LATEST DISPATCHES.

A Chinese Certificate Boodler Peaches on his Palls. COAL MINE EXPLOSION. One Hundred Miners Involved in the Calamity. KANSAS CITY, March 29.—The following dispatch has just been received from Rich Hill, Missouri: About 4 o'clock this afternoon there was a rumbling sound in mine No 6 at this place, and a moment after a fearful explosion occurred that entirely wrecked the mine and buried in the debris over 100 miners, who were cut off from all means of escape. Forty bodies have already been taken out. The superintendent of the mine was taken out badly injured, but will survive. In the terrible excitement and confusion it is impossible to give a list of names, or even an estimate as to the full extent of the disaster, but it is now thought that over fifty men were killed. The mine is situated six miles distant from the town. There were two explosions, and it is said the total loss of life will reach sixty men. Rich Hill is located in Bates county, about sixty-five miles south of Kansas City. LATER PARTICULARS. KANSAS CITY, March 30.—A dispatch from Rich Hill this morning states that the bodies recovered from yesterday's mine disaster show the terrible force of the explosion. Coal dust was blown into the flesh of the dead, until they look like the bodies of negroes. Some of the corpses are frightfully mutilated; arms, legs and eyes have in some instances been blown out of their sockets; while other unfortunates are so disfigured as to be unrecognizable. The dead are strewn in the corridors of the mine, and it is feared that all of them will never be recovered, as gas is filling the pit and choking the survivors. The little village is completely paralyzed with horror, and men and women are wandering about the streets, crying for the return of those known to be in the bottom of the pit. Double Murder by a Jealous Husband. KEARNY (Neb.) Mar. 30.—Albert Murrish, a farmer living six miles east of this place, shot his wife dead yesterday, and fatally wounded Thomas Patterson, who was employed about the farm. Murrish believed that his wife was untrue to him and that Patterson was the cause. Playing with Fire Arms. BUTTE (Mont.), March 30.—Wesley Warren and Willie Jack, both twelve years of age, were playing with a pistol yesterday. Young Warren accidentally shot Willie Jack, mortally wounding him. Car Shops Burnt. AURORA (Ill.), Mar. 30.—The loss by last night's fire in the car shops of the Chicago, Burlington, and Quincy railroad Co. is nearly \$200,000.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Emperor Frederick's physicians have forbidden him taking open air exercise. The decrease in the national debt during the present month will amount to nearly \$10,000,000. Major General Terry wants to resign from the army, assigning bad health as the cause of his retirement. The inundation in the vicinity of Cassel, Germany, is increasing. Sixty-seven villages are submerged. The New York senate has refused to pass a bill to permit women to vote at town and municipal elections. The second trial of Jacob Sharp, the boodle monger, will begin in New York on Monday. His attorneys will move for a change of venue. Grand Master Workman Powderly, last night issued a special call to the members of the Knights of Labor to return to the first principles of the order, and take leave of the folly of striking in vain. CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION. A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 209 delegates, apportioned among the several counties as follows: Baker 5, Del. Lake 2, Benton 7, Lane 10, Chickamaug 9, Linn 10, Clatsop 7, Malheur 12, Columbia 4, Marion 14, Coos 7, Morrow 6, Crook 3, Multnomah 20, Curry 3, Polk 20, Douglas 9, Tillamook 3, Gilliam 5, Umatilla 10, Grant 6, Union 8, Jackson 7, Wallowa 4, Josephine 4, Wasco 1, Klamath 3, Washington 8, Yamhill 9. Total 209. The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 150 voters and one for every fraction over one-half thereof, cast for Hon. Binger Hermann, congressman, at the last general election. The committee recommend that the primaries be held March 31, 1888, and the county conventions April 4, 1888, unless otherwise ordered by the county central committee. Republican electors and voters of the state, without regard to past political affiliations, who believe in the American principle of protective tariff and dignifying American labor, giving free, popular education to the masses of the people, effectually protecting all human rights in every section of our common country, and who desire to promote friendly feeling and permanent harmony throughout the state by maintaining a government pledged to these objects and principles, are cordially invited to unite in selecting delegates to the republican state convention. MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing. Starting Confession. SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—W. M. A. Boyd, customs inspector, now awaiting trial for trafficking in Chinese return certificates, took the stand this morning in the case of Ciprico who is being tried for the same offence. He created a sensation by making a complete confession. He stated that inspectors Ciprico, McLean, Kipp and himself entered into a conspiracy in 1884 to send A Hintz to China to sell the certificates to the Chinese who desired to enter the United States. On January 10th, 1885, Hintz sailed for Hong Kong, taking a large number of certificates. They were soon disposed of and more were forwarded. The venture proved profitable, and the selling of certificates had been continued up to the time the arrests were made. The Engineers' Strike. SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 29.—The local division of the brotherhood of locomotive engineers yesterday received an official communication from the east urging the brotherhood to stand by the strikers. The official epistle also stated that the brotherhood were determined to win, even if it became necessary to call out all the western roads, and let the people judge as to the right or wrong of the demands made by the strikers. The brotherhood were advised also to hold themselves in readiness for orders to quit work. Wants to Step Higher. WASHINGTON, March 29.—It is reported that Commissioner of Indian Affairs J. D. Atkins will resign his office within the next three months. The legislature to be chosen in Tennessee next fall will elect a successor to Senator Harris, of that state. It is Atkins' intention to be a candidate for the senate against Harris, and after resigning his office he will make a thorough canvass of the state. The Funeral Cortage. TOLEDO (Ohio), March 29.—The special train with the remains of Chief Justice Waite, members of his family, associate justices of the supreme court and representatives of both houses of congress, arrived here this morning. The remains were taken to the residence of Rich. Waite, brother of the deceased, to enable Mrs. Waite and other members of the family to obtain a private view. A Young Avenger. CARLINVILLE (Ill.), March 29.—William Wineland was shot and killed here to-day by his 12 year old adopted son. The father of the boy was murdered by Wineland last fall.
