TWO NEW RACES PLACED ON PROGRAM YESTERDAY PROMISE GOOD THINGS.

Things Booming on the Grounds and Everybody Getting Ready for the Big Event of Next Week—Stock Coming in Fast—Work in Pavilion.

The State Board of Agriculture yesterday decided to do away with one of the slow-poke races on the program and to place two speedy ones in its place thereof. The one called off is the inland Empire trot for skates that have no longer rights to be called racing stock, for there are many of their class hauling drays in this country. It was for horses that have no record below 2:24.

Fair Ground Notes.

N. C. Maris, representing the Rural Spirit newspaper of Portland, is at the Fair Grounds. He has fitted up one of the south stalls of the fine cattle department, and is prepared to entertain his friends there. He has decorated his walls with photographs of fancy stock, and of pasture scenes, and these of themselves prove very interesting to his visitors.

Mr. Albert Tozier, the all-round rustling image of geniality, is on the grounds with his tents, and looking after the campers. He knows how to receive everybody and how to divide up his camp ground. Every street is named and numbered in camp town and Mr. Tozier is just the man to keep track of everybody. His tents are near the depot, on either side of the walk.

Willis Simeral of the Oregon Reform School is chief marshal on the Fair grounds, and H. E. Herren is first assistant. These two officers will be mounted. J. S. Stiles of Eugene, will be one of the Fair policemen, too.

Captain Chas. A. Murphy is busy putting the pavilion to rights.

Mrs. Murphy has charge of the fancy work department and is getting things in shape for the arranging of exhibits.

The exhibits from Washington county, Linn county, Polk county, Marion county and Union county were on the grounds yesterday afternoon, and the State Agricultural College and Benton county exhibits were expected last night.

The Polk county exhibit is more nearly arranged than any of the others. The Marion county exhibit is also being rapidly arranged.

The decorations are being rapidly put in place, and the general effect promises to be very good in the main pavilion.

The State Board requires the service of a young man or a young lady to attend the long distance telephone at the grounds. Any one desiring the place should see President Downing at the grounds between 9 and 10 o'clock today.

President W. H. Downing has his family on the ground camping now.

There is a greater demand for ground space on the grounds this year than ever before known. The fair business has been cut out and nothing that has not a semblance of legitimacy at least can get an opportunity to show on the grounds this year. There are a lot of things coming some of which are already on the grounds and ready for business.

The flags are flying over the main pavilion and the judges' stand at the race course.

All the harness horses are now at the grounds that will take part in the races this year it is said, but there will be an influx of runners on Sunday from Portland.

Frank Lee of Portland, one of the members of the State Board, is on the grounds prepared to take charge of the poultry department. None of the exhibits in this department are here yet, but there will be a large number here today and tomorrow. The poultry stand has been fitted up in an excellent manner.

Portland Enthusiastic.

Regarding the meeting to be held last night at Portland the Evening Telegram said:

"There will be a big earnest and enthusiastic meeting of Portland's business men at the rooms of the Commercial Club this evening, when arrangements are to be made for Portland participation at the State Fair at Salem, September 15 is to be Portland day at the Capital City, and there is every where felt a disposition to make the day worthy of Oregon's Metropolis. The Southern Pacific has made a special car for the round trip, and this includes admission to the Fair Grounds."

"Everything has been done to make this the occasion of a mammoth excursion to the Capital, and if the spirit of tonight's meeting is carried out, the Southern Pacific's rolling stock will be taxed to the limit to carry the crowds. This company is making every preparation to carry the prospective multitude. So much is the case that the Oregon Development League has been obliged to forego its League on Oregon meeting from the 16th till September 23, in order not in any way to interfere with the railway company in carrying out its plans to accommodate the Portland visitors to the State Fair on Portland day."

