Outing Grain While Moon Shines—

Harvesting time is now in full swing in most every section around Salem. Early in the morning one can hear the whistles of the threshing engines as they are making preparations to begin the day's labor, which generally lasts in Oregon from sixteen to eighteen hours to the day, knocking off one hour for dinner. Harvesting can not be out of the way too soon the farmers think and they cut the grain during the night. When the moon is at its full one can hear binders and mowing machines clicking in a noise covering a large field in the surrounding country. The night work is due mostly to the hot weather, the farmers not wishing to work their horses in the blazing sun, do the grain cutting in the cool of the evening, making it comparatively easy on the poor beasts, which otherwise would have to plod along in the dust and heat.

Shedlock Took Him In—

Herbert Nash, a horseman at the state fair grounds, paid a \$15 fine in the police court yesterday morning for having been disorderly and resisting an officer while under the influence of liquor. Nash tanked up on whiskey Saturday night and soon came to the conclusion that he owned the city. He finally ran across Officer Shedlock and tried to convince that gentleman that he had large property interests here and that he was a prize-fighter, but the policeman refused to be bluffed and when he had tired of the hot air and threatening physical demonstrations, by a simple twist of the wrist he landed Mr. Nash on the sidewalk and then gently removed him to the city jail. The offender failed to make a satisfactory explanation of his actions to Judge Moore when he appeared in the police court yesterday morning and his bill was fixed at \$15, which amount was paid by his friends.

LAW IS INVALID

SUPREME COURT HOLDS MIGRATORY LIVESTOCK LAW UN-EQUAL IN PROVISIONS.

Owners of Such Stock at Disadvantage With Owner of Other Stock and Cannot Be Assessed at Previous Year's Rate of Levy—Three Opinions.

Because it is in violation of that section of the constitution which requires that taxation shall be equal and uniform, the supreme court yesterday morning, in an opinion of which Chief Justice Wolverton is author, declared that the migratory livestock tax law passed by the legislature is void. The opinion was given in the case of Lake County, appellant, vs. A. B. Schroeder, respondent, from Lake county, and the judgment rendered by Judge H. L. Benson is affirmed.

This action was brought to enforce payment of a tax under the new law, and the trial judge sustained a demurrer to the complaint and this action is upheld by the appellate court. Defendant was about to remove his stock into another county when under the provisions of the migratory stock law the county authorities attempted to assess and collect taxes upon the same for the full year at the rate of the last preceding levy, the act so providing in the case of the owner of the stock has not sufficient real property to secure the tax. The supreme court holds the provision authorizing an assessment at least year's rate of levy is a vital defect in the law, as it puts the owner of livestock at a disadvantage as compared with the owners of other stock not migratory, because he must pay at a different rate of levy, which may be higher, and therefore an inequality exists. The court does not pass upon the constitutionality of the act on the ground that no notice or adequate hearing is provided for the owner of the livestock before he is precluded by the assessment, as the case is disposed of on the first question.

In an opinion rendered by Justice Moore, the first decision of Judge L. T. Harris coming before the supreme court was reversed and the cause remanded. This opinion is in the case of the state vs. Jessie Eddy, and is appealed from the circuit court for Lane county. Eddy was jointly indicted, tried and convicted with James Winkle for robbing William Dugan, a local merchant, who was taken on the ground that more than one crime was charged in the indictment, and that the facts did not constitute a crime. The supreme court holds the indictment not specific in respect to the party charged with using the force which was a particular circumstance of the crime or robbery and necessary to constitute a complete offense. In the case of Moss Mercantile Company, respondent, vs. First National Bank of Payette, Idaho, Justice Bean renders an opinion in which he reverses the decision of Judge George E. Davis of the circuit court of Malheur county, and dismisses the cause. This was a suit to restrain prosecution of an action against William Miller to recover money for \$2,820.22 in favor of one Holmick, and against a man named Porter. It was simply a question of equity on the part of the plaintiff and his authority to bring suit to stop the defendant from prosecution of the action at law, and the supreme court holds the trial court erred in overruling the defendant's motion to set aside the complaint, holding that the questions are properly tryable at law.

Guy Hirsch, Former Salem Boy, Wedded to Miss Elsie Goldman, of Butte.

The groom is the eldest son of Postmaster and Mrs. Edward Hirsch of this city. He has many friends here who will be pleased to learn of his matrimonial alliance and extend congratulations and wishes of joy and prosperity."

BOY SAYS OUT OF JAIL.

Given the Freedom of the Corridor, the Youth Makes Good Use of a Saw.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Aug. 4.—Officers are hunting the country to capture J. C. Maddox, a 17-year-old boy who made his escape from the Josephine county jail by sawing a hole through the floor. Because of the excessive heat of the day he had allowed him to remain in the outer corridor. The corridor is more roomy and is made secure by the heavy bars at the windows.

