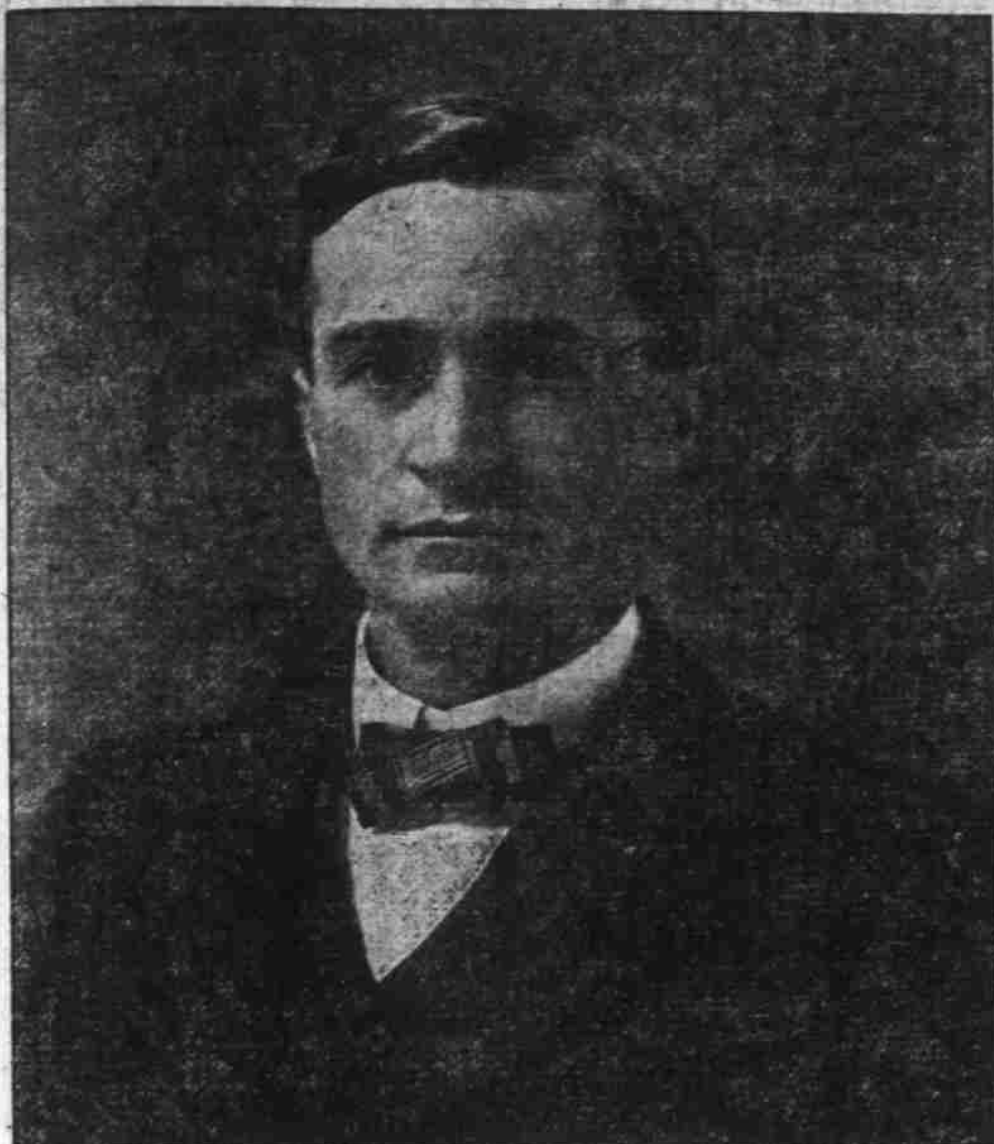


RETURNS FROM TOLEDO.

MANY BERRIES

STRAWBERRY CROP ENORMOUS AND MARKETS ARE OVER-STOCKED.

Tomorrow the Salem Cannery Will Begin Packing and Then Berries Will Be Scarce, Hence Housewives Are Advised to Purchase What They Want for Canning Today.

The strawberry season has opened with full force and yesterday was at its best. The market is overdone both in Salem and Portland, and the growers are compelled to accept small prices for their product, or not sell at all. Up to Monday there was a most excellent market in Portland, the berries bringing a net price averaging \$2 per crate of six gallons, but yesterday about the best obtainable in the Portland market was 75 cents, while at home they were selling at the stores for \$1 and \$1.15, and at the cannery could be had for 75 cents per crate.

