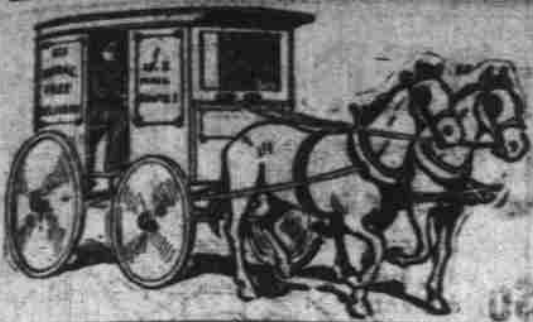

WAR BEGINS IN EARNEST

SENSATIONAL NEWS FROM EAST
ELECTRIFIES ST. PETERSBURG.

THE LAND AND SEA OPERATIONS

Indicate That the Big Thing Is Now on And Developments Are Expected.

From Three to Four Thousand Men Are Killed in the Engagement on the Yalu—General Kuropatkin Blames Zassalitch for the Heavy Loss of Life.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 4.—(6:03 a. m.)—St. Petersburg is electrified by the sensational news of fighting on land and sea. From General Kuropatkin conveying Lieutenant General Zassalitch's report came graphic details of the battle of Turenchan, as the combat on the banks of the Yalu is officially designated. Viceroy Alexieff's command of Port Arthur has been signaled by the repulse of another desperate attempt of the Japanese to close the entrance to the harbor. Adding to this quota of war news an official report of the appearance of a number of Japanese ships off Knaping and Siminichen, on the Liao Tung peninsula below Niu Chwang, forbidding the disembarkation of Japanese troops with the intention of cutting off Port Arthur, war may now be said to have begun in deadly earnest.

New Chwang Reported Fallen.

London, May 3.—The Chefoo correspondent of the Daily Chronicle cables the following under Tuesday's date: "The Japanese landed troops and attacked and captured New Chwang last evening, the Russians falling back to protect the railway."

But Report is Unconfirmed.

London, May 3.—The Chronicle's report of the capture of Niu Chwang is not confirmed from any quarter and it is hardly likely it is true as the news could scarcely have reached Chefoo. The official dispatch from General Sakharoff, however, seems to indicate the Japanese are directing their attention to this point.

Zassalitch Was Obstinate.

Paris, May 3.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo De Paris says General Kuropatkin, in telegraphing to the Emperor blames Lieutenant General Zassalitch for his obstinacy in refusing to retreat in time despite the orders he received.

Another Version of Fight.

St. Petersburg, May 3.—The Emperor has received from General Kuropatkin a long dispatch consisting of General Zassalitch's report of the battle of May 1. From General Zassalitch's report it is evident the Russian forces were out-matched from the opening of the battle. The report consists of the consecutive retreat by the Russians and the flanking movements on the part of the Japanese. Speaking of the losses he admits they were heavy, and include two colonels besides nine company commanders killed or wounded.

Referring to the abandonment of the guns, General Zassalitch says the roughness of the country prevented the saving of them even by means of drag ropes. He states the wounded, which number 800 men and fourteen officers are being cared for at the hospital at Feng Wang Chang where they were taken under greatest difficulty. The general asserts the troops have not lost their morale and are ready for fresh engagements. Concerning the Japanese losses he states, they were very heavy and according to the statements of the participants at least three or four thousand were killed.

Russians Heavy Losers.

St. Petersburg, May 3.—In the report received by the Emperor from General Kuropatkin under today's date stated at least from three to four thousand men were killed in the Yalu river fight.

TOBACCO ADVANCES.

"Divine Weed" Being Neglected for Cotton—Salem Market Prices.

High prices of cotton in recent years have induced large numbers of tobacco planters to reduce their tobacco field area and plant cotton in its place. As a result all American tobaccos have become comparatively scarce, and an advance in price has been chronicled several times this year. Yesterday quite a sharp rise was recorded and various brands of plug tobacco have gone up from 1 to 4 cents a pound. Battle ax has gone up to 40 cents, Climax to 46, Drummond's Natural Leaf to 65, Horseshoe to 45, Piper Heidsieck to 71, Saw Log to 47, and Star to 46 cents.

ARE DRAFTING THE PLATFORM

REPUBLICANS BUSY FRAMING PRINCIPLES OF PARTY.

READY FOR THE CONVENTION

Before That Body Meets in Chicago, As Approved by President Roosevelt.

Will Adhere Strongly to the Principles of Protection But Will Leave Tariff Revision Alone—Republicans Alone Have Enforced Laws Governing Monopolies—Includes Gold Standard.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The platform to be adopted by Republican national convention has been the subject of considerable discussion at the conference where the Republicans have met, and it is expected by the time the convention assembles a platform with the President's approval will have been prepared.

The platform will declare in the strongest terms the adherence of the Republican party to the principles of protection but will not bind the party not to revise the tariff. President Roosevelt and the present administration will be endorsed. There will be a plank declaring the laws for the regulation of monopolies have been enforced only by the Republican administration.

If reciprocity is mentioned it will be so worded as to confine it to articles not in competition with the products of this country. The maintenance of the gold standard and sound finances will be mentioned. The disfranchisement of negroes will be denounced and a demand made for the restoration of the merchant marine.

Scrap Didn't Materialize.

