IS STILL GOING

ALTHOUGH LIFE OF CONTRACT HAS EXPIRED, STOVE FOUNDRY IS STILL RUNNING.

Soon as Necessary Materials Arrive the Work of Convicts Will Be Stopped in Prison Shops Pending Award of Contract and Making of Repairs.

Although the Northwest Stove Foundry has not closed down for the season as yet, preparations are under way for extensive repairs to be made during the next few weeks, when the entire roof of the buildings will be replaced and a new cement floor put in, covering the whole area of ground space. It is hardly probable that, once shut down, operations will again resume in the foundry for at least two months, and possibly not by that time, depending upon to whom is let the contract for the employment of convict labor. This latter has not been definitely decided upon as yet, but it is understood that an agreement has been reached and that the articles and contract will be signed soon after the return of the governor from his southwestern Oregon tour.

The last legislature enacted a law permitting a portion of the penitentiary betterment fund, which now consists of \$25,000, to be used in replacing the roof and construction of a new floor, the estimated cost of which will reach in the neighborhood of \$10,000. The plans have already been drawn to cover the contemplated improvements and, it is expected that the contract for the work will be let in the course of a few days. Superintendent Fleming, of the foundry, is away spending his vacation at the coast and will not return for two weeks. In the meantime all of the machinery and equipment will be removed and, in case the future contract is awarded to the Portland Airtight Stove Company, an entirely new outfit will be installed, at the expense of the company. Although Governor Chamberlain held a conference with the head officials of the Portland Airtight Company, which bid 6.8 cents per hour for the employment of convict labor in the stove foundry, on a ten year contract, or 1.8 cents higher than the Lowenberg & Going Company, and is supposed to have arrived at an understanding with them as to a satisfactory bond and other preliminary arrangements, the details have not been decided upon and it is difficult to state whether or not this company will be granted the contract. This matter will not be taken up until his return.

EARLY MORNING FIRE.

Home of A. F. Holt Takes Fire Mysteriously and Is Destroyed.

Between 6 and 7 o'clock yesterday morning the dwelling of Mr. A. F. Holt on Fourth street, Riverside addition, was practically destroyed by fire. The contents of the house burned, with the exception of two trunks, one of which was empty. Mr. Holt, who is a single man, was milking when the fire started but arrived at the house in time to assist his neighbors in saving the barn and the trunks mentioned above. The house was a one-story, low building and was worth from two to two hundred and fifty dollars. The contents Mr. Holt valued at about one thousand dollars. No reason is known for the fire, unless it was that the stove door opened and coals dropped out on the carpet. The house was inside the city limits.

but the chief of the fire department, who was there at the time, could find no water nearer than the river, so did not call the department. Mr. Holt and his neighbors pumped water from the well until it was dry, in an effort to save the barn, which they did after a hard fight. Mr. Holt, who is an elderly man, was quite severely burned about the face. He expressed great appreciation of the assistance rendered by his neighbors.

The people of the outer wards of the city have much reason for their complaint that no effort is being made to give them fire protection. It would seem that it were within the bounden duties of the city council to look after the extension of the water system to the new wards so there would be some possible chance of saving property of citizens living therein.

Old Landmark Destroyed. The old J. Quinn Thornton house, one of the most historical old landmarks of Salem, was nearly totally destroyed by fire yesterday between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock in the afternoon. The house, which was owned by Mrs. Lee Crossman, was occupied by Mrs. Lizzie Miller, and situated at 616 South Church street, near the blind school. The family was at dinner when the fire was discovered and an alarm was turned in from the blind school.

A very quick run was made by the fire department but there was a great deal of difficulty in getting water from the creek, and by the time water was obtained, almost the entire roof was destroyed. The household goods and furniture were saved but the building is nearly a total loss. It was insured in the McMinnville company for \$300. The fire is supposed to have occurred through a defective flue.

FINE PRINTING.
Excellent Souvenirs Are Published by Walla Walla for Gratuitous Distribution.
The following appeared in the Spokane Spokesman-Review: Walla Walla, Wash., July 29.—The first copies of the souvenir of Walla Walla county, printed by a Salem, Ore., printing house, have arrived in the city. The material of the book is written by Professor W. D. Lyman, Whitman college and is compiled and illustrated by D. Frederic Carnes, under the direction of Dr. N. G. Blalock, chairman; C. L. Whitney, secretary, and M. McDonald, treasurer of the commissioners to the Lewis and Clark fair from Walla Walla county.

