Heat Prostration.—While working in the field on E. A. Aufrance's farm, four miles west of town, yesterday afternoon, Noah Somers was overcome by the heat to such a degree that the attendance of physician was required. Somers had indulged freely in water drinking which added to his troubles. Dr. W. B. Morse was called and gave the required relief.

Reform School Escapes Captured.—A reform school boy named Thompson, who effected his escape from the institution on Friday afternoon of last week was captured by an officer of the school yesterday at a point near Amity, Yamhill county. Another boy named Landreth, who ran away with Thompson, succeeded in eluding the officer. Thompson made his escape from the school with two other boys last winter and was apprehended in this city by Marshal Cornelius.

Liberty Wins Another Game.—In a game of baseball between the Liberty baseball team and that of the Thomas Kay woolen mills was played in this city Sunday, the result of which was a victory for the Liberty, the score standing, at the close of nine exciting innings, 18 to 16. Stopover Privileges.—W. E. Coman of the Southern Pacific writes The Statesman, in answer to an inquiry, concerning stopover privileges as follows: "The Southern Pacific sells round trip tickets from California points to Portland at greatly reduced rates on account of exposition, with a limit of ten days. These tickets read 'Good for continuous passage only in both directions.' Upon payment of an extra amount at Portland, extension will be made on return portion of such tickets and allow stopovers. In addition to this we have, since the opening of the exposition, arranged so that stopovers can be secured at Oregon points on the return portion of the ten day tickets. Therefore the desire of your people in regard to stopover privileges has been fully met by us, with the exception that the same is not allowed on the north-bound trip. This I believe cannot be objected to, as the tickets are sold for the exposition and the purchasers must in all cases come to Portland, therefore they can arrange to visit Oregon points south of Portland on their return trip."

Old and in the Way.—Miss Evaline Davis, an old lady 75 years of age, was received at the insane asylum from Portland, on Monday evening. No cause, except old age, is given for the commitment.

"Bully" Old Time.—Members of the German Baptist, the First Baptist and the Christian churches picnicked on Reservoir hill yesterday afternoon and had a grand old time. The day was spent in games in the open and lounging about beneath the trees. Lunch was served toward evening that everybody enjoyed.

Mount Hood Illuminations.—A large number of people of this city witnessed the fireworks on top of Mount Hood last evening. By ascending the high hill in South Salem, one could procure a fine view of the large mountain, and the hill was thickly dotted by people who came up to see the beautiful colored lights. Sky-rockets and red fire were all that was visible, and the effect the red fire had at such a distance was extremely beautiful.

Fire From Fire-Crackers.—Boys, intent upon arousing the inmates of the home of A. Waters, near the fair grounds, early yesterday morning set the roof of his home on fire by exploding fire-crackers upon the roof. The men folks had been up long before

the boys' arrival and only the women were at home. Conductor E. F. Wright of the fair grounds saw the blaze and at once went to the home and with a few buckets of water extinguished the fire.

Crops Injured.—The aphid is doing much damage to spring grain in and about Turner, says R. E. Robertson of that town, who was in this city yesterday. He says that most of the late sown grain in the Mill creek bottoms has been cut down from one-third to one-half.

Only Victim.—Roy Brown, who lives on the Garden road, was badly burned about the face and eyes by an exploding cartridge yesterday on Commercial street. The cartridge was discharged from a 22-caliber revolver in the hands of another young boy, who held the pistol close to the face of the Brown boy and fired. Dr. D. F. Lane was summoned and removed most of the powder from the face of the injured boy, but the eyes are still in bad shape.

County Judge Approves Bond.—Chris Giebler, as administrator of the estate of Jacob Giebler, deceased, filed his bond in the Marion county court yesterday. The bond is in the sum of \$1,000 and was approved by Judge Scott. William Cornish, John Hiederer and M. J. Spaniol were appointed to appraise the Giebler estate.

Wants to Sell Property.—Oscar Cole, the administrator of the estate of Levi Bartness, deceased, yesterday petitioned the Marion county probate court for an order authorizing him to sell, at private sale, certain real property belonging to the estate. The property to be sold is located in township 9 south, range 1 east. Judge Scott set August 7, at 10 a. m., as the time for hearing the petition.

Making Preparations.—The Salem Flouring Mills are beginning to get busy as the time of the year is now approaching when farmers will begin to dispose of their wheat, and the mills have prepared themselves for the coming season by shipping by ship in 18,430 sacks. This is the first shipment of sacks that has been ordered by the Salem Flouring Mills this season.

Drunks in Police Court.—Paul Brett and Ed. Lang succeeded in getting under the influence of liquor on the Fourth and were taken in by the police. Brett was discharged by City Recorder Moores yesterday morning, it being his first offense, but Lang, who had appeared in the police court on many previous occasions, was fined \$5, but the offender was released upon promise to pay the fine within a few days.