FIXED EXHIBIT

PROPOSITION TO MAKE A PERMANENT EXHIBIT OF PRODUCTS OF THIS COUNTY

Meets With General Approval and Should Have the Attention of the Salem Commercial Club With a View to Showing Local Resources.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Editor Statesman: In view of the approaching Lewis and Clark Fair, at Portland, notwithstanding all of the state will no doubt have creditable exhibits of their agricultural and horticultural resources on display there, would it not be a good idea for Marion county to install some kind of a permanent exhibit here in Salem, not only during the big exposition, but to remain for all time to come? It stands to reason that thousands of people will not be content to come to Portland to view the Fair and go away satisfied without seeing some more of the state, and they will without doubt take a side trip to the Capital City, and the Capital City should be prepared to entertain them when they do come. Most any place would do to make a display of this kind is seems to me, just so it is centrally located and convenient.

PROGRESS.

Strange coincidence. An enterprising citizen strolled into the Statesman editorial rooms yesterday afternoon and offered a suggestion upon which an article of news could be based. A news-writer is always open to suggestions and is invariably pleased to receive them, especially so upon this occasion, since, news being an exceedingly scarce article at this season of the year, he was in the very act of making a diligent search of his "thought factory" for an idea, when this "citizen" put in an appearance. Therefore he was doubly welcome. To be brief, the suggestion which was offered was that it would be a good idea for Marion county to establish a permanent display of her resources either at the depot or some other place in the city where it would be seen by the traveling public.

That was all, but it was sufficient upon which to base a story, and so all that the news-writer needed; simply the "hunch." He started out to get some kind of an expression from some of the leading citizens of the city, bearing upon the question. Several prominent business men were interviewed and the idea seemed to strike them all about the same; favorably. These gentlemen, however, were not aware that they were talking for publication and no attention at that time was entertained of making that matter can be used thought without using any names, which cannot be construed as a betrayal of confidence. The strange part of it was, that, when the news-writer came into the office in the evening, he found upon his desk the communication which heads this article and from an entirely different party than whom furnished the suggestion originally and one who had not been approached upon the subject in any manner or form. Queer how great minds will follow up the same story, and of thought, even upon matters of this kind. Here are a few of the quotations of prominent men interviewed yesterday afternoon:

Thinks Capital Idea.

"Capital idea. The only wonder to me is that it has not been taken up before. I see an item in the Portland papers occasionally to the effect that some county has forwarded to Portland a very creditable assortment of its products to be placed on display in the Union depot. So far I have not seen which of Marion county is represented in that exhibit in any manner. There are hundreds of people who come into Portland and go south on the night train, consequently never see anything of the Capital City as they pass through enroute to California, nor of the beauties and richness of the Willamette valley. If Marion county had a display in the permanent exhibit at Portland it would undoubtedly be a good thing. Besides that there should, by all means, be some kind of an exhibit at the Southern Pacific passenger depot, arranged in the most attractive manner, for the benefit of tourists who are passing through and have no time to stop off or know very little or nothing about the vast resources of this county. It would without doubt be the means of hundreds of people who are touring the West looking for a home, to stop off and probably locate here."

S. P. Would Co-operate.

"Marion county is already about eight months behind the times in this line of progress, so far as advertising is concerned," remarked another Statesman. "Many of the counties in the state which have the reputation of being at all progressive, have had county exhibits in their depots or other public buildings several months ago, and they are, no doubt, reaping great benefit from them. There is not the slightest doubt in my mind, if the matter was presented to the Southern Pacific Company in the proper light, that provision would be made for such an exhibit at the passenger depot without the slightest hesitation. The Southern Pacific Company is just as anxious as the most public spirited man in the state of Oregon to see the population of this state, and especially the Willamette valley doubled and tripled, and the officials of that road can always be found zealous in the cause of the state when it comes to advertising. If there is not room in the depot at the present time for the accommodation of an exhibit of that character, I would be willing to wager a goodly sum that the company would make the necessary provisions in a very short space of time, if it were shown that it would be a permanent institution and would be kept up in an attractive manner the whole year round. In case there were no room to be had at the depot, it would be a very easy matter to, secure a desirable room or building conveniently located down town. By all means let us have a permanent county exhibit."

No Time Should Be Lost.

