

HOLD THE CLAIM

C. F. CANDIANI AND OTHERS RE-
TAIN POSSESSION OF VALU-
ABLE DOCTOR LODGE MINE.

Only Required to Adjust Boundary
Lines to Exclude Louise and Lucky
Boy Mines—Margaret Busch Secures
Affirmation of Judgment.

Five opinions were rendered by the supreme court yesterday morning, one of which was a reversal, another a modification of decree and the other three affirmations. In an opinion of which Justice Moore is the author, the case of Frank C. Candiani et al, appellants, vs. C. F. Candiani et al, respondents, is remanded for a modification of the judgment entered by Judge Hamilton of the circuit court of Lane county.

This is a suit to determine the possession of the Doctor Lodge mine, situated in the Blue River mining district, in Lane county. The Doctor Lodge was filed upon as a mining claim by the plaintiffs, Candiani et al, who obtained a patent upon it from the United States government. The first filing was found defective and invalid because the applicants failed to observe the strict provisions of the law, which prescribes that a prospector's shaft must be sunk upon the claim to a depth of ten feet before the expiration of ninety days after date of filing. When the applicants found that their claim had been forfeited by reason of this oversight, they re-filed upon the claim and fulfilled all the requirements of the law upon that occasion and secured a patent from the government.

The defendants, Sharkey et al, are the owners of the Louise and Lucky Boy mine No. 4, respectively, and when the plaintiffs sunk a shaft upon their claim they discovered a rich lode of gold, whereupon the defendants discovered that the lines described in the plaintiff's claim took in part of their claim, and this suit was brought to annul the Doctor Lodge claim. The lower court held in favor of the plaintiffs and the defendant appealed. The supreme court holds that the abandonment of the claim was rather due to ignorance of the law on the part of the applicants than intent, and that since they ultimately secured a patent to the claim it must be recognized, but, inasmuch as the lines of the Doctor Lodge claim extend over the other two claims, they must be altered so as to exclude the Louise and Lucky Boy mining claims, and the decree is sent back for this modification.

Should Have Corrected Error.

In reversing the decree of Judge Robert Zakin, the case of W. J. Woods, respondent, vs. the Oregon Short Line Railroad Company, appellant, Justice Bean holds that the lower court erred in refusing to grant permission to correct an error or omission in the transcript on appeal and in dismissing the appeal. This was a case in which the plaintiff sued for and obtained a decree of damages for \$249.50 for the killing of an animal. The defendant company took an appeal from the decision of the justice court, but when the transcript was filed in the circuit court it was discovered afterward that some of the papers had been omitted. The defendant asked permission to supply the deficiency, whereupon the court ruled that it had no authority to do anything in such cases except to dismiss the appeal, which it did.

Is Entitled to Damages.

Margaret Busch, respondent, vs. John P. Robinson, appellant; from Umatilla county; W. R. Ellis, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Wolverton.

This is an action in which the plaintiff, an employee of the defendant, while at work in the laundry, lost her footing on account of a knobhole in a defective platform and fell, her right hand being thrust into the mangle machine and badly injured. She sued the defendant for damages on the ground of negligence and the defendant appealed on the ground of contributory negligence.

Other Opinions Rendered.

Mary Kemp, respondent, vs. Joseph W. Brown and the county of Polk; appellants; from Polk county; R. P. Boise, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Bean.

This was a suit for the location of a public road or gateway from the residence of the plaintiff, through and upon the premises of the defendant Brown, to Gulway. The plaintiff was given a judgment by the trial court and the defendant appealed.

Joseph W. Brown, appellant, vs. Mary Kemp and Mary Kemp, executrix of the estate of F. A. Kemp, deceased, respondent; from Polk county; R. P. Boise, judge. Opinion by Justice Bean. This was an action to determine the ownership or to quiet title to the Hooker donation land claim in Polk county, aggregating 680 acres of land.

MIMIC WARFARE NOW ON.

RUSSIA'S DARK DAYS CLOSE.

