THE CITY

More School Loans Approved.—The State Land Board yesterday afternoon approved applications for loans of the state school fund, numbering thirty-five and aggregating in amount \$43,395.

Registrar Elected.—Prof. L. A. Kerr, formerly professor of sciences in Willamette University, has been elected registrar of the University and will have charge of the campus and buildings during the coming school year.

Another Irrigationist.—Upon instructions received from Governor Chamberlain, a delegateship was yesterday afternoon issued to R. F. Guerin of Portland, to the third annual convention of the Oregon Irrigation Association which will be held at Ontario, September 19 to 21, inclusive. This is in addition to the list which was published yesterday, and it is expected that another commission will issue today.

Headquarters Located.—Chairman Baker of the Republican county central committee, has secured the rooms in the Weinhart building, adjoining the city clerk's office, for the headquarters of the committee. As soon as the rooms can be arranged, Secretary Boardman will take possession and prepare for the work of the campaign. Chairman Baker says that while he considers the election of the entire Republican ticket in the county a practical certainty, he will spare no effort to make the majority larger than ever.

Miniature Midway.—Mr. E. A. Wooster arrived in this city last evening from Pocatello, Idaho, bringing the Ferris Wheel, Sampson the Great Snake, Laughing Palace, Swiss Village and the Glass Blowers, that were with the Dixie Carnival Company, who visited Salem early in July. Mr. Wooster says that the Dixie company is disbanding and the various attractions are traveling about independently. Johnny Mangles, the high diver reported to have been killed, is still making his famous leap, somewhere in Idaho, although he fell a few weeks ago and broke several fingers in striking the water. Mr. Wooster expects to bring the miniature midway to Albany last evening, but will return in time to arrange a miniature midway at the Fair.

Back From California.—Hon. P. H. D'Arey has been spending three weeks with relatives and friends in San Francisco, returning here yesterday on the morning train. He was accompanied on his trip by his two sisters, Misses D'Arey, who also returned. Mr. D'Arey reports a very delightful time at the triennial convalescence which was very largely attended. They found the heat very severe on various days. Mr. D'Arey said he had an opportunity to see the fight between Jeffries and Munroe, but was glad afterward to feel that he had not "blown" his money thereon as the prices for seats ranged from \$7.50 to \$20. He said that Market street was terribly crowded that night by people interested in the fight. The Knights Templar parade was one of the most magnificent pageants ever witnessed in the United States and it required more than three hours to pass a given point. The decorations of the streets were of a magnificence rarely seen, and presented a wonderfully handsome appearance.

Move to Albany.—Prof. Sydney Hayes and family went to Albany yesterday to locate, that being more central for Prof. Hayes, who has classes in several of the valley towns. He will continue his class here, coming from Albany for a few days of each week.

The Baby Show.—The baby show to take place at the Fair Grounds on Friday morning under the auspices of the State Fair Board will take in those children from six months to three years old. It promises to be a great feature of the Fair and will no doubt attract a great deal of attention.

Must Be Picking Hops.—Again on account of the lack of a quorum the adjourned meeting of the city council which was scheduled to take place last evening, did not materialize and it was agreed that no further attempts would be made to hold a session until the regular date, which falls upon Tuesday evening, September 20.

Bought the Star Mills.—Mr. T. N. Humphrey, of Turner, was in the city yesterday, and states that his chipping will be in operation by Thursday of this week, and that the flouring mill department will not be ready for about two weeks, then he will be ready to do custom grinding. When the mill is finished it will be an up to date mill in every respect.

Concert Last Night.—Mrs. E. Fraser's Store was packed to the sidewalk last night to hear Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges' exquisite rendition of "The Holy City," "Sing Me to Sleep," "Queen of the Earth," "Bluebell," and "I Love You Dear, and Only You," were among her beautiful songs, for which Miss Ketchum proved a sympathetic piano accompanist. A number of gentlemen,

wishing to hear the sweet singer, but feeling that they would be out of place among so much femininity within, stopped outside the door to listen, but were prevented from doing so by some young people whose loud conversation and laughter interfered with the music indoors as well as upon the walk.

Badges Stolen.—Last year the State Board of Agriculture was in possession of a number of George Silver's Badges, the officials of the Fair, but last summer some time it seems some one broke into the pavilion and stole them. The result is that the President and all the officers of the Fair this year are decorated with red ribbons bearing the name of the office each holds.

Runaway.—A young man did a very brave act yesterday afternoon, yet one that required presence of mind more than bravery. A team started to run away through Commercial street, and was headed for one of the principal stores, where a young man climbed in over the side gate of the wagon and gathered up the reins and stopped the team before any great damage was done.