"The proper way to go about this matter," suggested another one, "is to bring it up before the Greater Salem Commercial Club and the Marion

County Court. Without doubt all of the counties of the state will have good displays of their varied resources at the Lewis and Clark Fair, and they cannot do too much to help along this undertaking which, in my opinion will be the best thing that ever happened to the state in the advertising line. This exposition, however, will be of such magnitude that a mere 'county exhibit' will be almost lost to view when the displays of the nations of the world are taken into consideration, at least they will be pretty easily forgotten or overlooked. It stands to reason there will be thousands of people who will visit Salem during the World's Fair in Portland, and especially so when they can take advantage of the new electric railway which is being projected and will be completed before the big exposition, and what will they see when they get here? That is the time when a good display of the products of the county will come in good stead and it should be, by all means, provided."

Cost Would Be Nominal.

"A permanent county exhibit of such a character as you speak," stated still another one, "it seems to me would cost the county a comparatively small amount of money. In fact I should think a magnificent display could be obtained from the exhibit of Marion's products at the State Fair this year. As I understand it, the County Court appropriated a certain sum of money to enable the superintendent of the exhibit to collect the materials for his display and also gave him the privilege of selling the exhibit after the Fair for what he could obtain from it. Of course, if he should obtain first premium at the Fair the entire exhibit will be purchased by the Lewis and Clark Exposition Commission. If not, the display would be secured at a very reasonable amount. In my opinion, this would be a good investment for the county. There would be no trouble or expense in keeping up the exhibit as the donations to it from time to time would more than be sufficient. In my opinion either the City Hall, Court House or Southern Pacific passenger depot would be the proper place for the installation of such an exhibit."

Public Opinion Solicited.

On account of the story having been sprung before it was really ripe for publication, the writer refrains from using the names of those who expressed their views, without their permission. The subject has been introduced, however, and further interviews will be obtained for publication, accompanied with the names of the parties, at another time. In the meantime, should any desire to express themselves upon the matter through the medium of the press, the columns of the Statesman are open to them, and welcome.

QUESTION IS NOT SETTLED

ALEXANDER GRANT FOUND NOT GUILTY OF VIOLATING LAW.

TIDE LANDS CASE IS DISMISSED.

Jury in Justice Court Finds That Tide Land Is Situated in State of Washington.

Says Grant Property Is Situated on the North Side of Middle Channel of Columbia River—No Appeal for State But Question Still Stands.

ASTORIA, Sept. 9.—The jury in the justice's court today found Alexander Grant not guilty of operating a seine without an Oregon fishing license. It was shown that the ground was north of the middle channel, which was defined by Congress as the boundary between the two states. The jury held Oregon had not right to levy licenses on the tide lands north of the channel. The outcome of today's decision will deprive this state of a considerable sum in license money if upheld.

Not Settled Yet.

This is the case upon which the story contained in the Statesman of several days ago was based, which involved the question of the location of the boundary line as between the two states, which has been a matter of considerable dispute for years. Had the defendant been found guilty in this case and he had sued out a writ of habeas corpus to release him from imprisonment as a penalty for the violation of the Oregon fishing laws, the question could have been carried to the federal courts and an ultimate decision arrived at regarding the location of the dividing line between the states. As the matter now stands, since the state has no appeal in a criminal case of this character, Grant stands clear of prosecution under the laws of Oregon, for violation of the fishing law and the question of the location of the boundary line between the states stands as it did in the beginning.

The only matter in which the question can now be brought to an issue and a decision arrived at which would be binding upon both states would be the institution of a suit in the federal courts, between the states for the express purpose of establishing once and for all the location of such dividing line. Another way to determine the matter definitely would be for each of the legislative assemblies of the two states at difference on the matter to appoint a commission to act as a board of arbitration. Some official action in the matter may be taken at no very distant date.

IS REAL THING

KREBS BROS.' HOP YARD WILL BE OF SERIES OF BOXING CONTESTS NEXT WEEK.

Twenty Round Go to Take Place Between Mike Kinney of Albina, and Kid Sullivan of Portland—Preliminary Bout Will Be of Six Rounds.

