Traffic Heavy.
The southbound passenger yesterday morning was late, owing to the unusually heavy travel. There were extra sleepers in the train and all were crowded.

Fees Collected in May.
The receipts of the Marion county clerk's office during the month of May aggregated \$246.15. Of the fees collected by Clerk Roland amounts were credited to the several accounts as follows: Circuit court, \$109.50; probate court, \$32; marriage licenses, \$45.75; miscellaneous fees, \$58.90.

Appraisers File Report.
The appraisers appointed to appraise the property belonging to the estate of the late Henry Nicolas Thiesen, and which is located in Multnomah county, filed their report in the Marion county court yesterday. The property consists of real estate in and near Portland, and its value was placed at \$4425. The appraisal was made by P. C. Malcolm, Arthur P. Tift and J. C. Moreland of Portland.

Big Business Increase.
The Spaulding Lumber Company is now doing an enormous business. Great quantities of lumber are being shipped to different cities, and the home trade is unusually strong. The mill is now running day and night, on account of the great demand for lumber, the night run being made to give the planers a chance to catch up, as they are overcrowded with the lumber sawed during the day, and therefore the planers are run alone during the night, while both planers and saws are run during the day.

Local Representative.
Prof. W. J. Crawford of Zena, Polk county, president of the Willamette Valley Prune Association, was a passenger on the overland train last evening for Roseburg, where he went to attend a meeting of the Umpqua Prune Association. About one-fourth of the stock in that association is held by members or the local prune association, and Prof. Crawford will represent the local stockholders at that meeting. The Umpqua association is in a very prosperous condition in spite of the low prices which have prevailed for prunes. H. S. Gile of Salem is manager, and his brother, Robert Gile, the local manager at Roseburg.

Paul Johnson, the youngest son of G. W. Johnson of this city, met with a serious mishap while riding a bicycle near the state house yesterday morning. A bump in the path caused the fork of the wheel to break, throwing the rider to the ground with sufficient force to break both bones of his left arm just above the wrist. Several people who happened to be near rushed to the young man's assistance, who at first seemed stunned by the fall, but soon recovered sufficiently to be taken to his home. The fracture was reduced by Dr. W. C. Smith, and it is hoped the injury will leave no bad effects and that the unfortunate young man will soon recover.

ENTER PROTEST

PATRONS OF LINCOLN SCHOOL REQUEST REINSTATEMENT OF THREE LADY TEACHERS.

Resignations of Misses Maud Myers, Grace Bellinger and Bessie Smith said to have been presented by Request of School Directors.

A meeting was held by the patrons of the Lincoln school at the Leslie M. E. church in South Salem last evening for the purpose of taking steps toward securing the reinstatement of the Misses Maud Myers, Grace Bellinger and Bessie Smith as teachers in the school. Jessie May was elected chairman of the meeting and E. O'Flynn acted in the capacity of secretary. The matter of the resignation and reinstatement of the three teachers was discussed at length and the discussion was followed by the unanimous adoption of a resolution requesting the reinstatement of the ladies to their former positions.

At a recent meeting of the board of school directors the resignations of the Misses Myers, Bellinger and Smith were acted upon and accepted. It is claimed by those who were in attendance at the South Salem meeting last evening that the three ladies had filed their applications for re-election as teachers in the Salem school for the coming school year, but that resignations were written out and handed them by a member of the board of directors on the day of the board meeting, which they were asked to and did sign by request. The patrons of the Lincoln school claim this was an unfair proceeding and unjust to the teachers in the Salem school and they desire to have the board reconsider its action in the matter.

The resolutions adopted follow: "Whereas, for several years last past Misses Maud Myers, Grace Bellinger and Bessie Smith have been employed as teachers in the public schools of Salem, and

"Whereas, each of those ladies has displayed great ability, efficiency and competency in the discharge of her duties, and

"Whereas, each of those ladies has resigned her position as teacher in said school, such resignation having been secured in a manner that was unfair to them individually and unjust to them professionally, and

"Whereas, it has been learned that there are still vacancies upon the teaching staff of the public schools of this city, and

"Whereas, we believe that it would be impossible to fill those positions more acceptably than has been done in the past by those three ladies,

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by the patrons of Lincoln school in this meeting assembled, that we request the school directors of this district to reinstate these ladies to their former positions in the Lincoln school without prejudice to their good name and standing."

