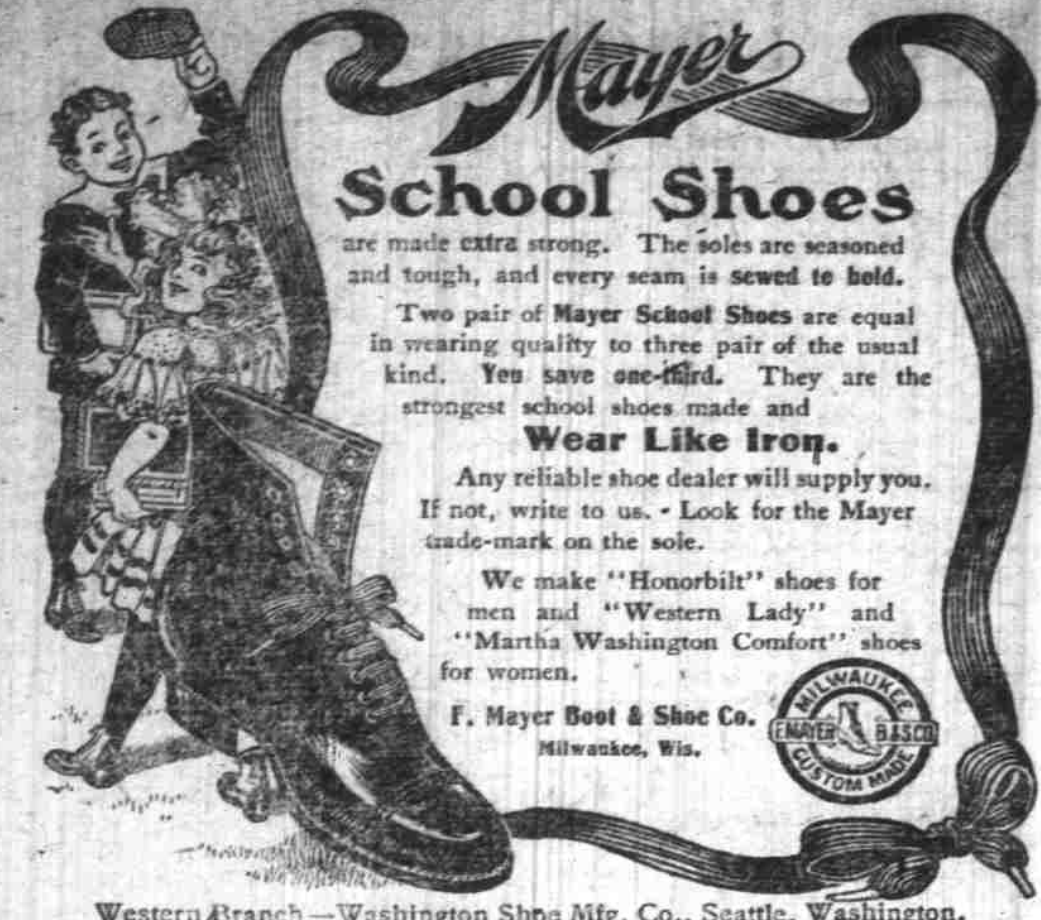

END APPROACHES

LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION CLOSING ON SATURDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 14.

At Midnight the Lights Will Be Turned Out for Last Time—Interesting Program Has Been Arranged for the Last Day.

PORTLAND, Oct. 11.—(Special).—Next Saturday night, October 14, the Lewis and Clark centennial exposition will triumphantly pass into history, where it will be recorded as the most successful exposition ever held.
The last day will undoubtedly be one of the largest and most successful of any during the exposition period, ranking in the same class as Portland day, opening day and Fourth of July. The attendance will be tremendous, as thousands will desire to gaze upon the beautiful grounds and buildings just one more before they are turned over to the wreckers, and a splendid program of special events is planned.

Among the features planned for the celebration of the closing day are: Japanese day fireworks, hurdle races by the Portland Hunt club, special band concerts, a dress parade by the Oregon national guard, closing exercises, a magnificent display of fireworks, and the blowing up of the battleship on Guild's lake. Other equally important and pleasing features are being arranged.

The Japanese day fireworks will start at about noon, to continue for several hours, and the hurdle races will take place on the government peninsula at 5 p. m. The dress parade of the Oregon national guard will take place at 8:30 p. m.

