LEAD AND ZINC

THE YEAR 1904 HAS BEEN A PROSPEROUS ONE FOR LEAD AND ZINC MINING INDUSTRY

In the Mississippi Valley the Production of Lead Increased Considerably During the Past Year and is Still Increasing.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—According to a report issued today by the United States Geological Survey, the year 1904 was a prosperous one for the lead and zinc mining and smelting industry of the United States and a year of extraordinary expansion in the production of spelter. The total gross production of lead in the country is given as 307,000 short tons, valued at \$26,402,000. In the Mississippi Valley the production of lead increased considerably during 1904 and this increase is still going on. In the lead-zinc regions of southwest Missouri and southeast Kansas the production of lead approached the record of 1901. The principal producing camps were Joplin, Webb City, Carterville, Galena, Duwag and Granby. In southeast Missouri further progress has been made by an increased activity among the older mines. The Cour d'Alene district of Idaho is the most important single lead producing district in the United States. The lead contents of the output of these Idaho mines is given as 108,854 short tons. In Colorado, Leadville continues to be the principal lead-producing camp. Fresh discoveries at Leadville hold out the promise of a considerable increase in the production. Utah has increased its output by enlarging operations in the Tintic district. The production of spelter in the United States in 1904 amounted to

186,02 short tons, valued at \$18,670,200, as compared with a production of 159,219 tons in 1903. The principal increase in the production of zinc has taken place in Kansas. The production of zinc ore was also stimulated by various causes in Illinois, the Missouri-Kansas district, in the Rocky Mountain regions, in Wisconsin, Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee.

GETS HIS MONEY

CRUIERS SHOULD HAVE SHOWN THEY COULD FULFILL CONTRACT TO GET FORFEIT.

Supreme Court Awards Cash Deposit to Depositor—Justice of the Peace Courts Have Jurisdiction Over Embellishment Cases Under Statute.

Holding that, although the repudiation of an agreement by the vendee, before the time for performance had arrived, would probably excuse the vendor from making a former tender of his part of the agreement, it does not relieve him from showing an ability to comply with the contract in order to show the former in default, Justice Bean of the supreme court, hands down an opinion in the case of Wells Fargo & Co., plaintiff, vs. James E. Page, defendant, Willis H. Gilbert, defendant and respondent, and John A. Benson, and F. A. Hyde, defendants and appellants, affirming the decree of Judge Frazer of the circuit court, for Multnomah county, the effect of which is that the appellants, Benson and Hyde, are not entitled to \$10,000 forfeit money placed on deposit in the Wells Fargo bank of Portland, by Gilbert, as a guarantee of faithful performance of contract on his part.

Benson and Hyde are the twin of land speculators who were indicted in California upon the charge of land frauds in Oregon and Washington, but which indictment was dismissed by the court on habeas corpus proceedings on the ground of insufficiency. In the case decided Benson and Hyde and Gilbert entered into a contract in which the former were to sell to the latter \$250,000 acres of land in Washington, which consisted of forest reserve base to be used for the selection of government land outside of the reserve.

The selections were still pending approval by the commissioner of the general land office and the deeds were to be delivered, upon such approval, the contract being conditional upon that score. As stipulated in the contract, Gilbert deposited \$10,000 in the Wells Fargo bank at Portland as forfeit money in event of his failing to comply with the terms of the contract, and \$10,000 besides to be paid to Benson and Hyde as purchase price on land as fast as selections were approved by the department and the deeds were placed on deposit to the credit of Gilbert by them.

In January, 1903, the commissioner approved selections covering 4180 acres of land and it was transferred to Gilbert and paid for. In September, 1902, the timber on the land was destroyed and injured by fire and Gilbert notified Benson and Hyde that he would decline to receive or pay for any more of the land and demanded from the bank the return of the forfeit money. Hyde and Benson, without attempting to secure the approval of any more selections or trying to place themselves in a position to comply with the terms of the contract, also demanded the forfeit money, and the bank being in doubt, filed a bill in equity for a decree requiring Gilbert and Benson and Hyde, and the defendant Page, to interplead, paid the money into court and was discharged from further liability. Page's claim upon the forfeit money was settled, but Gilbert, Benson and Hyde filed pleading setting up their respective claims, and upon a trial the money was decreed to be paid over to Gilbert, and Benson and Hyde appealed.

It developed afterward that the commissioner approved none of the other selections of Benson and Hyde, except for 160 acres, all having been rejected upon the ground of fraud. An appeal was taken from the order of the department and it was reversed on March 20, 1903, after the expiration of the time of performance, thus showing that Benson and Hyde were at no time in a position to fulfill their part of the contract or make a tender of deed to Gilbert.

