Ill With Fever.
Mrs. A. J. Daniels is reported seriously ill with fever at her home, corner of Liberty and Mission streets. Her many friends, however, hope for her speedy recovery.

Adolph Estate Appraisers.
According to the report of the appraisers filed in the county court yesterday the estate of the late Mary Adolph is valued at \$2037. The estate consists of personal property only.

Articles Filed.
Yesterday the Schueler Medical Company of Mt. Angel, Marion county, filed articles of incorporation with incorporation clerk F. T. Wrightman. The company is organized for the purpose of manufacturing proprietary medicines and selling the same. The capital stock is \$100,000 and the incorporators are Fred Schueler, John J. Fischer and Paul S. Fuchs.

Fees Collected by Recorder.
The fees collected by County Recorder C. C. Siegmund during the year 1904 amounted to \$5107.90. This exceeded the total amount of fees collected in 1903 by \$911.10, the increase being partly due to the raise of fees for recording instruments made at the last special session of the Legislature. The receipts of the Marion county recorder's office during December, 1904, aggregated \$437, as against \$411.30 for the corresponding month in 1903.

Held Another Busy Session.
The county judge and commissioners held another busy session yesterday morning, and to dispose of the claim docket in order to take up the work of selecting the jury list, appointing room supervisors and examine the numerous reports, etc., to come up at this time of court. Some time was devoted yesterday to the matter of fixing the tax levy for the 1904 assessment roll but no definite action was taken.

First Alarm for 1905.
The first alarm for 1905 was issued by the Salem fire department at 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The fire department was summoned to the home of J. Olmsted, at the corner of Union and Front streets, and remained on arriving at the scene, however, it was found that a stovepipe had become dislodged, which filled the house with smoke and caused the alarm. There was no damage done.

Holds His First Session.
The trio of Japs who were taken into custody by Officer James Lewis on the Wednesday afternoon, while in a state of intoxication, appeared in the police court yesterday morning and were each fined \$5 each by City Recorder W. A. Moore. They cheerfully paid their fines and were released. George Clark, recently appeared before the recorder on the charge of begging, and was given two and one-half days in the city jail. These were the first cases up before the Salem's new police judge and the proceedings were carried on by him with all the dignity of an old time magistrate.

Leg Broken.
Miss McIntosh, a sister-in-law of Mr. McDonald of the Oregon Nurseries, was injured a few days before Christmas that while Allison, cause that day to remain indoors footed some time to come. While walking on an elevated platform in one of the nursery buildings she missed her footing and stepped to the ground. She struck fairly upon her feet but with such force that her leg was broken just above the ankle, the broken edge of the bone protruding through the flesh. Miss McIntosh is progressing very nicely at the home of Mr. McDonald, where she was taken when the accident occurred.

Mutton Shipped North.
Two thousand and four fine, fat mutton sheep were sent away from Salem yesterday by J. D. Denmore, the livestock buyer. A train of eighteen stock cars carried them towards Portland, where they were transferred to the Northern Pacific track and continued on their way to Puget Sound points and other markets of the North. This

shipment was the largest of its kind ever made from Salem and the sheep came from fifty miles of Oregon's capital. It was an interesting sight yesterday forenoon to view the sheep as they were rounded up on the circus grounds just east of the Southern Pacific passenger depot. The "muttons" were in excellent condition for marketing.

They Celebrated.
Yesterday afternoon Day Officer James Lewis found three of the little brown men who have become the admiration of the world by their wonderful prowess on the field of battle, on Liberty street celebrating the grand victory gained by their compatriots over the Russians at Port Arthur, in a very hilarious manner. They had found a goodly quantity of the noise extract and "talk liquid" and had mixed them up in such a manner as to make the usual term "Bome how!" inexpressive. However, when they were finally lined up in the front of one of them was heard to remark "too much talk, no blood." This sentiment was indulged in unanimously by them and Officer Lewis and the attendant bystanders, and they were then dropped over the side into the refrigerator room, where they will probably awake this morning to a stern realization of what their brothers are undergoing in Siberia without a fire.

