

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS

Itemized Account of Doings in City and Country.

Fired by Water.

An amusing incident occurred at the depot as the one o'clock train was pulling out for Portland to-day. Three fellows with whom it is an alternative between the passes and brake beams, had secreted themselves at Jefferson underneath between the engine and tender, and had ridden through to this point. They were discovered just as the train was steaming out, and the fireman, having plenty of water in his tank, proceeded to give them a shower bath. They crawled out better-baptized than they ever were before, shook themselves and smilingly took the road behind the train. In this connection it is a noticeable fact that this class of "passengers" give Salem the grand go-by, there not having been a "vag" arrested in the City the past three weeks, while on almost every train one or more of them are seen stealing a ride. Last Sunday night, on the Overland express there were five bums on the brake-beams, and in fact scarcely a train passes without some of them. They are frequently seen jumping on to stock and freight cars upon the off side from the station, and as the train pulls out they swing in between the cars and ride on the bumpers. The movements of these fellows to secure a ride are laughable, although they are often very dangerous.

Death Among the Children.

Several families in McMinnville have been called upon recently to mourn the death of their loved little ones from meningitis, which is quite prevalent there. The Reporter of the 13th feelingly says: "There are many sad homes in our city to-day. During the last three days three of our darlings have passed into the great beyond, and anxious mothers and fathers are wondering whose turn will come next. Saturday evening there were many serious looking men on the streets, and it was an easy matter to tell on what their thoughts were running. Our heartfelt sympathy is with the afflicted families; it is poor consolation, but 'Thy will, O Lord, not mine, be done' is the cry from many of the hearts of those who have stood by and seen the little white horse carry away the darling of the household."

A Jolly Supper.

At the close of the council meeting last night, Bill Anderson extended an invitation to the council, as newly constructed, and to the members of the press to partake of an oyster supper at his expense at Charley Hellenbrand's, and the same was served in good style, likewise enjoyed thoroughly. During the progress of the feast a remark of Councilman-elect Collins created much merriment, to the effect that "what the council has lost in ability it has gained in bulk."

CITY COUNCIL.

Hon. J. J. Murphy Steps Into Mayor Ramsey's Shoes.

SHAW AND RAYMOND RESIGN.

And Geo. Collins and Geo. Williams Take Their Places—Other Business.

The regular meeting of the city council last night was called to order by Recorder Strickler, acting mayor. Every member of the council was present.

Journal of previous meeting read and approved.

Resignation of Mayor Ramsey read and accepted.

It was moved by Minto that the council proceed to the nomination and election of mayor. Shaw nominated J. J. Thompson. Minto nominated J. J. Murphy.

The ballot was then taken and the vote stood Murphy 7, Thompson 1.

Murphy declared elected mayor. Minto moved that the marshal be instructed to find the mayor elect and escort him to the chair.

Councilman Shaw then handed a paper to the mayor which he asked to have read and acted upon immediately. The communication was as follows:

To the Common Council of the City of Salem, Or.:—I hereby resign the office of alderman of said city for the second ward.

J. J. SHAW.

Dated March 13, 1888. The resignation was accepted and George Collins elected to fill the vacancy.

The marshal was then dispatched after Mr. Collins.

Councilman on ordinances was granted further time to report.

Chairman Bush, of committee on accounts and current expenses reported favorably on the following bills:

The bill of C. F. Royal for \$100.00 read and ordered paid.

Skinner reported that he could get no reduction on the electric light bill.

Bills of Electric Light Co. for \$225.00 and water company for \$83.72 were ordered paid.

Bush again presented to the council the bill of the Gutta Percha & Rubber Mfg. Co., Portland, for \$862.50 and interest from May 9, 1887, to Feb. 25, 1888 for fire hose bought for the city in 1886. The bill was referred to special committee of Bush, Skinner and Lafore.

A petition from C. B. Moore to close up the north half of the alley in block 78 was referred back to the petition for more signers.

Lafore asked for further time to report on the bridge at the north end of Commercial street. Granted.

In the matter of the complaint of the Pacific Vinegar & Fruit Preserving Co., in regard to the bridge across Mill-creek, Lafore, on the committee on streets and public property, handed the council a written opinion of the city attorney regarding the liability of the city for damages.

Mayor-elect Murphy and Councilman-elect Collins were at this juncture ushered in by a special committee and after being sworn in by the recorder entered upon the discharge of their duties.

The matter of the proposed bridge at the north end of Commercial street was discussed at length, several petitions and remonstrances being presented. Referred to committee on streets and public property.

The bill of the Capital Adventure Co. for \$22.50 damage to goods by overflow of city water pipes, ordered paid.

Committee on printing was instructed to advertise for bids for city printing.

Request of board of fire delegates that fees for exempt fire certificates be reduced from \$2 to \$1 was presented, and matter referred to committee on fire and water with instructions to city attorney to prepare ordinance, if legal.

City attorney was instructed to prepare ordinance regarding payment of interest on city warrants.

Discussion of the condition of the

mill pond near the water works followed, and the street supervisor was instructed to fix drain pipe under the pond.

Proposal of D. H. Wagon to place twenty-seven to thirty maple trees in the lower end of Willson avenue; referred to special committee of Minto, Lafore, and Muir.

Skinner, Hutton, and Bush appointed special committee to purchase a safe for city use.

Street commissioner was instructed to repair Commercial street covered bridge.

Councilman Raymond handed in the following:

Mayor and Common Council of the City of Salem:—I herewith hand you my resignation as councilman from the First ward, a change of residence necessitating such action. Thanking the members of the council and voters of the First ward for the honor conferred upon me, I am, very respectfully,

Councilman from 1st ward. Geo. Williams and Ed. Hirsch were nominated for the vacancy. The vote resulted: Williams 4, Hirsch 2.

The new councilmen were appointed to the committees filled by their predecessors.
