Ringing Resolutions to Rally Repub-
lican Voters.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

The committee on resolutions sub-
mitted the following report:

1st. The republican party of
Marion county in convention as-
sembled to submitting a ticket to the
voters of this county recognizes that
the true principle of all popular
government is such an administra-
tion of wise laws that will secure the
greatest good to the greatest num-
ber.

2nd. That to attain this object
only such men should be elected to
office as will carefully study the
true interests of the whole people
and will place the welfare of their
constituents first and their personal
interests last, performing their
official duties without fear or favor.

3rd. That the burden of taxation
should be borne equally by all, in
proportion to the amount of property
each person owns; and with this
object in view, the existing tax laws
of this state should be so amended
as to secure that result.

4th. That the improvement of
our rivers and harbors is essential to
the welfare of the people; hence the
action of the democratic party in de-
nying the state of Oregon such aid,
merits condemnation by the people.

5th. That the action and inaction
of the democratic party since its re-
turn to power has been detrimental
to enterprise, dangerous to the most
vital interests of American labor and
is tending toward the destruction
of many of our greatest indus-
tries.

6th. That we recognize the prin-
ciple of protection as equally appli-
cable to all the industries of the
United States and that the Amer-
ican policy should benefit alike all
citizens, whether engaged in agri-
culture, wool or stock growing,
manufacturing or mining. That
the industries of the country are in-
ter-dependent and mutually sustain-
ing and that the people of different
sections are customers and con-
sumers. That the existing tariff
policy, both free and dutiable, is
working to harmony with the in-
dustrial and productive interests of
all sections of the country, and any
departure from this policy whether
directed against raw or finished
American products, will seriously
injure American labor and Amer-
ican industries.

7th. That the republican party
has been and will remain true to the

in its loyalty to our free institu-
tions demanding a free and fair bal-
lot, honestly counted, holding to the
right of the majority to rule in all
matters of legitimate legislation in-
cluding the right to restrict, regulate
or prohibit the sale and traffic in

8th. That the republican party
