OREGON DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE PERFECTLY ORGANIZED FOR STATE'S UPBUILDING.

Its Sole Object is Advancement of Oregon-Wields Mighty Power-Will Convene in Portland April 26 and 27 -Will Be Representative Gathering.

PORTLAND, April 5.-Waen delegates to the annual convention of the Oregon Development League gather in Portland April 26 and 27, the promoters expect the combination to represent one of the most powerful human machines ever organized for the industrial development of a state. It will be a convention of scattered interests and diversified opinions, but an industrial machine wielding a mighty power and with but one purpose, that of the advancement of Oregon. Last year, when the convention was

called, the purpose was vague, the polcy yet to be formulated, and the work to be discussed, together with the methods. But after a year of active service the league is now operating like a well-regulated clock, and every man fits into the niche provided for him. The work of the convention and its purposes have been gradually evolv ing during the past year, and are now well developed. From every section of the state will come delegates appointed by the local leagues, and these will join in the state body in pushing still further forward the aggressive campaign of Oregon development which has been waxing strong during the past

All the various industries which have intributed to the growth will receive attention from the league. The two days' work will be divided into sections comprising the principal industries of the state. Men of national and state prominence will be secured to deliver the addresses to these various sections, so that there will be no loss of time.
