions, bearing the signatures of nearly all of the most prominent attorneys of Multnomah and adjoining counties, which are superseded by the following plea and recommendation:

That they "have known Henry St. Raynor, of Portland, Oregon, for a period of several years last past and believe him to be a person of good moral character; and, having implicit confidence in his professional integrity and uprightness, we respectfully petition and move the court to admit him to practice law in the courts of this state."

The most peculiar feature about the case is that, although Mr. St. Raynor had been admitted to practice for a period of nine months on probation, but there is no record to show that he had ever applied for permanent admission or that he had ever been admitted to permanent practice. This fact, however, was not discovered until after the supreme court had disbarred him from practicing as an attorney, which he never had a legal right to pursue. It was discovered at the same time that there are a number of other attorneys who have never applied for permanent admission to the bar, some of whom were admitted to practice temporarily at or about the same time Mr. St. Raynor was admitted and it is probable that some of these will be making application for permanent admission to the bar in the near future, dependable, of course, upon the outcome of the St. Raynor case, which has been taken under advisement by the court.

Besides signing the petitions for the admission of Mr. St. Raynor to practice, Mayor George H. Williams, of Portland, and District Attorney John Manning, both wrote personal letters of commendation in urging the granting of the application.

AN INTERESTING AND VALUABLE PAMPHLET ISSUED BY LEWIS AND CLARK COMMISSION.

Gives the Common and Botanical Names of Ninety-Five Different Kinds of Shrubs of Oregon and a Description of Same—Also Interesting Treatise on Climate and History.

The Lewis and Clark Exposition Commission is taking steps to get out suitable literature for distribution at the St. Louis Fair, and broadcast over the country in advertisement of the state and particularly the Lewis and Clark Fair, to be held in Portland in 1905. The first step in this direction, and a very good one, too, was to compile a treatise on the forest wealth of Oregon, and in this matter they have succeeded admirably. Under the direction of the Commission, Edmund P. Shields, who is probably one of the best informed men in the state of Oregon on the forest question, has compiled a neat and comprehensive volume treating upon "The Forest Wealth of Oregon," as it is entitled, and it is replete with valuable information upon this subject from cover to cover.

The printing, which was done in the State Printing Office, and the binding of this book has just been completed, and the first installment of them will be forwarded to the Commission, in Portland, within a few days. It is composed of thirty-two pages excluding the cover pages, the first eight of which are devoted to a splendid treatise upon climate, Oregon's forests as a resource, and a brief history of Oregon and Oregon's forests, while the balance of the book is devoted to a list

of the forest trees and larger shrubs of Oregon, and the pamphlet contains several full-page half-tone cuts of many Oregon trees and other interesting scenes of the forest, while the description of the different kinds of woods grown in this state and their respective uses, is not only valuable as to the information which it sheds in a general way but also as a future reference book.

The large number of valuable trees useful for many special purposes has called forth the account of Oregon's trees, with especial attention to the description of the woods, their use, and those are in the state over which each species occurs. A few are included that, while not strictly trees, sometimes attain to that dignity, and are important from an ornamental or medicinal view. The total number of species enumerated is 95, which is more than any other separate list of trees has contained. This is due to recent botanical activity and to the inclusion of tree willows, which have hitherto been sadly neglected. This is the first list published in which an attempt has been made to

give descriptions of the wood characters of Oregon trees. These characters are a result of careful study of the woods in the Oregon state collection gathered for exhibition at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition and the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition. The range given for each species refers only to the state of Oregon.

Different authorities are now engaged in the preparation and compilation of similar treatises upon the agricultural, horticultural, mineral and other resources of Oregon, which will be condensed in small pamphlets like that treating of the forest wealth, and these too, will be ready for distribution at the St. Louis Fair.

## TAKEN TO SEA

SERIOUS CHARGES ARE BROUGHT AGAINST SAN FRANCISCO POLICE OFFICERS.

Eighteen-Year-Old Ida Mooney Is Said to Have Been Shipped Away—Steamer Sonoma Will Be Arrested Upon Reaching Honolulu—The Girl Is an Orphan.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—Ida Mooney, a girl of 18 years has been shanghai'd and shipped away to Australia, according to charges made by J. H. Burke, owner of an O'Farrell street restaurant, and Mrs. Osborne, of 715 Post street. The strong and long arm of the American law is to be reached out to take her from the steamship Sonoma at Honolulu and bring her back.

Captain Martin and Detective Bailey of the police department, are accused of having taken an active part in the work of shanghaiing the girl, and if the charges are true, and Miss Mooney was sent away on the steamer against her will, the officers and all others concerned in the case may find themselves in serious trouble. Attorney Averill states that he is preparing to have habeas corpus papers served when the Sonoma arrives at the island port.

Miss Mooney is an orphan who was brought from Australia about ten months ago by Mrs. Trotman, formerly matron of the asylum in which the girl was brought up. With the Trotmans she lived at 715 Post street where Mrs. Osborne is the manager of a lodging house, and she worked at Burke's restaurant, 128 1/2 O'Farrell street. Mrs. Osborne and Mr. Burke took an interest in the girl. They assert that she gave her weekly earnings to Mrs. Trotman; and that when she finally rebelled and refused to any longer give up her wages, she was arrested by Detective Bailey at the instance of Mrs. Trotman, and shipped away on the Sonoma, in spite of her own protestations and the attempt of Mrs. Osborne and Mr. Burke to prevent the abduction.

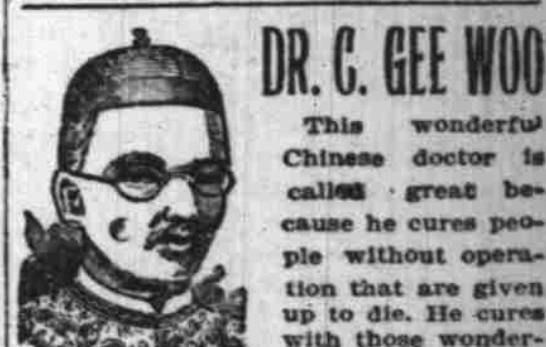