A banquet will be given in the New York building by the directors of the exposition, to the president, officers and officials of the fair who have played an important part in making the exposition such a success. From the New York building the directors and officials will walk to the band stand on Gray boulevard, where the closing exercises will be held at 11:30 o'clock. At midnight, when the exposition officially comes to an end, taps will be sounded and the lights extinguished for the last time. Then the heavens will be lighted by the setting off of a mammoth bouquet of rockets and bombs, after which will follow the blowing up of the battleships which have been used from time to time for the reproduction of famous naval battles. The Elery Italian band will play a farewell number, a large set piece lettered "Good Night" will be displayed, and the fair will be over officially. The gates will be open for some time after, however, for the benefit of visitors who desire to see the work of demolishing the buildings carried on, and it is expected that there will be a fair attendance for some time after the exposition is closed.

Many special events have been planned for the last week and the manner in which visitors are pouring into town shows that those who have not already seen the exposition in all its glory are taking advantage of the few remaining precious days.

STATESMAN CLASSIFIED ADS BRING QUICK RESULTS.

ARE WORKED INTO FRENZY

GREEK LABORERS CREATE HAVOC BUT ARE SUBDUED.

INNOCENT WOMAN IS A VICTIM

Killed During a Wild Parade Upon Southern Pacific Passenger Train.

Trouble Arises Over the Discharge of Countryman Whose Reinstatement Was Demanded—Riots in Charge of Roseburg Militia Company.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 11.—Following the dismissal a few days ago of a Greek foreman employed in connection with a Greek construction gang on the Southern Pacific, trouble broke out among the Greeks who demanded a reinstatement of the discharged man. Foreman Peterson refused to comply and an incipient riot broke out. The Greeks, who numbered 83, became insistent, displaying firearms. No use of the weapons was made until last night when they opened fire on the north-bound overland. The mob then turned on the foreman and the firing became general. Peterson retired to his private car where he found the body of his wife who had been killed by a bullet. The killing is believed to have been done by a stray bullet.
The crew of a southbound freight train arrived at this time, and, after desultory firing, during which one of the Greeks was wounded, a measure of order was restored. Sheriff McCallen was communicated with and a posse of fifty men, headed by Deputy Bogard, went to the scene and placed the Greeks under arrest. Thirty or forty revolvers were found in their possession. Word was sent to the Sheriff that owing to the character of the men it would be impossible for the peace authorities to control them and asked for the militia which was sent to the place of disturbance. The Greeks are now herded in a warehouse under military guard.
In an interview this evening Sheriff McCallen stated that unless some method was found to enforce a peaceable condition in the railroad camps he would not be responsible for the acts of the people and the feeling here is that the placing of the militia in control is believed to be a matter of precaution for the safety of the Greeks against retaliatory acts on the part of the citizen.

WAS A HAPPY OCCASION.
Officers and Men of British Squadron Royally Welcomed in Tokio.

TOKIO, Oct. 12.—Vice-Admiral Noel commanding the British Squadron, accompanied by his numerous suite, was welcomed here this morning by a large number of officials. The party was driven through streets lined with a multitude of people to Hibiya park, where the mayor of Tokio gave a garden party. The park was packed with the guests who had been invited to the party. During the day about 1000 British sailors and marines arrived and these spent the day in sight-seeing. The whole population, irrespective of age or sex, turned out to greet the visitors. Such a welcome to foreign visitors and such happy crowds were never before seen in Tokio.

WOMAN'S PARLIAMENT.
Ladies Gather in California City for Discussion of Subjects of General Interest.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 10.—The Woman's Parliament convened here today under very favorable auspices for the discussion of questions which very intimately concern the women of the country at large, as well as those of this state. The sessions will be for two days, and during that time the situation in regard to equal suffrage throughout the United States, as well as the state of California, will occupy the attention of the bright and clever women who compose the parliament. Because many of the members of the County Equal Suffrage League, the convention of the latter body was set for the 12th of this month, immediately following the parliament. This will also give both bodies a chance to benefit by the deliberations of the other, as it is probable that the discussions at both will probably be along the same line.

FINAL WAR IS ON.
Question as to Management of the Wash Lines Is Up Before Stockholders at Toledo.

