LATEST DISPATCHES.

QUARRYMEN'S RIOT QUELLED.
A Crowd of Italian Strikers Intimidated by a Bold Stand.

YOUNGSTOWN (Ohio), April 3.—Nearly 300 employes at the Carbon quarries of the Limestone Co., of which John A. Logan, Jr., is general manager and part owner, went on a strike yesterday because of a reduction in wages. At one of the quarries about 50 men went to work. The strikers attempted to drive them out, but the sheriff of the county and his son, who had been telegraphed for, had arrived on the scene, and they together with young Logan planted themselves in the path of the strikers. The mob were told to disperse and they stopped instantly and then rushed for the wood. Logan and the two officers remained in their position and opened fire point blank. An Italian named Nozero tumbled over on the ground with a bullet in his knee. This stampeded the mob, which became thoroughly frightened, and fled. Ten of the leaders were captured and locked up. All is quiet in the quarries to-day.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.
Emperor Frederic rested poorly last night, his cough being worse than usual.
Smallpox is raging terribly in the small town of Bacachi, Sonora, and a complete quarantine is established.
A city ticket composed of women for mayor and council was elected in Okaloosa, Kan., yesterday by 66 majority.

In Los Angeles the jury was completed this morning, in the case of Hattie Wolstein, charged with the murder of Dr. Harlin, the dentist, and the trial commenced.
The report of the local signal office gives the rainfall for the last month as slightly in excess of the average rainfall for March in California and Washington territory, but less than average in Oregon.
Jack Massey, conductor on the southbound Los Angeles express, was shot in the groin by a passenger near Conden last evening. The wound is not necessarily fatal. The man doing the shooting was arrested.

Representative Thomas, of Illinois, is dying by inches at his residence in Washington of cancer of the throat. There is no hope of his recovery, and his doctors say it is only a question of time when the end will come.
In a runaway accident in San Diego yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Littlefield, wife of Dr. Irvah Littlefield of Boston, sustained a fracture of the skull, and recovery is doubtful. Mrs. F. W. Bradley was knocked down by the horse and seriously injured.

PRISON CHAPLAINS.

ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL:—In your mention of my name in yesterday's issue of your paper, you say I served as chaplain of Michigan state prison four years. You should have said six years, as I was chaplain there from September, 1855, to September, 1858, when I resigned and took my place in the regular pastorate, and in October, 1859, I was reappointed and served until October, 1872, when I resigned and went into the regular pastorate again; in which work I have continued until last September, when I asked for a supernumerary relation, that I might spend a year with my friends in Oregon and Washington Territory. The superintendent of your prison invited me to preach to the convicts last Sabbath and I accepted the invitation, and enjoyed the service very much, and hope some good may result from the effort. I am surprised to learn that your state makes no provision for the appointment and support of a chaplain to this prison. In Michigan we should as soon undertake to run a prison without a warden, as without a chaplain. With us the chaplains duties and responsibilities are clearly defined by the statute, and he is recognized as an officer of the prison, as really as any other official. My successor at our prison, a Baptist minister, appointed on my recommendation, is now in his 16th year's service, giving such entire satisfaction that no change of administration has jostled him, and they have grown to feel that they cannot afford to spare him. Your prison needs that kind of man as chaplain and you would soon come to feel that such an office pays. Then as your asylum is situated, the same man could serve those unfortunate creatures also; acting as chaplain of both institutions, which would furnish him with plenty of work, and I do hope at your next legislative session some man of influence will take hold of this matter, and secure an amendment to your statute, that will make provision for such an office, and that some man of the right stamp may be found in some of these christian bodies to fill that office nobly.

Mr. Editor, I desire to express my hearty endorsement of your criticism on Mr. Mills' representation of Kansas prohibition. That gentleman knows, if he is capable of representing matters pertaining to prohibition in Kansas, that he grossly misrepresents the matter and does it for the purpose of injuring the republican party, which is unjust and nicked in the extreme. The facts are, as demonstrated by figures, "which do not lie;" the prohibitory liquor law is as rigidly enforced in Kansas, as any prohibitory law upon the statute, and Mr. Mills must know it, and if he does not he ought to hold his peace.

MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

LABOR TROUBLES EXTENDING.
The "Q" Cars Boycotted at Kansas City—Other Trades on a Strike.

KANSAS CITY, April 2.—The boycott on Burlington freight went into effect in the yards here promptly at noon. A Fort Scott switch engine had just backed up to some Burlington cars, but when 12 o'clock struck the men left the cab and refused to haul it. The engine was soon uncoupled and the freight left standing.

KANSAS CITY, April 2.—At 5 o'clock this afternoon switchmen and firemen in the Santa Fe yards quit work in a body. They will go to work on condition that they are not required to handle Q. freight.

SPRINGFIELD (Ohio), April 2.—Indiana and Western engineers and firemen of the Brotherhood have notified General Manager Henderson that if he accepts any more C., B. & Q. cars they will strike.

MILWAUKEE, April 2.—Manager Miller said the St. Paul has laid off fully five thousand yard and switchmen along its system until the present trouble blows over. The order affects about eight hundred men in the yard and general offices in the city.

Iron Pipe Hands on a Strike.
PITTSBURG, April 2.—A general strike was inaugurated at Spang, Chalfant & Co.'s pipe mill, at Etna this morning. Six hundred men struck, and before the trouble is settled there are apprehensions that the entire works of this firm will be concerned.

Strike by House Painters.
CINCINNATI, April 2.—The house painters of this city, numbering over 8000, struck to-day for an advance in wages and a decrease in hours.

Budeau and Fred Graut, in which the character of the deceased hero of Appomattox is torn to pieces, and the writers plentifully bedaub each other with mire.
