THE CITY

(From Wednesday's Daily.) Iron Purchased.—It is said that the iron for the railway to extend from Mebama to the mines on the North Santiam has been purchased and that it will be sent to that place before long.

Crittendon Home Report.—The trustees of the Florence Crittendon Home at Portland, filed their biennial report yesterday with the Governor, showing an expenditure of \$5145.40, and \$854.60 on hand January 9.

For Their New Organ.—The First Methodist church of this city is soon to have a very fine new pipe organ in their church, to cost about \$2500. Over two thousand dollars of the amount is already subscribed, and the work of installation, it is said, will soon be commenced.

An Addition.—W. S. Lowe is preparing for an addition to the Capital stables, on the corner of High and Perry streets. It will be added to the rear of the present building, and will make this one of the largest stables in the state.

New Veterinary Surgeon.—Dr. C. J. Korinek, veterinary surgeon and dentist, has located in Salem, and will have his headquarters at the Capital stables of W. S. Lowe. Dr. Korinek is a graduate of Ontario Veterinary College. He is an honorable member of the Ontario Medical Society. He comes directly from Cottage Grove, this state, and will no doubt build up a good practice.

To Hear Final Accounts.—James H. Penland yesterday filed his final account in the Marion county court as administrator of the estate of Frances B. Penland, deceased. Judge Scott fixed February 4, at 2 o'clock p. m., as the time for hearing objections to the same. The hearing of the final account of Lydia Campbell as administratrix of the estate of Sarah Wheeler, deceased, was set for Monday, February 13, at 2 p. m.

Hop Market Active.—The telegram last night said: Hop dealers are buying a good deal among themselves on a basis of 28 cents, and yesterday Schurer & Co., of Butteville, sold 1000 bales to London brewers for 25 cents. This does not indicate a strong market, as was hoped for when the holidays had passed, but rather shows that speculators are tired of paying interest and waiting for a substantial advance. Growers who have been holding on all the time do not seem to be discouraged yet, and it is quite likely that several thousand bales will remain in first hands until spring at least, unless hops should advance to the prices hoped for.

(From Thursday's Daily.) One Appointment.—Governor Chamberlain yesterday appointed Chas. Edgar Mills, of New York, a commissioner of deeds for Oregon.

Fifteen Minute Service Established.—The Citizens' Light & Traction Company has improved its service very materially on State street by putting an extra car thereon, and now there is a car every fifteen minutes on that line from Commercial street to the penitentiary. The company is improving its service generally as fast as is possible.

New Suits Filed.—Two new suits were filed in department No. 1 of the circuit court yesterday both being actions for money. One is entitled Geo. E. Brev vs. A. C. Brev, and was brought for the purpose of recovering \$1314.80, the principal and interest alleged to be due on a promissory note executed by the defendant to the plaintiff on January 10, 1890. Bonham & Martin appear as attorneys for the plaintiff. In the other, Jane McGuire appears as the plaintiff and Charles Scott and Robert Scott, doing business under the firm name of Woodburn Mill

SOME KIND WORDS. A Chicago Editor Speaks Highly of Willamette University's Dean.

The Willamette Collegian has the following: In the Fine Arts Journal of Chicago for December, 1904, the editor, Mrs. Marian A. White, says editorially of Dean W. C. Hawley in reference to his work at the Willamette Valley Chautauqua at Gladstone during its session of 1904:

"Beneath the interlacing branches of oak and pine, Prof. Willis Chatman Hawley, A. M., LL. B., one of the instructors in Willamette University, might be found each morning with his large and interesting class in United States history. Prof. Hawley is a type—and although not born in the northwest, he has been there long enough to imbibe the big and broad spirit characterizing the people of this section. His lectures on United States history would make him famous wherever delivered, whether in the narrow confines of hall or auditorium, or, as in this instance, in nature's temple. Prof. Hawley uses no notes; his subject is too much a part of himself to need a prompter. His impressive personality, his resonant voice, his clear erudition, are qualifications that entitle him to rank with the finest orators and instructors in the country. We have heard this same subject again and again treated by many and varied instructors and lecturers, university men of note and significance in their profession, but in this man of the northwest, vigorous in his physique and a master of his subject, is as unique among his brethren in the profession as this side of the Rockies as the latter deliver in grandeur and majesty from anything of like creation on this vast continent. It is as implicitly, his loyalty to the tradition of his country, his glad, hopeful spirit regarding the future of the nation that arouses a response in the hearts of the audience. Not a boastful word, not an effort to catch the gallery, is Prof. Hawley's American visible, while every now and again a vein of humor characterizes his speech, which at once communicates itself to and influences the audience. He has barely reached manhood's prime, yet as the northwest in his possession a man who has become to this section of the country just what Gladstone, the commoners of England—a power from the platform. Prof. Hawley is president of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association, and apart from his regular lectures he was heard from the platform as its presiding officer, the same dignity of bearing, the same erudition and refined humor characterizing all his speeches of introduction of the faculty and the lecturers comprising the Chautauqua program."