Young Maddox was supplied a saw in some way, and with this a hole was cut in the four-inch wooden floor of the corridor. By crawling under the jail he was able to make his escape. Maddox was employed as night clerk at the Palace hotel, this city, and the charge on which he was held was robbing an inmate man of \$400. The inmate man was kept at the hotel over night while on his way to the asylum, and while at the hotel he was robbed of his purse, which, with a part of the possession of Maddox, was found in the possession of Maddox. The boy sought the greater part of his treating friends, and when arrested was on his way to the Portland exposition.

CAPPED FUSES IN COAL.

The Sailors of the Americas Unearth a Devilish Plot While in Mid-Ocean.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 4.—An attempt to blow up a ship in mid-ocean is reported by Captain J. Touze, of the French ship *Amirac*, which arrived here yesterday afternoon from Swansea, England, loaded with coal. He left that port in January last, and six weeks later, when far out at sea, a dozen capped fuses, such as are used by miners to explode dynamite, were discovered in the hold of the ship among the coal. He said one of the fuses became ignited by a shock in a part of the hold where coal gas has accumulated, the ship would undoubtedly have been blown to atoms. Two or three of them had exploded, but fortunately at points where there was no gas and consequently no damage was done.

The presence of the fuses among the coal was discovered only by accident, when, during some rough weather, men sent down into the hold to level the coal, found them.

HARVEST FOR WRECKERS.

Little Left of Granded Vessel Except Hull, Even Brass Fixtures, Clothing and Lines, Being Taken.

EUREKA, Cal., Aug. 4.—The wrecked steamer *Tricolor*, which went ashore on the Mendocino coast ten days ago, is proving a rich harvest to wreckers, and thousands of dollars worth of material is being landed at the port of Eureka every day. The principal persons benefited are the longshoremen, many of whom sleep on the wrecked ship and get huge quantities of stuff every day. The ship chest is full of several thousand dollars worth of clothes. The brass fittings of the

steamer have been taken, as well as all the lines, ropes and a portion of the machinery. The underwriters have not yet abandoned the steamer, and it is thought complications will arise over the rifling of the vessel. Several persons have viewed the wreck with a view of purchasing it from the underwriters, but unless speedy action is taken there will be little left to sell but the hull of the steamer, which cannot be approached, except by small boats.

The *Tricolor* has shifted her position, and now lies with her bow pointing to the shore. Still there are no signs of breaking up, and no sign of peril of the vessel has not even been met.

GOULD AGENTS ACTIVE.

In Spite of O. R. & N. Opposition Determined to Build Road Into Oregon.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 4.—Despite numerous announcements from Harrison headquarters of extensions soon to be made into heretofore isolated Oregon districts, reports from interior points are to the effect that agents of the Gould Western Pacific Railroad are busy locating available route into this state. There is a strong rumor that the Co-operative Christian Federation, which has practically closed a deal for the Oregon Military Wagon Road tract, stretching clear across the state and embracing 80,000 acres, has agreed to an agreement with the Gould interests, and that the latter have guaranteed the former railroad connection with the outside world.

SOCKEYE RUN LIGHT.

Puget Sound Cannermen Only Secure About One Third of the Usual Pack.

SEATTLE, Aug. 4.—Within the next few days the second and final spurt of the sockeye salmon run on the Puget sound should commence, unless the packers have placed the wrong estimate on the run. The first spurt has been gradually falling away the past few days and today the canneries of the sound failed to secure a sufficient number of salmon to operate to any extent. The number of cases of sockeye salmon packed on the sound to date is estimated at 300,000. As now predicted by the trap operators and cannermen, the total pack of the season should reach the 800,000 mark or higher.

Willing Purchasers Pay Delinquent Taxes of 1900 and Receive Title to Land. Sheriff W. J. Culver yesterday morning sold at sheriff's sale all of the property bought in by Marion county for 1900 taxes. There were 132 parcels in all, including towns and acreage property and the total amount received was \$767.94. Every piece was sold but in only one case did the bid amount to more than the actual amount of the tax and costs. A great deal of the property was bought in by the present owners who had purchased the land after the 1900 tax was supposed to have been paid.

The time for redemption having expired the title to the property sold yesterday immediately passed to the highest bidder and the sheriff's office has a good sized job on hand making out the tax deeds to the different purchasers. Among the pieces included in the 1900 delinquent list were a number of choice properties and these were quickly taken by those who had taken the trouble to investigate before the sale.

ONLY ONE MORE CHANCE.