A committee consisting of John Bayne, J. A. Carson, L. H. McMahon, Lee W. Acheson and Mrs. E. W. Brown was appointed to appear before the board of school directors in behalf of the three lady teachers named.

The following resolution was also adopted, censuring the directors for refusing the South Salem school patrons the use of the Lincoln school building for the purpose of holding a meeting to discuss school matters:

"Whereas, the patrons of Lincoln school have been unable to procure the use of the school building for the purpose of discussing school matters, and a number of the members of the board refused to give the use of the school building as aforesaid,

"Resolved, therefore, that we, the patrons of Lincoln school hereby protest against such refusal and censure the members of the board of directors who refused to allow or consent to the use of the school building for the purpose aforesaid."

CHANGES TO BE EFFECTED.

Will Greatly Enlarge the Normal Department of Willamette University.

The demands of the times are creating some changes in Willamette university and many improvements are contemplated, but none of these improvements are farther reaching in extent than the increasing of the facilities in the normal department. Prof. W. H. Mahaffie, Ph. D., has been elected principal, and he will be ably assisted by Miss Mary E. Reynolds. Prof. Mahaffie has had wide experience in educational work, and is thoroughly familiar with modern normal instruction.

Prof. Reynolds is too well known in Oregon to need any mention here. It is the purpose of the university to make this department up to date in every particular, and thus to furnish to those desiring to prepare themselves for the profession of teaching an opportunity to get their preparation under the most favorable conditions.

The facilities and atmosphere of a university are a considerable factor in a teacher's training, and when added to the influence of Christian instructors and Christian surroundings, there is furnished ideal conditions for developing ideal teachers.

COMING ON LATE

INDICATIONS ARE THAT HOP HARVEST WILL BE IN LATTER PART OF SEPTEMBER.

This will Delay 1905 Crop Until Late October in Getting Into Brewers' Hands, Forcing Them to Use 1904 Crop For Five Months Longer.

Judging from the contents of letters being received by the different parties in this city from all over the coast and the East, the indications are that the 1905 crop will not only be considerably short of last year, but it will be very late for harvest, probably not until late in September, which will mean that this year's crop will not get into the brewers' hands until the latter part of October. This being the case, the brewers will be compelled to run upon the 1904 crop for nearly five months yet.

A telegram has been received by a private party in this city from Coos Bay, N. O., which reads: "Hop backward. Cold weather and frosts. Crop estimate, 80 per cent last year." This same source states that this means, with favorable weather, they will raise about 50,000 bales; but the weather may continue unfavorable, and there may be a repetition of 1903, when New York state only raised 25,000 bales. Last year New York state had a large crop, and the history of the hop industry there shows that a large crop is always followed by a small one.

The following is an excerpt from a letter which has been received in this city from a large California grower; it is self-explanatory: "Sacramento county will not grow as many as last year, and I think Yuba county will not, even counting the new acreage. We now estimate the crop at 50,000 bales in this state; Sonoma county at not over 15,000 bales, as against 19,000 last year. There is not one good yard in this whole county. Some yards will not produce anything to speak of; others will go the whole way to the acre. At the Russian river, in Sonoma county, the most favorable spot for hops in the county, the yards will be over one-third short. Growers along Mark West creek have not as yet commenced to tie up (first training on twines); they have nothing to tie up. There are yards all along Santa Rosa creek which are as barren as a croquet ground. If the unfavorable weather continues, they will get less than a half-crop. Advice just received from Ukiah says that hops in Mendocino county do not look well. Hops are three to four weeks backward in growth, consequently picking will not begin before September in this state."

REPORT SHOWS INCREASE.

Privileges of Salem Public Library Are Embraced by Great Number of Readers.

The librarian's report of the Salem public library shows an increase in the number of readers of that of any preceding month. During the 31 days of last month 1,559 people took advantage of the opportunities offered by this institution in using the reading rooms of the library. Twenty new members were added to the roll, and 875 loans were made. Eighty-two new books were purchased, but only thirty-five gifts were received.
