Investigation of the Opium Ring Frauds. SIX THOUSAND MINERS Are Thrown out of Employment on account of the Strike.

SCRANTON, Pa., Nearly six thousand men have been thrown out of employment by the Delaware and Hudson Canal company, which discharges all the miners in their employ that came from the Lehigh region after the strike there.

A Brakeman Killed. NOGALES, March 3.—George Parker, a brakeman on the New Mexico and Arizona railroad, was instantly killed at the company's yard at Berson, he was uncoupling cars from the engine when he made a misstep and fell on the track and the engine passed over him severing his head from his body. He was only 19 years old.

The Jealous Paramour. OMAHA NEWS, March 3.—Mrs. Helen Howard was shot and instantly killed last night by Frank Ryan. Ryan had been boarding with Mr. and Mrs. Howard and had been criminally intimate with the latter. He was arrested late last night. He claims the shooting was accidental.

The Opium Ring. SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—The Examiner this morning has six columns of details of the examination by the special commission into the charges against custom officers, charged with being connected with the opium ring at Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Victoria. The Examiner states that the headquarters of the ring are at Victoria and all its agents hold government positions. There are several at Seattle and Port Townsend.

Collector Abraham, of Portland, credited with stating to commissioners that was satisfied that both Tacoma and Seattle were used by smugglers in getting goods into this country duty free as they offer unrivalled facilities for the entrance of schooners and small craft. Grave suspicions are attached to a banker at Port Townsend who is said to be engaged in smuggling on a large scale and only uses his bank as a blind.

Mary Wont Marry. LONDON, March 3.—Mary Anderson denies the announcement that she has married a Londoner or that she intends to.

First Chinese Pensioner. WASHINGTON, March 3.—A pension has been granted to Ah Pen, a Chinaman in San Francisco, who served in the U. S. navy. This is the first pension ever granted to a Chinaman.

A Wild Train. TUSCON, Arizona, March 3.—James Redmond, an engineer, was thrown from the top of a wild freight train going down Dragon grade yesterday. The train broke in two and the air brakes refused to work. Redmond was setting on the brakes when he fell. The train was saved but he will probably die.

Striking Brakeman Still Out. ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 3.—The striking brakemen on the Atlantic & Pacific road are still out. The company is trying to fill their places with raw men, but without success.

DID NOT MOURN LONG

Though One Lover Was in the Grave and Another in the Pen. ATLANTA, Ga., March 2.—Joe White was to-day taken to the penitentiary to serve a life sentence for the murder of Charlie Phillips, of Campbell county, on the 2d of July last. There was a woman in the case. Joe White loved Lucy Chandler, who was also a favorite with Charlie Phillips. As the Fourth of July festivities were approaching in Palmetto, the two suitors repaired to Lucy's house on the evening of the 2d, when they were chagrined each at meeting the other, and as White was obstinate and unwilling to yield, hard words grew out of hard feelings and hard blows followed, ending in Joe taking down a gun and shooting Phillips so that he died. The woman, Lucy Chandler, over whom the murder took place, removed immediately after the murder, and although one of the ardent lovers was in a felon's cell and the other in his grave, Lucy did not mourn long, but set her cap for new catches, and in November last was married.

Joe White, as he was behind the bars in his cell this morning, learned for the first time of the marriage of the woman for whom he had won a hard destiny even before his fate was decided.

Killed Over a Game of Cards. SOCORRO, N. M., March 2.—Intelligence of a stabbing affray which occurred at White Oaks, Lincoln county, a few days ago, in which a man by the name of Foley lost his life, was to-day brought to this city. The particulars were as follows: Foley, who was a stranger in the town, had stopped at the cabin of Jim Curry to spend the night. After supper the two men sat down to a game of cards, during which an altercation arose, and Curry, grasping a large knife that laid upon the table completely disemboweled his adversary. He is under arrest. This is the same Curry who, several years ago, gained so much notoriety in Texas and barely escaped being lynched at the hands of a mob for the brutal murder of an actor named Porter.

News from all Parts of the World.

THE NEW TARIFF BILL. Mills of Texas Expects Republicans to Assist in Passing the Measure.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—Chairman Mills is much pleased with the results of the work of the democratic members of his committee. He says the bill is so conservative and fair that it will commend itself to a majority of the house. He admits that fourteen democrats of the Randall school will probably vote against the measure, two from Pennsylvania, two from New Jersey, four from Ohio, four from Louisiana, and two from California. He expects, however, that their votes will be offset by those of eight or ten republicans, mostly from the Northwest.

The aggregate reduction proposed by the bill is about \$50,000,000. It is intended, however, to re-enact the old package, clause, providing for a duty on packages which does not lay special tax on packages of different kinds, but merely provides for the finding of the value of the good and that the duty be assessed on them accordingly. This will add from five to ten million dollars to the revenue, so that the net reduction will not exceed forty-five million dollars.

It is the opinion of a majority of the committee that the revenue of the government should be reduced at least \$70,000,000. Twenty-five dollars, therefore, are left to be disposed of by changes in internal revenue taxation.

Negro Shot Dead. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 2.—Joe Hanby, colored, was shot and killed about 3 o'clock this morning, by Anthony Bingham, also colored. Bingham was in the room with Hanby's wife when the latter went home, and the door was locked on the inside. Hanby's wife refused to let him in, and he tried to break through a window, but was shot dead by Bingham. The murderer escaped, but Hanby's wife was arrested and jailed.

Mitchell's Fight Spoiled. LONDON, March 2.—Charley Mitchell, pugilist, was summoned before the local magistrate at Cheley to-day to answer to the charge of arranging for a prize fight with John L. Sullivan. Mitchell was accompanied by Rowell and Kilrain, and disavowed his intention to break the peace of England. He was bound over in two thousand pounds.

Stay of Execution Granted. PORTLAND, Oregon, March 2.—Judge Stearns to-day granted a stay of execution and allowed the counsel till to-morrow to file a notice of appeal in the case of Chung Ling, who was sentenced to be hanged to-day.

A Democrat Resigns. NEW YORK, March 2.—General John Newton has resigned the position of commissioner of public works for this city, in order to accept the appointment of chief coast surveyor.

A Mother's Deed. KEYWEST, Fla., March 2.—A Baracoa dispatch reports the murder by the mother of her four children. She cut their heads off with a hatchet. Two were drowned in a tub and all cut up. She said the devil tempted her.

Notorious Woman Made Rich. OMAHA, March 2.—Mrs. Mollie Koltray, notorious here, has fallen heir to \$75,000. Her parents lived in Sioux City and by the recent death of her mother this property descended to her.

T. Sorenson's Body Found. ASTORIA, March 2.—The body of T. Sorenson was found to-day about three feet from the bow of the wrecked steamer Gleaner. The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union will bury him.
