The figures prepared by the county clerk show Marion county to be in splendid condition, and taking into consideration the fact that the report does not cover the county's assets such as the court house and grounds, poor farm, bridges, road machinery, etc., the showing is probably the best ever made in the history of the county.

COUNTY CLERK PREPARES LIST SHOWING VALUATION OF TAXABLE PROPERTY.

Total Road District Valuation \$358,691 Less Than in 1904—Many Districts Signify Intention of Levying Special Tax for Road Purposes.

According to the figures prepared by County Clerk J. W. Roland the combined taxable property valuation of the forty road districts in Marion county as taken from the 1905 assessment roll is \$358,691 less than was shown by the roll of 1904.

The new road law provides that whenever three freeholders of any road district petition the road supervisor it shall be his duty to call a meeting of the legal voters of the district by posting three notices in different parts of the district at least ten days before the time appointed for the meeting, which notices shall state the object of the meeting and the time and place of holding the same.

POWERS OF MEETINGS.

District road meetings legally called shall have power to determine what, if any, county roads or portions thereof of the special district shall be improved in any special manner, and to determine the extent and character of the improvements they shall make thereon.

INCREASE OF ASSESSMENT.

The Klamath County Roll for 1905 Shows a Heavy Basis Over Last Year's Valuations.

The summary of the assessment roll of Klamath county for 1905 has been filed in the secretary of state's office and shows the following figures:

Net value equalized, \$3,975,183

The net valuation of Klamath county for 1904 was \$3,262,875, which shows that there has been an increase this year of \$712,308, or about 22 per cent.

follows: "There is nothing the matter with Kansas," by Governor E. W. Hoch; "Grand Old Missouri," by ex-Governor Francis, and "Peace," by former Governor Wise of Virginia.

Kansas All There.

Governor Hoch, who responded to the toast "There is Nothing the Matter With Kansas," made in reply to William Allen White's famous utterance under the caption "What's the Matter With Kansas?" said:

"Kansas was fashioned in an heroic mold, and its life has always been intense. In the battle of ideas as well as the battle of bullets Kansas has ever been far out on the firing line.

"Kansas is neither eastern nor western, northern nor southern; it is the central state, the hub of the Union. It is the rich juicy meat in the national sandwich.

"There is nothing the matter with Kansas, materially," said Governor Hoch, who, after enumerating the great resources of the state, said:

"But the real greatness of the state is not measured by its geographical location, by its territorial extent, or by its material resources. The real greatness of a state is measured by the character of its people.

"Kansas," he said, "could make the same proud boast made once by a citizen of Maine, that 'we raise men here.'"

"Men whom the lust of office does not kill;

Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy;

Men who possess opinions and a will;

Men who have honor—men who will not lie.

Men who can stand before a demagogue and down his treacherous stratagems without winking;

Tall men, sun-crowned, who live above the fog,

In publicity and in private thinking."