Emperor Nicholas Issues Ukase Authorizing Extension of Legislative Bodies.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 12.—The Russian experiment in parliamentarism will begin in September. The Associated Press is now in a position to make this positive announcement. The emperor has already given his approval to the scheme, now being finally formally reviewed by the council of state, for a legislative body consisting of a lower

house, called the gosudarstvennaya дума (the imperial дума) and an upper house, the gosudarstvennaya soveta, or the present council of the emperor, with power to formulate legislation, discuss budgets, interpolate ministers, etc., but reserving in the emperor's own hands final authority. An election will take place during the coming summer. Although the scheme clings with desperation to the emperor's autocracy, it marks the beginning of the end. The die, once cast, there can be no retreat, and the quasi parliamentary regime, which will be inaugurated, will prove to be only a transitory bridge over which absolutism must cross to constitutionalism.

CAUGHT AT LAST

ROSWELL P. FLOWER BOBS EM-
PLOYER'S TILL AND IS AR-
RESTED BY SHERIFF.

Young Man Falls Into Trap and Steals
Marked Coin, Which Is Found in His
Possession—Waives Examination and
Is Bound Over.

Roswell P. Flower, a young man of this city, occupies a cell in the Marion county jail charged with the crime of burglary. Flower was detected in the act of burglarizing the office of the Stolz Bottling Works on Summer, between Mill and Oak streets, Sunday night, and was later arrested by Sheriff W. J. Culver. He waived examination in Justice of the Peace Turner's court yesterday and was bound over to the circuit court under bonds in the sum of \$500, which he was unable to furnish.

The money till in the office of the Stolz Bottling Works has been rifled of its contents at regular intervals during the past few weeks and when the place was again burglarized on last Wednesday night the matter was communicated to Sheriff Culver, who decided to watch for the thief. Guards were placed about the building at night, the sheriff personally serving on one shift, but no suspicious characters appeared until Sunday evening. Two guards were placed on watch to serve until 11 o'clock Sunday night, when they were to be relieved by Sheriff Culver. Shortly before that hour arrived a man was seen to climb through a window into an old building, where he secured a key, by means of which he gained access to the office building. The guards waited until the form of the burglar could be seen coming out through the window and then made a rush for him, but he proved too fleet of foot and made his escape. One of the guards fired three shots from a revolver, but they had no effect on the fleeing man, who soon disappeared behind some buildings.

Sheriff Culver was on his way to the bottling works to relieve the other guards and was within a block of the buildings when the shots were fired. He made a hasty investigation and soon learned that a young man was making his way into Polk county, having been seen to cross the steel bridge, apparently in a great hurry. The sheriff secured a team and buggy and started in pursuit, and after driving a distance of about eight miles he overtook Flower on the Dallas road, and as the young man, who was in the employ of the Stolz company, had been suspected of being responsible for the numerous thefts, he was placed under arrest. He became quite indignant when accused of burglary, but after the sheriff had searched his pockets and found a marked coin which had been placed in the rifled money drawer on Saturday, he broke down and confessed his guilt.

"Ross" Flower is about twenty years of age and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Flower, formerly of this city but at present residents of Dallas. The young man has at various times during the past two years attended the Salem high school, but finally dropped his studies and went to work for the Gideon Stolz Company. Since the time of his employment the company's office till has been repeatedly robbed of small change, and it had been left by the manager at night for use the following morning, and money has also been stolen from the clothing left by employees in a small dressing room, during the day time. Suspicion soon pointed to Flower, but evidence of his guilt could not be obtained until Sunday night, when he was detected in the act. The amount secured by him Sunday night was 50 cents.

IS NOT TOO OLD.

Portland Paper Gives President Gatch, of Agricultural College, Deserved Compliment.

