THE CROWN PRINCE TAKES CHARGE,

The Emperor Wishes him to Become Familiar with Affairs.

BERLIN, March 24.—The decree which was issued yesterday authorizing the Crown Prince to transact official business, expresses the wish of the emperor that he become conversant with the affairs of state by immediate participation in them. It intrusts to the Crown Prince the preparation and discharge of such business as may be assigned to him by the emperor, and empowers him to affix his signature to documents as representative of the emperor without especial authority on such accasions.

CANADIAN PACIFIC SUBSIDY.

Ten Million Dollars in Cash and Five Million Acres of Land.

EPIDEMIC DISEASES.

Bill to Establish Stations to Prevent Their Importations.

WASHINGTON, March 23.-The Senate Committee on Epidemie Diseases, of which Senator Harris is preparing a bill which will be reported in a day or two, providing for the maintenance of eight national quarantine stations to prevent the importation of epidemic diseases into this country. The places at which the bill proposes to establish stations and the amounts which it will appropriate to cover the cost of the establishment and maintenance are: Deleware Breakwater, \$60,-000 ;Cape Charles, Virginia, \$100,000; Sapelo Sound, Georgia, \$30,000; Mouth of Missippi, \$45,000; Key West, Florida, \$78,000; San Diego, California, \$55,000 ; San Francisco, \$85,000; Port Townsend, \$45,000.

Canadian Pacific Subsidy.

OTTAWA, March 28.—It is stated to-day that the Dominion Cabinet has decided to pay the Canadian Pacific \$10,000,000 cash and surrender 5,000,000 acres of land, to quash the monopoly.
