Flying St. Andrew's Flag. Odessa (vin St. Petersburg), July 1. The prefect has informed the de tion from the municipal council that the crew of the battleship Kninz Potem-kine is flying St. Andrew's flag. A steamer has conveyed provisions to the battleship. The panic is unabated and the exodus from the city continues. The conflagrations in the port lasted until Friday evening.