Louisville, Ky., May 3.—The threatened contest between ex-Governor W. O. Bradley and Commissioner of Internal Revenue Yerkes for the control of the Republican convention and the state central committee, failed to materialize today. Bradley declared for harmony and moved that Yerkes, as temporary chairman, be unanimously declared permanent chairman. On motion of Mr. Yerkes, Bradley was unanimously chosen as one of the delegates to the national convention. The platform and delegates were instructed to support Roosevelt.

Looks Good For Hearst.

Des Moines, Iowa, May 3.—The indication is that the Iowa Democrats will send a delegation to the St. Louis convention instructed for W. R. Hearst for President. The opponents of Hearst played their last card today and lost; unless the unexpected happens the Hearst followers will control tomorrow's convention.

COMING HOME.

Congressman Hermann will be here soon to greet his friends—Will Assist in Canvass.

Hon. Binger Hermann who came West to St. Louis as a member of the Congressional Committee appointed by ex-Speaker Cannon to attend the opening of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, has returned to Washington City to attend to some very important unfinished business in the various departments there. Mr. Hermann will probably leave Washington in time to reach Salem by the 15th or 16th of this month.

Mr. Hermann will probably make a few addresses at the principal towns throughout the district during the last two weeks of this month and the first week in June. Mr. Hermann's political friends will welcome him in the campaign. The early adjournment of Congress makes it possible for Mr. Hermann to get away from Washington in time to help in the canvass.

Hon. James Price, of Tacoma, brother-in-law of Senator J. H. Mitchell, passed through Salem on the afternoon overland yesterday on his return from a trip to Southern Oregon.

FROSTS DO DAMAGE.

Unseasonable Weather in California and Oregon Is Bad for the Crops.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The Weather Bureau's weekly crop bulletin says: In California and Oregon the weather was unseasonably cool, with damaging frosts in Oregon, but in Washington the conditions were generally favorable. The crop has advanced favorably on the Pacific Coast, the outlook being exceptionally fine in Washington. Good stands of spring wheat are reported from Washington and Oregon. Showers, says the weather man.

IT IS GOOD NEWS

VANCOUVER BALL TEAM WILL PLAY TWO SERIES OF GAMES IN SALEM.

Home Grounds Inundated and Cannot be Used This Week—"Homerun" Joe Marshall, of Portland, to Assume Command of the Soldier Brigade and Is Enlisting Strong Reinforcements.

Salem fans rejoice. You have ample reason to do so. According to the state league schedule the Salem Raglans were to have gone to Vancouver this week to play a series of games upon those grounds with the Soldiers, and the Soldiers were to have come to Salem the following week with return games. On account of the Columbia river being higher than usual at this season of the year, the Vancouver grounds have been inundated, making it impossible to play there this week, and this necessitates a slight variation from former arrangements. Here is where the Salem fans are to be favored. Instead of the Raglans going to Vancouver, arrangements have been made whereby the Soldiers will not only play here next week but this week also, giving the Salem people the opportunity of seeing three successive series of games at the opening of the season. This news will, no doubt, be welcome to the ardent lovers of the sport in this city who will not fail to turn out en masse to make the new departure a success.

There is also another piece of baseball news which will undoubtedly "look good" to the Salem fans, and likewise to all other fans, and that is the report to the effect that Manager Prebles of which, by the way has good foundation, the Vancouver team, although retaining financial control of the team, has turned the active management over to Joe Marshall, otherwise and better known as "Homerun Joe," who has the reputation of being one of the heaviest hitters on the Pacific Coast. According to the information received by President Sroat yesterday morning, Marshall has already assumed management of the team, has practically disbanded the team which lost four straight games to Eugene last week, and he is now actively engaged in making a complete reorganization of the team.

It is understood that, under the new management, the team will still represent Vancouver, although Marshall belongs to Portland. Joe is one of the best known ball players on the Coast, and is in a position to secure some of the best material extant for the makeup of his new team and there is no doubt that he will make the best of his opportunity to pick out a winning team from the start. This is just what is needed to promote baseball in the Willamette Valley, that is, fast ball.

When Joe Fay, manager of the Raglans, learned of this change he was very much pleased and, knowing Marshall personally and by reputation, he feels that he will organize a fast bunch of players who will make the other teams of the league "smoke up" to keep company with it. It does not create the slightest uneasiness on his part, however, for Joe thinks, and very rightfully too, that he has got a pretty warm bunch himself and is not afraid of going up against the best of them. "The harder the game the merrier the sport, and the more creditable the victory," is Joe's motto in baseball lore.

Should the Vancouver team prove to be a bunch of stars, as it is hoped they will be, and play an errorless game, as did the Raglans on last Sunday and can do again, there will be some close baseball games will worth going many miles to witness and that is what the fans want to see. Fay says there is no real sport in winning a game on the strength of a lot of errors on the part of the opposing team and says the faster they play the better it suits him.

"Let him come," said Fay last evening, "and bring the best they can get, we are ready for them and can give them a good go for their money. I think I have a pretty fast bunch of players who will improve in speed and team work as the season advances and, if the Raglans improve in the future as they have done in the past, they will be ready to go up against any thing that comes along and give them a run for their money. The new arrangement has no effect upon the schedule, the Vancouver team, when playing here this week having the same privileges as though they were upon their home grounds."

The present lineup of the Soldiers, according to the information in the hands of President Sroat, under the reorganization process: Johnson, O'Day, Lewis, Graves, "Homerun" Marshall, Harper, Lee and Howard. The relative positions of these players could not be definitely learned.
