After Road Taxes.—In the complaint sworn to by T. W. Rutherford, a road supervisor of district number 15, he accuses Joseph Zielinski, Jr., of refusing to pay his road tax, amounting to \$3, and seeks judgment for that amount with costs.

Donaldson Estate Appraised.—The estate of the late Evaline Donaldson has been appraised at \$998.87. The appraisal was made by C. F. Bishop, M. A. McCorkle and R. D. Allen, who filed their report in the Marion county probate court yesterday.

Ideline vs. Mann.—In the case of Jacob Ideline vs. Lee Mann for larceny by bailment, the court yesterday sentenced Mann to pay the sum of \$400 or languish in jail for twenty-three days, and as he has no means of paying, the prisoners will spend the time away in the city calaboose, becoming a free man again on the first day of the new year.

Administratrix Appointed.—Ellen O'Neil was yesterday appointed administratrix of the estate of her deceased husband, Michael O'Neil. The estate consists of real property in Marion county valued at \$9000, and real property located in Multnomah county valued at \$1400. Mrs. O'Neil's bond in the sum of \$1000 was approved by Judge Scott, and John McCormick, James Hunt and John Johnston were appointed to appraise the estate.

New Lightning Jerker.—Mr. J. Frank Holder arrived here yesterday from Seattle, accompanied by the superintendent of the Northwestern division of the Western Union Telegraph Co., Mr. T. R. Reid. Mr. Reid installed Mr. Holder in the local office here as manager instead of Mr. J. J. Chamberlain, who goes to Colfax, Wash., to be the manager there. Mr. Holder is a very pleasant gentleman and his family will join him here before long.

Requisition Issued.—Governor Chamberlain yesterday issued a requisition on the Governor of California for Charles Keith, who was arrested in that state charged with the crime of larceny, in having stolen a lot of cigars valued at \$550, from a car of the O. R. & N. Co. Keith's companion was F. E. Brown, who is under arrest in Portland. Keith was captured at Oakland and is now in jail there awaiting the officer who is to bring him to Oregon for trial.

Feld Costs Discharged.—The case of John Sykes, who was arrested yesterday morning on a complaint sworn out before Judge Turner by Geo. Townsend, charging him with assault and battery, came up before the court at 2 o'clock yesterday, when the counsel for the defense, Attorney Frank Holmes, effected a compromise with the counsel for the plaintiff, Attorney E. D. Horgan, whereby the defendant would pay all costs with the understanding that the case be dropped. As the private prosecutor, Geo. Townsend had no objection, the court released the prisoner on the payment of all costs, which amounted to the sum of \$21.60.

To Attend Board Meeting.—Prof. W. C. Hawley left on the afternoon train yesterday for Denver, Col., to attend a meeting of the Board of Head Managers of the Pacific Jurisdiction, Woodmen of the World, of which he is chairman. The duties of this board are many and responsible, among which is the care of the three funds of the order, over which the board, subject to the regulations of the order, has supreme control. These funds are the benefit fund, from which over \$1,000,000 are paid in each year; the general fund, out of which more than \$180,000 is expended annually, and the equalization fund, which is invested in interest-bearing securities which are in the sole custody of this board, and which now amounts to more than \$875,000. The board has various other duties. Prof. Hawley received notice by wire yesterday that he was to be the principal speaker at a great meeting at Pueblo, Col., on the night of December 12.

Rebtilds Mill.—J. P. Retzel, the hop grower of Lake Labish, is re-building his saw mill that was destroyed by fire several weeks ago.

Brey Estate Closed.—The final account of Clara F. Brey, as administratrix of the estate of William M. Brey, deceased, was yesterday approved by Judge Scott. An order was made discharging the administratrix from her trust and finally closing the estate.

Final Account Filed.—Thos. M. Brey has filed his final account in the Marion county probate court as administrator of the estate of Henry Olschlager, deceased. Objections to the account will be heard on Saturday, January 14, 1905, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Hops Quiet.—There is very little doing in the matter of hops at present, prices being rather weak and few orders. Yesterday it was reported that Martin Smith sold 40 bales at 23 1/2 cents. There are said to be from 12,000 to 16,000 bales on hands yet.

Silverton Closes Saloons.—The council of Silverton passed an ordinance on Monday evening closing the saloons of that town on Sunday. The ordinance also forbids the refilling of prescriptions on Sunday, and it is presumed Silverton is now on the dry list for one day of the week, at least.

Back From California.—Mr. H. H. Humphrey and mother, Mrs. W. J. Humphrey, of this city, and Mrs. Pence and daughter, from Des Moines, Iowa, returned to Salem Friday from a trip to San Francisco and other points of interest in California, where they enjoyed the past three weeks. They would quite frequently hunt up a shade to avoid the sun's heat.

Chemawa Has Depot.—The depot at Chemawa is well under way, and will be fully adequate for the

large passenger traffic from that point. The Southern Pacific has removed the woodwork of the Labish trestle, thus precluding any possibility of a repetition of the Lake Labish disaster of a few years ago. The long switch at Chemawa is completed, so that the view of the buildings is not obstructed by standing freight cars.

Gets Up a Peg.—S. A. Woodford, who has become quite well known to the people of Salem and in fact, of all Oregon, and who holds the position of advertising manager of the Allen & Gilbert-Ramaker Company, has been tendered a position that will take him to St. Louis, as he has accepted and will leave in about two weeks. Smith was called to examine the woman, but her mental condition was such that the doctor as well as the court desired the testimony of two or three additional witnesses before passing final judgment, so the case was continued. Mrs. Mack has been confined in the asylum in the past.

