Despite the intense pain he suffered, he bore up bravely and when taken to the Sisters Hospital at Chehalis, expressed the hope that he would be able to play again in a few weeks.

The funeral of William Davidson, who passed away at the Salem Hospital on Tuesday evening, will be held at the First Christian church in Monmouth at 10 o'clock Friday morning, and the remains will be interred in the cemetery near that city. The body is lying in Clough's undertaking parlors and will be taken to Monmouth early Friday morning, accompanied by relatives from this city.

The purpose of the corporation is to conduct a general banking business and

Boy Shot.

Mr. Clayton Wentz, formerly superintendent of the State School for Deaf Mutes, who has been in Salem introducing a gasoline lighting and heating system, was called to Vancouver Wash., yesterday, by a telephone message, announcing that his son had been shot. The son is Foster Wentz, aged 15, and well known in Salem. He was with a hunting party at Rockwell, Clarke County, Washington. On Tuesday his shot gun was accidentally discharged, wounding his right wrist and his side. The doctor at the Vancouver hospital, whither the boy was taken, telephoned to Mr. Wentz yesterday that three shots had been extracted from the side of the patient, and that there was no danger from that wound. He would not say, however, how badly the wrist had been injured, leaving the father in fear that possibly an amputation might be necessary.

Found Parker Entertaining the Tammany Leaders, Who Had Gone There Unannounced—Enemies and Friends Again Meet in Democratic Friendship

ESOPUS, July 27.—Members of the National Democratic committee made an informal call on Judge Parker today and found him entertaining Leader Charles F. Murphy and other persons prominent in Tammany Hall. David B. Hill and Murphy joined hands on Rosemont veranda and the others who have not been political friends for years, put aside their differences and for the day at least, met on common ground.

The coming of the National committee was heralded far and wide, but no announcement had been made of the proposed visit of the Tammany delegation. Several committeemen expressed surprise at finding New York men at Rosemont, but Murphy made no effort to avoid meeting Parker and his campaign managers.

BRITAIN DEMANDS REDRESS. LONDON, July 26.—The British Government is taking energetic action relative to the sinking of the British steamer "Knight Commander" by the Vladivostok squadron. All information received by the Government tends to establish in the official mind the belief that an outrage has been committed, for which, no excuse exists in international law. The demands which will be made on the Russian Government will include compensation to owners of the ship and to the owners of goods on board the "Knight Commander," apology for the action of Russian cruisers and an agreement that instructions shall be given which will prevent a repetition of such action.