The trouble is no canneries have yet started to use the surplus over the regular price. The Salem cannery has been receiving berries since Monday, and yesterday were compelled to sell in order to keep them from spoiling. They were compelled to receive berries on contract. Tomorrow the cannery will begin the season's pack, with a large supply of berries to work on, and from that time the delicious fruit will be a scarce article on the market. Hence it would behoove the careful housewives to make their purchases for canning purposes today.

On Monday a total of 257 crates of berries were shipped from Salem to the several markets, Seattle, Tacoma, Portland and Southern Oregon points, and yesterday the number reached 200. The

DEMOCRATIC FORECASTS OF BALLOT DID NOT SHOW UP IN THE COUNTY.

STRONG REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

Returns Show That Lowest Man on the Ticket Has About 1000 Votes to Spare.

In the State Indications Are That Judge Frank A. Moore Is Elected by the Largest Majority Ever Received by a State Officer.

fied as were the Republicans before the election that there was nothing to the Democratic claims that they were taking any great part in the election in Marion county.

They are also now well satisfied as to the truth of the old adage that "hind sight is surer than foresight," and also of that other adage that "an unwise man and his money are soon parted."

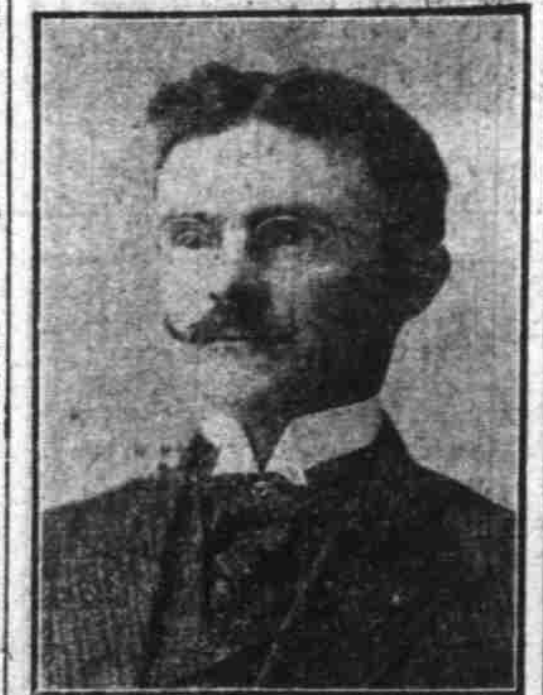
Following up the custom and habits of the campaigners on the canvass, "this calls up the story" of a district in South Carolina, where a few years ago the total voting population was about 9000, of whom a large majority were blacks and other Republicans, and they nominated a Congressional ticket. The Democrats, afraid of their shadow, as usual, which in this case was the black men of the district, elected their Congressional candidate by 15,000 majority. In Washington, later, the Congressman-elect asked his Democratic friends how they liked the way his district went in the election. "Oh, all right," they said, "but what was the use of making it so big?"

So the Democrats now ask this question here in Marion county.

It seems that the lowest man elected on the county ticket has 1000 votes to carry around in his pocket, just to rattle, while McNary, the Marion county boy who will do the prosecuting in this district for the next four years. De gratia, can flip 2117 to 2120 votes at the birds and still hold the job.

In the state, prospects still show that Judge Frank A. Moore is elected by the largest majority ever received by any single man before, that of 17000 to 18,000 votes. Williamson is elected by at least 10,000 in the Second Congressional district, while Binger Hermann, whom the Portland Journal thought it was fighting, will carry this district by 6000 to 7000 votes over what's his name? oh, yes, Col. Veatch of Cottage Grove.

The only one of the candidates lost to the enemy in this district was Col. B. L. Eddy of Tillamook, who was beaten by Judge Wm. P. Galloway, usually

called "Bill," of Yamhill. There's no use talking those Yamhillers are hard to beat. Colonel Eddy carried Marion county by 690 votes but he lost every other county in the district. Judge G. H. Burnett is re-elected by a large majority, this county giving him 1500 votes more than Galloway. Judge R. P. Boise will now have time to attend to his North Salem farm, which has recently come into the city, his vote in Marion county being but 1490 against 3553 for Burnett and 5740 for Eddy.

Yamhill-Galloway had 431 plurality; in Tillamook 46; in Linn, 391; and in Polk, 86, a total of 954, against Eddy's 680 in this county, leaving Galloway a safe plurality of 274 votes.

