THE SALE OF LIQUOR TO INDIANS

The State Law Prohibiting Furnishing Firewater to Such Persons Will Be Tested at Pendleton.

In 1864 the state of Oregon passed a law prohibiting the selling of liquor or fire-arms to Indians and possibly for the first time since that law was passed the state looks it will be tested. The courts of Umatilla county, complaints having been filed with John McCourt, deputy district attorney of that county and a resident and lawyer at Pendleton. The complaint is against two citizens of that place who are charged with having sold a pint of spirituous liquor to an Indian, and the sale of liquor to Indians, at the instance of Mr. Valentine, an inspector of the Indian service, who has been at Pendleton investigating the conditions of the Umatilla redskins.

Of the affair The East Oregonian writes that city, says: "At last an arrest has been made under the state law prohibiting the sale of liquor to Indians, and the legality of that law will be tested. It was at the instigation and upon the complaint of Private Secretary Valentine that the arrests were made, and the same was done Saturday evening. On that evening complaints were made before John McCourt, deputy district attorney, by Mr. Valentine, charging two men, whose names were then unknown, with having sold one pint of spirituous liquor to Simon Whitman. The men were Baird Lovmore, of the city brewery, and Dave Carlin, a bartender in the Red Front saloon. This morning they were presented in the circuit court and asked to be allowed until Wednesday morning in which to plead, which was granted.

"Apparently Inspector Valentine, becoming in touch with the Indians and their white associates in more ways than one, and has devoted some of his time to other subjects than leaves his official deputies since he has been here. It is said that the arrest Saturday evening was the direct result of his work. He having with the assistance of an Indian, caught the men in the act of selling the liquor in the rear of the Red Front saloon. Just how the thing was done will probably not be told until the case comes to trial, but it is said that the evidence is conclusive.

"The arrest Saturday evening of the two men for selling liquor to Indians is of great importance, since it is the first one to be made under the state law, and will give an opportunity for the law to be tested should a conviction follow. Under the law it is a misdemeanor to sell liquor to an Indian, and the penalty is a fine of from \$1 to \$500, or imprisonment in the county jail for from two to six months.

"It is the intention of the prisoners to fight the case and Carter & Rale have been secured by one and Judge Foe by the other, as attorneys for the defense. Should the men be convicted it is said that the matter will be appealed to the supreme court on the ground that the law is unconstitutional. However, a hard defense on technical grounds is looked for first."