About Fire Alarms.
The boys of the Salem Fire Department want the Statesman to give attention to the matter of giving in fire alarms. There is no regular fire alarm system, so the telephone is used. At the central office there is a number that is never used excepting in case of a fire alarm. When you discover a fire, the first thing for you to do is to go to the nearest telephone and call up the central office and say you want to turn in a fire alarm. You will get immediate attention. But in turning in the alarm be sure to state where the fire is—on what street and between what streets.

"I am sorry to see one of Marion county's Senators holding out against the majority of the Republicans," said a prominent farmer of this county yesterday evening, "especially when the friends of the majority candidate in the Senate, Marion county wants and demands a great deal of legislation this year, and I was very much in hopes the Marion county delegation in both houses would be in shape to aid in securing this legislation. I especially want to see the indebtedness wiped off the State Fair grounds and buildings and that institution receive the legislation necessary to put it on a greater work. I feel strongly on this matter that I think every Marion county member should work with a view to securing this legislation, and I think getting the legislation we need for some man or other for the presidency of the Senate, especially when that man is in the minority."

Another Salem business man said: "Salem wants to see a new building for the state deaf mute school, and many other appropriations. It wants to see the block of land east of the Capitol building purchased by the state and made a part of the Capitol grounds and it seems this legislation is of much interest to this city, and therefore worth making an effort to get. I doubt if these things will come easily as the effects of a hold-up in either body. These things come through a mutual effort to legislate. They come through a vote, and not by holding street, give the name of some prominent place near where the fire is. This will help the fire department boys to go immediately to the fire, without driving out of their way and losing time."

ABOUT PAVING.

Editor Statesman:
I agreed with Messrs. Gesner and Brown that suitable brick will make a good pavement. Ordinary brick such as are usually put into a building will make a poor one. I do not know that it is or is not possible to here get the best paving brick. It would be folly to use other, and I suspect difficult if not impossible to get a superior article. Our streets with the mud cleaned off occasionally, and otherwise cared for, would not be so bad as we seem to think. They are sadly neglected. We can have no kind of street that will take care of itself, or upon which more or less mud will not accumulate in wet weather.

THREE VERDICTS

TWO PLAINTIFFS AND ONE DEFENDANT WIN SUITS IN JUDGE BURNETT'S COURT.

Salem Justice Court Is Sustained, Stayton Court Reversed—F. Levy Gains Possession of 290 Acres of Land and Is Awarded One Dollar Damages.

The case of Appolonia and N. J. Gehlen, as joint administrators of the estate of Theo. Gehlen, deceased, vs. John McKinney, was tried before a jury in Judge Burnett's court yesterday with the result that a verdict was returned in favor of the defendant. The plaintiffs brought suit against Mr. McKinney in the Stayton justice court to recover the sum of \$33.97, the alleged value of grain received by the defendant from Theo. Gehlen, and the case was tried before Justice of the Peace W. H. Queener, of September 8, 1904, which resulted in a decree rendered in favor of the plaintiffs for judgment in the amount sued for.

The defendant claimed that a full settlement for the grain sacks had been made with Mr. Gehlen prior to his decease, and being dissatisfied with the decree rendered by Justice Queener, he appealed the case to the circuit court with the result as stated above. Attorneys Bonham & Martin conducted the case for the joint administrators, and Geo. G. Bingham looked after the interests of Mr. McKinney.

The case of F. Levy vs. T. Aufranc was also tried by jury, the verdict being in favor of the plaintiff, one dollar being allowed as damages. This action was brought by Levy to gain possession of 290 acres of land located in townships 7 and 8 south, range 1 west, of which he claimed to be the owner, and the possession of which he alleged the defendants, Multnomah; Hermann; Newell, of Washington.

Committee on permanent organization—Bailey, of Multnomah; Edwards, of Lane, and Huntley, Clackamas. House adjourned till 2:30 p. m.