Received Painful Injury.—Billy Ivan, one of the faithful employees in Salem's street department, received a painful injury yesterday while laying him up for a few days. While working on a manhole he dropped the heavy iron lid on the top of his right foot, mashing and bruising that member in a serious manner. It is hoped he will soon recover from his mishap and that he will be attended by better fortune in the future.

Amount Was Paid.—Yesterday, Recorder J. A. Sellwood, of the A. O. U. W., paid to Mrs. Zilla M. Young, mother of young Elbert C. Young, the young man who died here on September 23, the sum of one thousand dollars. Mr. Young, it will be remembered, after graduating at the Chicago Dental College a year ago, settled in Cheyenne for the practice of his profession, was taken sick there recently, and coming home, died here a few days after his arrival.

Hunt, of Cottage Grove, were yesterday appointed by Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain as delegates to the American Forest Congress to be held at Washington, D. C., January 2 to 6, 1905. President Roosevelt is the honorary president of this congress and Hon. James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture, is the actual president.

WHAT WILL IT DO

COMING OF THE SOLONS IS BUT A MONTH HENCE, AND THINGS ARE BEING PREPARED

Some Things that Will Be Proposed to that August Body Known as the Oregon Legislature for the Good and Advancement of the State.

Now that the time for the gathering of the solons of the state or Oregon draws nigh, the state house is the scene of many activities and will soon be the scene of many changes.

The office of the state printer has been rushing work on the biennial reports of all the state officers and the many state commissions, and these will soon be ready for distribution to the members of the Legislature and to the public, in a limited number.

The secretary of state will soon be selecting the pearl handled pocket knives, the ivory paper cutters, the cut glass ink wells and other things that go to make up the excess baggage of the usual member of the Legislature on his return homeward after the session is over. The desks and the reclining chairs are being firmly screwed to the floor, the speaker's and the president's gavels are being polished up, the electric light connections are being re-examined and everything is being placed in ship shape order for the gathering of the solons, which will take place a month hence from yesterday. On the 9th of January the twenty-third Legislative Assembly will convene in general session in this city and things must be ready.

Corporation Clerk F. T. Wrightman will have to move into other quarters during the session and give up his present room to the speaker of the house. The question of committee rooms will again be a difficult one for

to give it up, claiming an option. The written lease also contained the usual stipulation that the tenants would quit and surrender up the premises, waiving notice to quit.

The important law point involved in the case is whether the waiver in the written lease by which Hurst & Hinkle agreed to vacate without the statutory thirty days' notice, is binding upon them, so as to make them the guilty of forcible detainer after the expiration of their lease. Justice Turner held that it is. Messrs. Bonham & Martin appear as attorneys for the landlord, George J. Wolfer, and Carson, Adams and Cannon for the tenants, Hurst & Hinkle. The case will be watched with interest, as the identical point involved has never been passed upon by the Oregon courts.

A. convention and its object will be to take up the study of the Bible, especially the gospels, and other subjects to be selected later by the club. The social side of the club will not be neglected, as each Friday evening, the regular meeting night of the club, the boys' department and game rooms of the Y. M. C. A. will be thrown open to the members of the club from 7 to 8:30 p. m. At one meeting in each month refreshments will be served. Any boy from 12 to 17 years of age may become a member, providing he can abide by the rules of the club.

JOINS HUSBAND New Today

MRS. JENNIE CAMERON M'ILWAIN FOLLOWS IN FOOTSTEPS OF ERRANT HUSBAND

Commits Suicide in the Council Saloon. Taking Dose of Carbolic Acid—Intoxication Was Immediate and Medical Assistance Unavailable.

About 10:30 last evening Mrs. Jennie Cameron M'Ilwain, widow of young Charles M'Ilwain, who committed suicide by taking carbolic acid on Tuesday afternoon, entered the back room at Jack Cooper's saloon, the Council, at 143 State street, and called for a drink of whiskey. She waited until the liquor was brought, Mr. Cooper waiting on her in person, when she turned to him and said that she was going to kill herself. Mr. Cooper said she had made the same threat so many times that he did not think she would do it, he threatening to search her clothes and take anything she might have in the way of poison away from her. She insisted she was going to take carbolic acid, instead of drinking the whiskey turned, to the door, threw a bottle of carbolic acid to her lips, and drank enough of it before Mr. Cooper could get hold of her to prevent. She then drank the whiskey and laid down on a sofa in the room and within five minutes was absolutely unconscious.

The alarm was given immediately and a hurry call sent for a physician and Dr. Byrd was found and came, arriving about fifteen minutes after she had taken the acid, therefore too late to do any good, as it was impossible to get her to take any sort of an antidote, she having absolutely no consciousness remaining.

turn-over to County Treasurer Richardson of money collected on the 1903 tax roll, the amount transferred being \$2426.87. Of this amount \$1199.17 was credited to the general fund; \$599.59 to the state school fund; \$158.72 to the city of Salem; and \$158.28 to school district No. 24.

The whole amount was apportioned among the various funds as follows:

Among the other things that the board of directors of the city of Salem session will be asked to do are the following:

Put in an elevator that will go up to the third floor and back the same day; divide the tennis court in the third story of the capitol building into committee rooms and offices; pay the state the amount it owes itself on the Fairgrounds mortgage; build additional asylum quarters as recommended by the superintendent of that institution; when they build a new institution for the insane and dumb school, and get that in a better district; and in more commodious quarters or enlarge the present building; to grant right of way to the Citizens' Light & Traction Co. across the state lands for the purpose of connecting the asylum avenue and the penitentiary car lines in one loop; and to do all of the other things.

Some of these things will be done at once. Whether all remains to be seen.