The big fistic mill which took place at San Francisco last month between Champion Jeffries and Jack Munroe, having been fought over and over again in the minds of the lovers of this class of sport and forgotten these latter have begun to look forward to future events in the world of sport. Nothing of great importance being scheduled in this line in the near future, the local sports have been looking forward with no little display of enthusiasm for the announcement of the boxing exhibition or sparring contest which has been rumored would take place at Krebs' hop yard in the not very remote future. It is known that arrangements were being made for this extraordinary entertainment but the announcement of the date of its occurrence has been waited anxiously.

Yesterday Conrad Krebs the manager of the firm of Krebs Bros., same to the city from the "ranch" near Brooks and stated that the was all settled and the boxing contest would be pulled off on Thursday evening, next, September 15. There will be three separate contests, the principal or main event, and two preliminary bouts, all of which will be between some of the best amateur fighting material in the Pacific Northwest. A similar fistic contest was held at the yard last season which proved a great drawing card from Portland and intermediate points, and this program of contests is said to far excel that of a year ago and will attract a correspondingly larger attendance. Special arrangements are being made for the good conduct of the affair in all respects and nothing but the orderliest kind of order will be the rule upon that occasion.

The contestants for the big event are already in training for the meeting and those of the preliminary bouts will be in perfect form and prepared to put up a "good fight." The two preliminaries will be of six rounds each, while the principal will be of twenty rounds or a "decision."

The first of the preliminary events will be a six-round bout between Frank Freeman of Oregon City, and Kid Swanson of Albina. Swanson has quite a reputation in the fistic arena, having knocked out Colly Druhot, defeated Harry Lux of Baltimore, and Jack Bird. He and Freeman have met before upon three occasions each of which resulted in a draw. This is expected to be a lively bout and will no doubt prove a great attraction.

The second preliminary will also be a six-round bout between Kid Kellp of Butte, Montana, and Young Ward of Portland. Both of these men are amateurs of no mean reputation and will doubtless give a good exhibition of the manly art when their turn comes upon the program.

The principal mill on the program will be a 20-round contest between Mike Kinney of Albina, and Kid Sullivan of Portland. Both of these combatants are out of the ordinary class of boxers or fighters and some exceedingly interesting features are expected to develop during the progress of this engagement. They have met before in the ring but not to a decision, and it is thought that this will be a go for the money, as both men are in training for the event and will do their best to protect and add fresh laurels to their reputations. Besides his bout with Sullivan upon another occasion, Kinney has met Jack Clarke of Montana, Frank Freeman of Oregon City, Kid Swanson of Albina, Andy King of Pendleton, Joe Kneisel of Astoria, "Strangler" Smith of Portland, and others, all of whom he has put "over the ropes," excepting Sullivan, while the latter has the scalps of Kid Krants of Seattle, Tommy Warren, the light-weight of the navy; Kid Hatten of Portland, Tommy Moat of Kansas City, and Joe Hammond of Philadelphia, hanging at his girdle.

IS MAKING BUNCO GAME

LEADERS OF MINERS UNION DIS-CREDIT CONFESSION OF EX-CONVICT ROMAIN.

DECLARE ROMAIN TELLS LIES

Say the Statement of the Man to Be Absurd and Without Foundation.

Say His Confession Contains Many Allegations That Can Easily Be Refuted—Some of Implicated Men Say They Can Prove Alibi.

DENVER, Sept. 10.—Leaders of the Western Federation of Miners declare that the alleged confession of Robert Romain, ex-convict, at Topeka, Kan., implicating Union leaders in the two disastrous explosions in Cripple Creek district cannot easily be refuted. "According to Romain's confession," said William D. Haywood, Secretary of the Federation, "Davis, Kennison and Parker, members of the Cripple Creek district Union Executive Committee, were with him in Cripple Creek June 6, when as he says, the final arrangements were made for the Independence depot dynamiting. As a matter of fact, the three Union leaders named were in Denver from May 23 to June 8 attending the annual convention of the Federation. Romain says McKinney was one of the leading conspirators. The absurdity of this statement must be at once apparent to any one who will consider that McKinney is the man who made the fake confession regarding the alleged conspiracy to wreck of the Florence and Cripple Creek train. Romain was either hired to make this confession or he is working a bunco game on the Colorado authorities."