The following lines, which are self-explanatory, appeared in the editorial columns of Saturday morning's Oregonian:

"Not long ago it was suggested that President Gatch, of the State Agricultural College, was getting too old, and he ought to be retired. He is 75, or thereabouts. He has had a long, honorable and efficient career as an educator in Oregon and Washington. He is known and loved by more students and ex-students, hundreds and thousands of them, than any other person whatever in a similar camp in the Pacific Northwest. Every one of them including now many men and women with students in their own families, is proud to have been under the tutelage of Professor Gatch. All these will be glad to hear that anybody has had the temerity to suggest that Professor Gatch is getting old, for they know that he is one of those singular men who never can and never will grow old. The students at Corvallis, who see him every day and know him

and his work, do not think so, for they gave him at chapel Thursday a most touching and enthusiastic ovation. In eight years the enrollment at Corvallis has risen from 300 to 680. It is the best-attended of our colleges, and the increase must be largely due to the activity and great prestige of President Gatch. Here in Portland we may retire our old men from public service because we know no better; but the example is not necessarily a good one for Corvallis to follow."

HE ACCEPTS NOMINATION.

Chairman Fletcher of School Board Is
Petitioned to Run for Re-Election.

"Reposing especial trust and confidence in your integrity and in your ability for the office of school director and believing that the second term is justly due you in consideration of your efficient services during the term now entering its close, we respectfully ask that you become a candidate for re-election and pledge you our hearty support," is the preamble of a petition which has been in circulation and now bears about 200 names, asking Chairman H. C. Fletcher of the board of school directors to become a candidate for re-election to the board. This petition has been presented to Mr. Fletcher and he has acknowledged receipt of the same, accepting the nomination, making the following pledge in connection:

"If re-elected I will strive, as in the past, to perform the duties of the office and advance the interests of the school and district to the best of my ability."

ALPHONSO LEAVES ENGLAND.

Spain's King Receives Decoration of
Royal Victorian Chain From
Edward.

LONDON, June 9.—A day of festivity in honor of Alphonso was observed tonight with a dinner at the Marlborough house and a state ball at Buckingham palace. Alphonso was today decorated with the royal Victorian chain by King Edward, and the members of his suite received a number of high orders. The royal visitors, who leave London tomorrow, will sail at noon from Dover. King Edward has accepted from Alphonso the colonelcy-in-chief of a Spanish regiment. The King and queen of England were invited to visit Spain, and it is probable that the invitation will be accepted at the first opportunity.

SPRING WHEAT SHOWS WELL.

Increased Acreage Sown This Year
Amounts to Almost Half Mil-
lion Acres.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The preliminary returns to the chief bureau of statistics of the department of agriculture on the acreage of spring wheat sown indicate an average of about 17,000,000 acres, an increase of 472,000 acres, or 2.8 per cent, from the estimate acreage sown last year. The average condition on June 1 was 93.7, as compared with 93.2 at the corresponding date last year, and the ten-year average of 94.4. The average condition of winter wheat on June 1st was 85.5, as compared with 85.5 May 1st, 1903, 77.7 June 1st, 1904, and the ten-year average of 84.2.

TRUSTEES OF HYDE STOCK.

Secretary Morton Receives Names of
Members of the Estate's Trust
for Equitable.

NEW YORK, June 10.—The installation of Paul Morton, secretary of the navy, as head of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, was auspiciously attended today by the prompt acceptance as members of the new board of trustees of the Hyde estate stock of former President Grover Cleveland, George Westinghouse, Justice Morgan O'Brien, the third member of the board, having already been accepted. Mr. Morton also received assurances of the full approval of his selection as chairman of the board of directors from August Belmont and Brayton Ives.

NO IMMEDIATE CHANGES.

French Cabinet Will Remain As It Is
for the Present, at Least,
Says Rouvier.

PARIS, June 9.—Rumors that there will be a re-arrangement of the cabinet have brought out the authoritative statement that the portfolio will remain as at present until Premier Rouvier finally decides whether to retain the foreign office portfolio for himself or hand it over to another minister, which decision will not be arrived at for several days.

ST. PETERSBURG JOINS MOSCOW.

Capital City Lends Its Adhesion to
Address to Emperor Nicholas
by Congress.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 9.—The municipality of St. Petersburg has decided to give adhesion to the address to Emperor Nicholas, adopted by the all-Russian congress at Moscow, and has appointed a number of its members to join the deputation from the Moscow congress which will present the address to the emperor.