"Embezzlement" is Larceny. In upholding the jurisdiction of the municipal courts, upon which is conferred the powers of a justice of the peace, and in affirming the decree of Judge Frazer of the circuit court for Multnomah county, Justice Moore of the supreme court, renders an opinion, the clause in the state criminal statutes covering the crime of embezzlement and larceny and reading, "shall be deemed guilty of larceny," etc., must be so construed as to render the term "embezzlement" equivalent to "larceny."

This question comes up in the case of the state vs. A. J. Browning, who was arrested upon the charge of embezzlement of \$20, tried and convicted in the municipal court and sentenced to jail imprisonment. An appeal was taken to the circuit court where the case was tried anew, resulting in the same judgment, when defendant appealed to the supreme court. The ground for appeal was that the municipal court had no jurisdiction over the case but the appellate court holds that, under the charter of Portland, and its interpretation of the statute mentioned, the municipal court, being vested with the powers of a justice of the peace, may try an accused on the charge of larceny or embezzlement, when the sum involved does not exceed \$25, and commit him to the county jail not to exceed one year, or less than a month, or impose a fine of from \$25 to \$100.

SENSATION OF THE SEASON

Record Made by Snedigar, Berkeley's Snappy Right Half, in the Second Half.

California Obligated to Put in Heaviest Men in Order to Go Against Heavy Oregon Line—Oregon University Defeats Chemawa in Good Game.

BERKELEY, Oct. 28.—(Special to Statesman.)—California varsity this afternoon defeated the Oregon agricultural college team from Corvallis, Oregon, by the score of 16 to 0. The sensation of the day was a magnificent run of fifty-five yards for a touchdown made by Snedigar, the right half for California. Snedigar got past Dolan, Oregon's right tackle and had a clear field in front of him. Williams, Oregon's speedy left half shot after him and kept gaining until the goal line was reached, when he tackled Snedigar, but too late as he had gone over the line and made five points for his team.

In the beginning of the game California put in fresh men to hold the positions of quarter, half and fullback. They were too light and could make no gains against the heavy Oregon line. Before the half was over the regular varsity backs were put in and they began to play real football. Force kicked a field goal in this half, making the score 4 to 0.

Prent Grey of California, and Bundy of Oregon, were rendered unconscious by kicks on the head and carried from the field. During the first half Williams of Oregon made a brilliant end run of thirty yards. The second half started off with a rush. Sperry, Snedigar and Mead bucked the Oregon men off their feet. Snedigar made his great run for a score and Force kicked a goal, making the total score 10 to 0. Two field goals were tried by California after this but both failed.

Indians Not Heavy Enough. EUGENE, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special to Statesman.)—The Oregon university football team administered a defeat to the Chemawa Indian team, on the university gridiron this afternoon, by the score of 17 to 0, in a game that was characterized by stubborn defense, in which both sides came in for equal honors, and the splendid team work of the home eleven. The star player for the local aggregation was undoubtedly Templeton, Oregon's left half, who proved himself a marvel both in the aggressive and defensive. The work of Kerron, fullback, and Moulsh, left tackle, was also noteworthy.

Bube Sanders, the big and powerful Indian fullback, was relieved from this position by Shookuk, and took center where he did effective work until he was forced out of the game by a bad leg and was substituted by Teddy, a very strong line backer who made repeated gains on center bucks. POWER OF SEEDS TO GERMINATE.

The folks in the national department of agriculture have been making some instructive experiments for the purpose of determining how long seeds live in the soil.

It has thus been ascertained that some kinds keep best when well buried and some do not. The three factors that act with most force in determining germination are heat, moisture, and oxygen.

At the greatest depth the amount of moisture is always uniform, the supply of the air is greatly lowered, and the temperature is much reduced. It is to be remembered that it was a treatment of the case at Washington and that some allowance must be made accordingly.

At any rate, the temperature there decreases rapidly when we go below the surface, and by the time that three and a half feet below the surface was reached the temperature throughout the year was comparatively uniform.

As a result of what was ascertained it got to be held that the mere fact that certain seeds retain their power of germination for a period of years when buried in the soil brands the plants which they produced as weeds. In other words, the length of time that seeds can remain in the soil and still retain the power of germination largely determines their noxiousness. For this reason bad weeds are difficult to eradicate when once the seeds are allowed to mature.

Thus it was ascertained that "with few exceptions" the unexpected appearing of cheat comes from seeds that have been mixed with wheat or other grains, so that they passed unobserved, or from seeds that have been scattered with stable manure.

In the summering up of the whole matter we get the truth that the seeds of some of the worst weeds can be destroyed by deep plowing, if the soil is left undisturbed for some time. The deeper seeds are buried the better is vitality preserved. Vitality is best preserved, even in weeds, when the seeds are carefully harvested and stored in a dry and comparatively cool place.—Home and Farm.