Beginning, the work takes up the subject of Walla Walla valley and shows pictures of the county buildings. The "Old Fellows" and the Stubblefield homes are described and illustrated. W. P. Resner's hand of elk, which he has on his farm near the city, are depicted, and the following in the illustrations and descriptions of the Whitman college and graves, Whitman college and the Blalock fruit ranch. Several pages are given to the homes of Walla Walla, following with the hospitals and schools of city. The churches and Fort Walla Walla are each given space, together with illustrations of the best business houses of the city.

The varied industries are shown in pictures and descriptions of dairy and stock ranches, wheat harvest scenes and orchards and gardens showing many of the largest orchards of the county.

The four mills of the county from Walla Walla, Prescott and Waiilatpu, are shown, with a number of valuable statistics, together with the enumeration of the manufacturers of the city. The irrigation subject is touched by Professor Lyman and with a short review of the scenery and game and fishing haunts of the county, the book ends.

A large number of these valuable books were printed and are being distributed at the Walla Walla county booth at Portland.

SHE WAS ASLEEP

LITTLE FLORENCE CARTWRIGHT WANDERS AWAY FROM HOME AND CREATES EXCITEMENT.

Mother Became Frantic When Suggestion Was Made That She Had Fallen in Mill Race—Found Peacefully Sleeping in Neighbor's House.

Considerable excitement was created in the neighborhood of the Florence Cartwright last evening, and no little anxiety and worry upon the part of the parents, when little Florence Cartwright, the three-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. R. Cartwright, wandered away from her home and was gone for about three hours. The excitement which had increased almost to fever heat, as time wore on soon subsided, however, and the grief of the anxious mother appeased when she was finally located in a neighbor's house sleeping the sleep of the innocent and righteous all unconscious of the furor which she had created.

The little child, which is in the habit of wandering away from home quite frequently, was last seen near the corner of Cottage and Perry street last evening. She was missed in the Cartwright household a few moments afterward and a thorough search was immediately organized and pursued. She had been in the habit of playing in the vicinity of the mill race on Trade street and grave fears were entertained, especially upon the part of the parents, that she had ventured too near and had fallen in and drowned. The water in the ditch at that point and below is from three to five feet deep and, in order to satisfy the grief-stricken and anxious parents, local manager W. P. Babcock, of the Salem Flouring Mills Company, went to the flood gates and shut off the flow of water. When the water had flowed out sufficiently a young man student of the university whose name could not be obtained, waded down the middle of the ditch in search of the body.

Long before the water had been completely drained from the ditch the glad cry went up that the little one had been found, which proved to be a great relief.

EARL RACE THINKS HOLDING OF CONVENTION FOLLOWING PRIMARIES IS GOOD THING

Would Afford the Republicans an Opportunity to Adopt a Platform and Promote Interests of the Nominees Toward Securing Their Election.

Editor Statesman:
Your editorials in regard to the Republicans holding conventions are very timely.

I think there ought to be both state and county conventions immediately following the primaries, to adopt a platform, if it is deemed necessary and in order that there may be a concentrated effort to elect the nominees. With a state convention and a state committee from county a state organization would be maintained and good for the party be the result. Otherwise individual effort of each nominee for himself, would invite more knifing than would or could be effected if there was a convention to consider and harmonize all interests.

Counties should also hold conventions to select a committee to assist in the election of both county tickets. Individual effort might miscarry when organized interests would prove successful.

There is no question but that the expense of the campaign would be very largely increased if every nominee was wholly and solely a campaign committee unto himself. Further, would it be fair to nominate candidates and then say we have done our duty, now you must paddle your own canoe? The campaign liar will be abroad in the land in the future as in the past and organized effort is the most complete way to head him off.

Judge Fraser, of Portland, Renders Decision, Holding Anti-Scalping Law Valid.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 5.—In a decision handed down this morning Judge Fraser ruled that the anti-scalping law passed by the last legislature was constitutional and that violations of its provisions could be prosecuted under the criminal law. He denied the ap-

plication for a writ of habeas corpus for Charles J. Murray, arrested for violating the anti-scalping law and his decision will have the effect of putting an end to the business in this city, for in the course of his decision Judge Fraser "knocked out the prop" on which several ticket-scalpers have been evading the direct provisions of the law. Judge Fraser stated that the only question to be considered was the constitutionality of the law. "The only reason on which Murray's release is asked is that the law on which he is arrested and held is unconstitutional," he says. "The Oregon law is similar in many respects to laws in force in eight or ten other states. Questions as to the constitutionality of the laws have been argued in those states and in all except one the law has been held as constitutional. In that one the supreme court, consisting of five men, held the law constitutional by unanimous decision, and the court of appeals reversed the decision by a vote of 4 to 3. It is also alleged there was a peculiar wording in the law of that state. So the effect of this decision is weakened as an authority. The weight of authority is strong in favor of the constitutionality of such laws, and my own views accord with those of the authorities."