House, Afternoon.
Temporary Chairman Miles called the house to order at 3 o'clock.

The committee on credentials submitted its report, which contained the names of all members of the house. The report was adopted on the motion of Carter, of Benton county.

The members of the house were sworn in by Chief Justice Wolverton at 3:10 p. m.

The committee on organization then submitted its report, which recommended the election of a speaker of the house and to fill the necessary clerical positions.

The committee on order of business recommended that the rules governing the session of the house of 1903 be adopted, which was adopted.

A. L. Mills, of Multnomah county, was nominated for speaker of the house by Bailey, of Multnomah, who spoke highly of his efficiency and integrity. W. L. Blakely, of Umatilla county, was nominated for speaker by Smith, of Josephine, who admitted his candidate had no show of being elected and that his nomination was merely to show the respect in which he is held by the Democratic members and that the organization of the party still existed.

A. L. Mills was elected as speaker of the house by a full Republican vote. Mr. Kay, of Marion county, and Mr. Holcomb, of Multnomah, escorted Mr. Mills to the chair.

Cornett, of Linn county, nominated for chief clerk of the house W. Lair Thompson. As he was the only candidate for the position his election was unanimous and he was duly declared chief clerk of the house.

C. M. McArthur, of Perry, Polk county, a grandson of the late Senator Nesmith, was nominated and elected by a unanimous vote to serve as reading clerk.

James Finch, of Marion county and formerly of the Journal, was nominated for his request for a decree granting him possession of the premises. Mr. Levy asked that he be awarded general damages in the sum of \$500, and special damages to the amount of \$750.

Carson, Adams & Cannon appeared as attorneys for the plaintiff and Bigger & Corby for the defendant.

A third case tried before a jury in the circuit court yesterday was that of George J. Wolfer vs. W. S. Hurst and H. A. Hinkle. The plaintiff in this case brought ejectment proceedings in the Salem justice court against the defendants for the purpose of gaining possession of a hop yard, located near Hubbard, which the latter were holding under a lease the term of which had expired, but which contained a clause to the effect that if all things were agreeable between the parties interested the lease would be extended. The plaintiff received a favorable verdict, and the defendants appealed with the result that a verdict was again rendered in favor of the former.

CORTELYOU TO TOUR EUROPE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—George B. Cortelyou, chairman of the National Republican Committee, and Mrs. Cortelyou are here this evening for a six weeks' trip through Southern Europe.

Cortelyou expects to return to Washington in time for the inauguration and enter upon his duties as Postmaster General immediately thereafter.

The exhibit which Missouri will send to the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be one that could not be duplicated for \$300,000. It will consist of the cream of Missouri's display at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, supplemented by an elaborate display collected for the Western World's Fair.

COURT CONVENES.

Several Defendants Arraigned Before Judge Burnett Upon Criminal Charges.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)
Judge George H. Burnett yesterday convened the regular January term of department No. 1 of the state circuit court for Marion county. The jurors who are to serve during the term were all sworn in with the execution of Geo. C. Will, John A. Darr and Wm. Brown, who were excused from duty as exempt firemen.

Henry Carmody was arraigned upon the charge of selling liquor to a minor. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50, which amount he liquidated to Sheriff Culver and was released from custody. He was also arraigned upon the charge of selling liquor without a license but this case was continued until the next regular term of court.

F. E. Talkington pleaded guilty to having sold liquor on election day and was required by Judge Burnett to pay a \$25 fine.

Sam Zuercher was arraigned upon the charge of larceny from an office and Arthur Farrow for obtaining money by false pretences.

The case of J. H. Penland vs. The Southern Pacific Company, an action for damages, has been settled and will therefore not come up for a second trial. In the first trial the jury failed to agree. This case was the result of the accident in which Mrs. Penland lost her life by being crushed between the freight cars at the intersection of Commercial and Trade streets.

After making a number of docket entries Judge Burnett adjourned court until 9 o'clock this morning, when the case of the State of Oregon vs. J. C. Ryan will come up for trial.