The vote in detail in this county is to be found in the tabulated statement in this morning's Statesman, and the total vote on various of the most important candidates is as follows: For Congress, Hermann, 3089; Veatch, 1846, plurality, 1243; for Circuit Judges Burnett, 3553; Eddy, 2740; Galloway, 2063; Boise, 1489; for District Attorney,

McNary, 2007; Whitney, 1500; for Representative, Calvert, 3485; Graham, 3256; Kay, 3481; Richie, 3157; Settlement, 3120; Hackett, (Dem.) 2129; Mathieu, (Dem.) 1803; for County Judge, Scott, (Rep.) 3570; Corby, (Dem.) 1943; Scott's plurality, 1327; for Sheriff, Culver, (Rep.) 3229; Harding, (Dem.) 1731, plurality for Culver, 1498. There is still Silver Falls precinct to be heard from, and two years ago it gave 13 Republican votes to four Democratic.

The Amendments.

It may be necessary to have the official count before figures can be given, as they can not be secured. There is no doubt of either except the local option, the fight on which will be close.

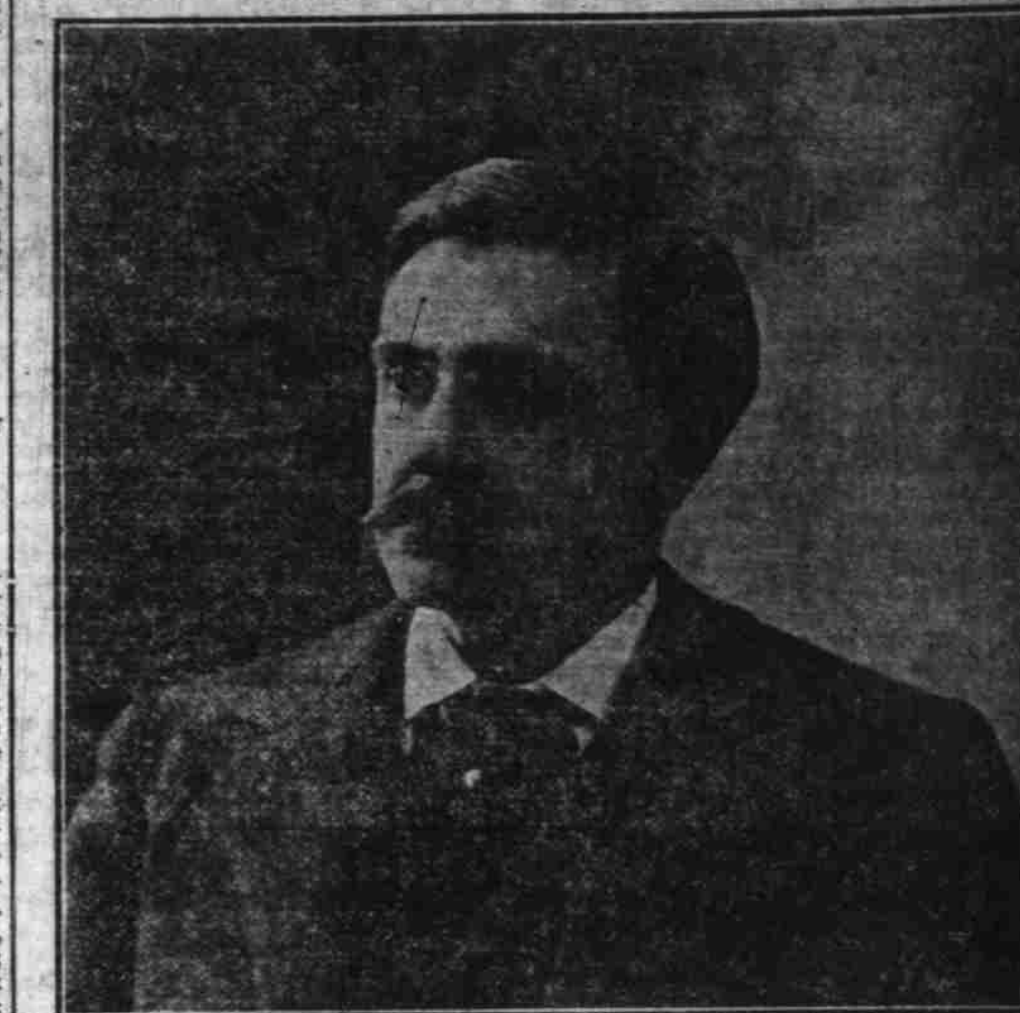