Car Off the Track.—The new siding in North Salem on the track of the Salem Light & Traction Co., is on a curve and the entrance at the east end is so sharp a curve that difficulty is encountered in entering it. The result of this condition is an occasional accident. Yesterday afternoon a car No. 2 run off at the switch and delayed the other cars for some time. Another car jumped the track there in the morning.

OWNS A QUARRY

COUNTY COURT MAKES GREAT ADVANCE MOVE FOR GOOD ROADS.

Purchases Quarry on Ewald Tracts—Street Railway Company Will Extend Lines to Quarry—Cheap Transportation Promised.

The matter of road and street improvement in this county and city bids fair to meet with a simple and satisfactory solution.

County Judge J. H. Scott and Mayor Frank Water are both men interested deeply in the advancement of this county, and especially in the betterment of the roads of the county and the streets of this city, and they have had a proposition on hand and under consideration for some time which has had for its aim the supplying of good material cheaply for road construction, and street improvement. Their labors are about to fructify, it seems, in a manner eminently to their satisfaction.

The first thing necessary in the matter was a good rock supply. This rock had to be secured as far as possible from the quarry, had to be of the proper quality as to resistance of wear and tear. The County Court felt that its experiments to the south of town had been of such a character as to fully satisfy it that the rock that has been placed in use on the Liberty and Jefferson roads, and on the elements requisite for improving the roads.

Following this was the necessity of arranging a cheap system of transportation. Judge Scott then took the matter up with Manager A. Welch, of the Citizens' Light and Traction Company. Mr. Welch is one who looks into the future. He saw that Judge Scott was

willing to help along. His company had placed a very high valuation on the quarry located on the Ewald Fruit Farms. After a full discussion of the matter however, County Judge Scott purchased five acres of the land where the quarry is situated, at the nominal price of five hundred dollars, for Marion county.

There now remains the closing of the contract with the Citizens' Light and Traction Company, which will no doubt be done in a few days.

Few readers of the Statesman this morning will fail to recognize the importance of this move; just what it means to the city of Salem and county of Marion.

It means that the city of Salem will be enabled to lay macadam instead of loose "nigger heads" and muddy gravel on its streets.

It means the county roads leading into Salem can be improved in an economical manner, and it means that five years from now nearly every street in Salem and the roads for a few miles out will be usable the year round.

The intent is to build bunkers at each end of the street car line, and by an inclined track, so the rock cars, which will be specially constructed, can run up onto the top and unload automatically into the bunkers. These will be so arranged that wagons can drive under them and load automatically, also, thereby doing away with the "shovel" work which is the slowest and most unpopular of all road improvement work.

County Judge Scott in speaking of the matter yesterday said: "I consider this a great stride in street and road work and believe it means that there will be a great advance made in road conditions here. I believe that if the county delivers the crushed rock at the bunkers at the various street car terminals, say, the Fair Grounds, Asylum, Penitentiary, Yew Park, etc., that the farmers living along the roads leading away from there will haul the rock out at their own expense and lay it on the roads. I also believe that when one block has been laid down in the city, there

on the right track, and promised ready assistance.

A consideration of the matter led Manager Welch to promise to extend the electric road to the stone quarry, and to offer cheap transportation from there to the ends of the various car line branches.

Mr. Welch then told the County Judge that he would supply them power for use at the quarry at the rate of 20 cents per horse power. The present plant in use there develops 14 horsepower, and costs the county eight dollars for engine, engineer and fuel. Mr. Welch's proposition would give the county the same service for \$2.80. They would also put in tracks in the pit so that all wheel barrows would be done away with, and all rock could be delivered at the crusher in cars from any part of quarry pit. In addition, again, the county could put in electric drills and reduce the expense of drilling at least one-half.

Thus it will be seen how much of a reduction in the expense of quarrying will be made.

Now comes in the matter of transportation in connection herewith.

When the Good Roads Association wanted to secure the hauling of a few hundred yards of this rock to the Fair Grounds, a local trucking company asked \$2.50 per cubic yard for the service. This rate was finally overcome by hiring other teamsters who hauled the rock for one dollar per yard.

It costs the City of Salem today more or less 40 cents per cubic yard to haul gravel onto the streets of Salem.

Manager Welch said that his company could place this crushed rock in bunkers at either end of its line at a price not to exceed 30 cents per yard.

He also said that he could make a better rate than this to the City of Salem for delivery in the city.

Having accomplished the first object in the matter, Judge Scott next turned his attention to securing possession of the quarry. This was in the hands of the Salem Title and Abstract Company, of which Mayor Frank W. Waters is manager.
