NEWS OF THE MINING WORLD

Johnson at Muncie.

C. L. Johnson, of (Salem) Oregon, one of the oldest and most experienced mining men of the great West, is in the city the guest of J. Dennis Hoyt. Mr. Johnson is secretary of both the Golden Rule Mining company and the Annex company in which so many Muncie men are interested. He brought samples of ore from the various mine locations, and is showing the many stockholders what they have been buying. Mr. Johnson will remain in this city until the first of next week after which he will go to St. Louis and then back to his western home. Muncie men have furnished a great amount of capital to develop the well known mines in Oregon, and these two companies are on the progressive list to say the least. The stock has advanced very materially since the Muncie men invested their money but they do not want to let go, since the proposition is just beginning to yield big returns. It is believed that the proposition is growing better every month and it is with this theory that the local men are holding their stock in the valuable property. Mr. Johnson states that new companies are constantly forming and that they are preparing to develop all adjacent territory. Some of the mines adjoining those in which Muncie are interested are proving to be the best in the big state of Oregon. —Muncie (Ind.) Daily Herald.

To the Oregon-Colorado Mine.

A flume will be built and giants installed necessary to carry on the work on a larger scale. The first payment of \$5,000 has been made, and the remainder will be paid within 18 months.

TWO TONS OF GOLD.

Fabulous Output of the Yellow Metal From the Klondike Mines.

SEATTLE, June 3.—A Dawson special to the Post-Intelligencer says: Since sluicing began in the Klondike, May 8, royalty has been paid on 55,753 ounces of gold, or nearly two tons. This is the largest amount ever produced up to June 1, in this district. Last year only 11,000 ounces were taken out in a similar period.

TERROR REIGNS

RIOTING BREAKS OUT AS RESULT OF KILLING OF NON-UNION MINERS.

Forty Shots Are Fired Into Crowd, Killing One Man and Injuring Six—Free for All Fight—Union Men Are Arming.

VICTOR, Colo., June 6.—Rioting broke out in this city this afternoon while a mass meeting was being held to discuss the murder of the twelve non-union miners by means of the infernal machine at Independence. Forty shots were fired into the crowd in the street. One man was killed and at least six persons are injured. Secretary Clarence G. Hamlin of the Mineworkers' Association, concluding short address said: "I want to hear what the boys in the mines have got to say about this trouble." William Hoskins, a Union miner from Gold Field, threw up his hand and shouted, "Let me talk." At this the crowd began to hiss Hoskins and cry, "Put him out." A free-for-all fight followed and the shooting began. Most of the shots were directed skyward. Hoskins fell with a bullet in his body and the crowd scattered in every direction. Secretary Hamlin, who had been standing on a wagon, kept on talking, unmindful of the hail storm of bullets that whizzed about his head.