Laying Cables.—Work of putting in the underground cables for the telephone company began yesterday afternoon. The work will be done under the direction of M. J. Duffy of Portland and it is estimated, will take about five days. The first work was done on Liberty street yesterday afternoon, when a main cable was connected with the new office building on that street. From this point the lines will radiate throughout the congested part of the city, taking in all the business houses of the principal streets.

Wife Asks for Divorce.—Eva L. Wood asks the circuit court to grant her legal separation from her husband, W. A. Wood, setting up the

grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment and desertion. According to the complaint filed by her in department No. 2 of the court yesterday the plaintiff and defendant were married at Eugene on June 30, 1898, and lived together until the month of March, 1903, when the former was deserted by the latter without cause or provocation. The wife also alleges that during the time they lived together her husband treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner and that during the past two years he had contributed nothing whatever toward herself and child. The plaintiff asks for a decree of the court forever dissolving the bonds of matrimony existing between herself and the defendant and that she be awarded the care and custody of their minor daughter, aged six years. John A. Jeffrey appeared in the suit as attorney for the plaintiff.

Sues to Recover Property.—A suit entitled S. S. Martin, plaintiff, vs. J. C. Johnson, defendant, was yesterday filed in department No. 1 of the state circuit court for Marion county. The plaintiff seeks to recover possession of a mare, spring phaeton and single harness which he claims was wrongfully taken by the defendant on July 1 of the present year. It appears that Mr. Johnson, as constable of the Salem district, levied upon the outfit under execution and that Mr. Martin brought the suit to prevent the sale of the property. The plaintiff, who is a real estate broker, sets forth in his complaint that the mare, buggy and harness are used in carrying on his business and are necessary and indispensable. He also asks general damages in the sum of \$50 and \$2 per day for the loss of the use of the outfit. Mr. Martin has retained John A. Jeffrey as attorney.

Mr. Hefebower will spend at least two or three months her visiting friends.

Swimming Hole.—The boys of Salem declare they have the best swimming hole that can be found on the Willamette. The name by which this excellent bathing resort goes is the "Point," it being on the Folk county side of the river almost straight across from the foot of Court street. The water is always clean and fresh at this place and is a very good place for a swim. The banks are high, making diving a popular sport for those who visit it.

Fourth of July Boy.—At the Florence Sanatorium, in Salem, on Tuesday, July 4, 1905, there was born to Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Young of Havre, Montana, a boy. Mrs. Young was formerly Miss Marie Vandervail of this city. This is the second in the family, and as the first was a girl the star spangled banner boy is a very welcome visitor. It was not a stork in this instance that brought the little stranger. It was the American bird of freedom.

Commence Action for Money.—The banking firm of Ladd & Bush yesterday commenced an action in the circuit court against D. M. Wilson and wife to recover the sum of \$7651, alleged to be due upon two promissory notes executed by the defendants in favor of the plaintiffs on May 14 and June 9, 1904. The plaintiffs ask judgment for the amount with interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum and for \$20 as special attorneys' fees. The complaint was filed by George G. Bingham, the banking firm's attorney.

Takes Much Needed Rest.—City Marshal T. E. Cornelius and his family will leave this morning for Mr. Cornelius' farm near Marion, where they will reside during the next ten days. Mr. Cornelius, who has paid close attention to his duties since he took the oath of office six months ago, will take a much needed rest and he hopes to be greatly benefited by the ten days' sojourn in the country. During the marshal's absence, Day Officer James W. Lewis will be at the head of the police department.

Will Repair Steel Bridge.—A joint meeting of the Marion and Polk county courts and the bridge committee of Salem's city council was held in this city yesterday for the purpose of examining the condition of the steel bridge spanning the Willamette river and discussing plans for the necessary repairs. The Polk county court was represented by Commissioners Riggs and Eddell, the Marion county court by Commissioners Miley and Needham and the city council by Mayor and Aldermen Stenslof and Bayne. The bridge was carefully gone over and was found to be in good condition with the exception of the flooring, which is in a bad state and will have to be replaced with new lumber at once. The members of the two courts and the council committee agreed upon plans and will advertise for bids for the re-decking of the entire structure. The bids are to be opened on or about July 24.

Married in Portland.—Miss Cora Winters was married in Portland on Wednesday, July 5th, to J. C. Peterson, at the home of the bride's mother, by Rev. J. Burgette Short, pastor of the Taylor Street M. IS CREATED A NUISANCE.
Council Passed Ordinance Prohibiting Tethering of Cows on Public Streets.