TOLEDO, Oct. 10.—The meeting here today of the stockholders of the Wash line for the purpose of holding the annual election is going to be the climax in the fight between Joseph Ramsey, Jr., former president of the road, and George Gould, who was appointed acting president early in the summer when Mr. Ramsey tendered his resignation, which was the result of the fight made on him by the Gould interests.
The fight which Mr. Ramsey has started for the control of the Wash road is one of the most daring in the history of railroad conflicts and is especially noteworthy for the fact that it is being boldly and publicly made. Ramsey does not believe that the Goulds hold the controlling interest in the road, and he issued a call to the stockholders of the company for their proxies to be voted at the election today, stating that if he obtains a controlling amount of proxies he will use

them in the election of a board of directors who will administer the property honestly and wisely and enable holders of its stock and debentures to get some return for their investments. The stand taken by Mr. Ramsey came as a surprise to the Gould faction as he gave no hint of what he was planning, either while he was abroad or at the meeting of the directors in September. His circular came like a bombshell in the camp of the enemy.
If Mr. Ramsey succeeds in regaining control of the road, he will have in his charge one of the biggest trusts in the country and it is also reported that another result of his victory would be an alliance between the Wash and the Pennsylvania or New York Central, which would mean the loss to the Goulds of their proposed transcontinental line which they intended to procure by extending the Wash through to the Atlantic seaboard.

QUESTION IS GRAVE ONE.
Interests of America and France Are Identical in the Venezuela Trouble.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Venezuela was the subject of an important conference between Secretary Root and Ambassador Jessorand. The latter has been awaiting the arrival of the report of Calhoun, the American special commissioner, before reporting to the French government a course of action. According to Calhoun's report, the grievances of the Washington and Paris governments are very similar. France has informed the United States the course mapped out is one of extreme patience, but of great firmness. The course of action of the two governments, however, will not be adopted until Root and Jessorand have further considered Calhoun's report.

HAVE TO HURRY
NO TIME TO LOSE IN THE PREPARATIONS FOR THE COMING MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN.

Regular Election Will Take Place on December Fourth; Primary Election Will Be Held November Fourth and Petitions Are Due October Twentieth

Scarcely two months intervene between now and the approaching municipal election, and so far as can be ascertained now, candidates for aldermanic honors—the only vacancies to be filled at the coming December election—have not materialized, nor are there any petitions for nomination in circulation. There duly remains one week from tomorrow, according to the provisions of the direct primary nomination law, under which the election is to be held, in which the petitions may be filed, and in which is any one who has aspirations to shoulder the responsibilities of the city government or to partake of a share of them, it might be well for them to begin to look around a bit and "get a move on."

The last city election was not held directly in conformity with the provisions of the direct primary nomination law, because no registration list of municipal electors was in existence, taken under the primary nominating law, but the question of the legality of such a proceeding this year as the registration of June, 1904, was taken in conformity with the new law and affects cities of 2000 inhabitants or over. The direct primary nomination law provides that the nominating election shall be held thirty days preceding the regular election, which is fixed by charter upon the first Monday in December—falling this year on December 4—and another section provides further that all petitions for nomination shall be filed fifteen days preceding the primary election which would make the limit for the filing of petitions Friday, Oct. 20. The primary election dates fall upon Saturday, November 4, under the new law.

Section 2793 of the direct primary nomination law says that it requires the signatures of not less than three per cent of the number of electors in the precinct, according to the last general election, to place in nomination any officer of the precinct, or a justice of the peace; which will doubtless apply to the municipal election of aldermen, and if this number of signatures is to be secured the aspirants for office will have to hurry as there is little time left in which to work.

Under the new law the city recorder performs the same office of posting notices of elections, etc., as the county clerk in the case of general elections. There are no city officials to be elected this year except aldermen and one each of these must be elected from each of the seven wards. In ward number one the term of Alderman Downing expires a 1st of January and in the other six as follows: number two, Crockett; three, Geener; four, Higgins; five, Jacobs; six, Churchill; seven, Payne. This will leave the council, politically, four Republicans and three Democrats, designated as follows: number one, Steussloff (D); number two, Baker (R); number three, Wallace (R); number four, Goodale (R); number five, Franier (D); number six, Skaffe (D); number seven, Acheson (R). Judging from the municipal affairs of late by the Business Men's League and the Taxpayers' Association it has been taken for granted that the old citizen's movement

will be revived this year with renewed energy and there is a fine prospect of a lively political clash between the three political parties both at the primary and regular elections.

Mrs. Emmons Becomes Hysterical Because Husband Is Convicted of Bribery.

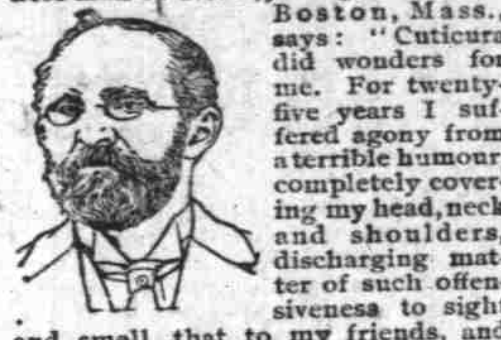