FOUND GUILTY

TWO CONVICTIONS SECURED IN CIRCUIT COURT BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY McNARY.

Ben Jarrett is sentenced to serve six months in County Jail for larceny—Carl Long convicted of assault and battery, will be sentenced Friday.

(From Wednesday's Daily.) Ben Jarrett, a negro vaudeville dance artist, was yesterday found guilty of simple larceny by a jury in the circuit court. Jarrett, on December 22, stole two pairs of trousers from the office of Dr. W. C. Smith in the McCormack block, also a bicycle from Harry Bosler, of this city, and when arrested the stolen property was found in his room. The negro had been brought to Salem as a performer on the Edison circuit and was doing turns nightly at the Edison theater at the time the theft was committed.

In the information filed against him by District Attorney McNary, Jarrett was charged with the crime of larceny from an office, and it was that crime for which he was tried, so when the jury found him guilty of simple larceny Judge Burnett did not hesitate to express his surprise as well as his disapproval of the verdict. However, the convicted negro waived time and was sentenced to serve six months in the Marion county jail.

Carl Long, the young man who on October 31 made a brutal assault upon Henry Cameron, a laborer at Butteville, was also tried before a jury yesterday afternoon upon the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, but was found guilty of assault and battery. This verdict, too, came as a surprise, since the testimony of two eye-witnesses, James Ryan and Willie Saunders, showed conclusively that the assault made by Long upon Cameron was not only brutal, but most cowardly.

DOING THE WORK

THE NEWLY ELECTED OFFICIALS OF THE CITY HAVE STARTED IN RIGHT.

Are Making Salem Unpleasant for Hobos and Tramps Generally—New Recorder and Marshal Working Nicely Together, With Good Support.

(From Wednesday's Daily.) William O'Brien, who had just completed a sentence of two and one half days in the city jail for drunkenness, was again sentenced to serve five days on a similar charge by Recorder Moores yesterday morning.

O'Brien was run in by Officers Lewis and Murphy on Monday evening. Ed. Lang is also once more behind the bars. He loaded up on firewater yesterday forenoon and soon fell into the hands of Marshal Cornelius and Officer Lewis, who escorted him back to his old quarters. He had an interview with Judge Moores last evening and the result was that Lang received a five-days' sentence, and the police were instructed to put him to work this morning.

Since Recorder Moores has been installed as judge of the police court the old records and the hoboes have not been far from overly well. Judge Moores has fully made up his mind that Salem's city jail shall not be looked upon as a "summer resort" and although he is inclined to be lenient on a first offense, when a man comes up the second time he may as well prepare for the "worst." For this Salem's new recorder is to be commended and it is hoped he will continue to make things extremely tropical for the element that makes police officers necessary.

Marshal Cornelius and his men are doing splendid work and are keeping the city remarkably free from vagrants and floaters. It is evidently the purpose of Mr. Cornelius to rid Salem of the idle and worthless class and some interesting police work along this line may be looked for. STAYTON, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—F. M. McDaniel, familiarly known as "Uncle Frank," died during Sunday night at the City Hotel. His death came so quietly that those who were waiting with him failed to notice the change, and did not discover until 4 o'clock Monday morning that he had passed away. FIRE DESTROYS DWELLING.

Stayton Is Visited by Consuming Element With Destructive Results. STAYTON, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Fire broke out Sunday morning in the residence of A. L. Shelley of this city, and the building and its contents narrowly escaped being burned to the ground. Mrs. Shelly and two daughters were at church and Mr. Shelley, who is nightwatch at the Brown saw mill, was in bed asleep and the flames burst out through the roof before the fire was discovered.

The fire company responded to the alarm with all possible speed and did excellent work: The furniture, carpets, etc., were all saved, with the exception of one carpet which caught fire and burned after it was carried out. The building was saved, but is badly damaged, and presents a charred and blackened appearance. Just how the fire originated is not known, but is supposed to have caught from the chimney. Several were so overcome by heat and exhaustion that they were forced to give up and lie down.