(From Friday's Daily.)
At the council meeting held Wednesday evening an ordinance was passed declaring the tethering or picketing of certain animals in the streets, alleys, etc., of the city a nuisance and providing a penalty for the violation of its provisions. For the benefit of the readers of the Statesman living within the city who may own cows, horses or other animals named in the measure, the ordinance is published herewith in full and is as follows:

"An ordinance to provide for the cleanliness, ornament, improvement and good order of the city, and to declare the tethering or picketing of certain animals in or upon any of the streets, curbs, paths, walks, alleys or public places of the city, to be a nuisance and to punish persons guilty of creating such nuisance, and to repeal all ordinances in conflict herewith."

"Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon: "Section 1. That it is hereby declared to be a nuisance for any person or persons owning or having charge of any horse, mule, cow, cattle, sheep, swine or goat, to picket or tether the same for the purpose of grazing in or upon any of the streets, curbs, paths, walks, alleys or public places within the city of Salem, Oregon."

"Section 2. Any person or persons convicted of creating or maintaining any of the nuisances prescribed by section 1 of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$2.50 or more than \$50 or be imprisoned in the city jail not less than five days or more than ten days."

"Section 3. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance be, and same are, hereby repealed; provided, that such repeal shall not revive any ordinance which was repealed by any of the ordinances which are hereby repealed."

"Section 4. Of ordinance No. 429, prohibiting the herding and grazing of cows, horses and other domestic animals in the streets, alleys and other public places was also amended to read as follows: "No horse, mule, cow, cattle, sheep, swine, goat or fowl shall be allowed to run at large or to be herded in any of the streets, alleys, parks or public places in the city of Salem, or be kept or grazed upon any lawn or premises without the consent of the owner of such lawn or premises; provided, that when more than two such domestic animals are being carefully driven in a drove through the streets outside of the curbs and properly attended by drivers or persons in charge, they shall not be considered as running at large within the meaning of this section."

WM. BECKMAN, CONVICTED ONCE AND PARDONED, ARRESTED ON ANOTHER CHARGE.

Sentenced to Life Imprisonment for Murder of Wife in 1894—Pardoned by Governor Geer in 1902—Must Now Answer for Murder of Stepson.

William F. Beckman, convicted of the murder of his wife and sentenced to life imprisonment in 1894, pardoned by ex-Governor Geer in 1902, is now in custody of the sheriff of Douglas county and standing face to face with another indictment for the killing of his stepson at the same time the murder of his wife was committed.

Beckman killed his wife and stepson, Robert King, on Oak creek, Douglas county, eleven years ago, upon a farm on which they lived. Two indictments were returned against him and he was first convicted of murder in the second degree for the killing of his wife, and was sentenced to life in the penitentiary. In 1902 Beckman was granted a full pardon by Governor Geer and he immediately left the state, going east, where he entered the Michigan Soldiers' home. He remained there until a few weeks ago, when he returned to Portland, en route to Los Angeles, Cal. He had transportation in his pocket for his destination when he was placed under arrest in Portland before yesterday and taken to Roseburg, where he is being held now to answer to the second indictment, that of the murder of his stepson, yesterday.

Beckman is 80 years of age, is in an enfeebled condition mentally and physically. He was visiting in Portland with a friend when re-arrested and taken back to Roseburg. It is reported from Roseburg that his arrest was brought about through information furnished the Douglas county sheriff by Beckman's stepdaughter, who was in Portland and learned of his presence and who claimed to be in fear of her life on account of threats alleged to have been made by him.

Some of the old man's friends are highly incensed at the late action of the Douglas county officials and they are taking steps to bring about his release. First reports of the affair were to the effect that Beckman had been arrested for violating the condition of his pardon, in returning again to this state, but this was erroneous, as his pardon was granted unconditionally and he departed the state of his own volition.

IS ACCUSED OF FRAUD.

J. L. Freeland Swears Out Complaint Against S. E. Hassan, Mining Engineer.

In Justice of the Peace Turner's court last evening a complaint was sworn out by J. L. Freeland against S. E. Hassan, of this city, in which the latter is charged with having defrauded the plaintiff of \$40 in cash, which amount the plaintiff seeks to recover. A warrant was issued upon the complaint and was served last evening by Deputy Sheriff Harry Minto.

Mr. Hassan is manager of the Hassan Mining Company, is a mining engineer and assayer. Mr. Freeland charges specifically that Hassan represented to him that he was the representative of the Chinese Six Companies, a wealthy Chinese agency of China, and that this concern was contemplating the purchase of the Freeland gold mines in the Santiam district. He is also charged with representing that he had \$100,000 of this company's money on deposit in a bank with which to purchase the mines and, upon this representation, secured \$40 from Mr. Freeland to defray his expenses in looking at the property.
