### LATEST DISPATCHES.

**Panic at a Spanish Bullfight—One Hundred Persons Crushed.**  
**DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.**  
**John M. Gearin for Congressman—George Belt Re-nominated for District Attorney.**

**PENDLETON, April 4.**—At the morning session of the democratic state convention, John M. Gearin, of Multnomah county, was nominated for congress.  
**STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE.**  
**PENDLETON, April 4.**—R. H. Dearborn, of Salem, has been chosen a member of the democratic state central committee for Marion county.  
**GEORGE BELT RE-NOMINATED.**  
**PENDLETON, April 4.**—George W. Belt, of Salem, received the nomination for district attorney for the third judicial district in the democratic state convention this morning.  
**NO JOINT SENATOR NOMINATED.**  
**PENDLETON, April 4.**—The democratic state convention has left the nomination of a joint senator for Marion and Clackamas counties to the central committees of both counties.

**A Panic in a Bull Ring.**  
**CITY OF MEXICO, Apr. 4.**—The following has been received from Celaya: On Sunday afternoon about 4:45 o'clock the bull ring of Celaya was crowded with spectators, when a fire suddenly broke out on the fashionable side of the plaza. A panic seized upon the vast assemblage, and a frightful catastrophe was the result. One hundred persons were seriously wounded and eighteen lives were lost.  
The sides of the plaza being lined with matting as dry as tinder, and there being a slight wind blowing the Amphitheatre was in a blaze in a few seconds. Sixty-eight persons are badly burned; at least ten of them will die. Fifty persons in escaping were knocked down and trampled upon; many are very seriously, but none fatally, injured. The bulls maddened by the roaring of the flames broke loose and rushed through the surging mass of humanity tossing aloft and knocking over all who stood in their way.

**Train Collision.**  
**LOS ANGELES, April 4.**—Near San Fernando tunnel last night a freight train on the Southern Pacific collided with a construction train. Engineer Westernfield, of construction train and fireman Brooks of the freight, were killed and a half dozen laborers injured.  
**An Insane Woman's Freak.**  
**NEW YORK, April 3.**—Mrs. Tillie Sipp, aged 35, while in a fit of insanity this morning, threw her twelve year old son George out of a window in the fourth story at 169 East One Hundred and Twenty-second St. She jumped after the child. Both were seriously injured and will probably die. The husband of the woman is a baker and was not at home at the time.

**The Earthquakes in China.**  
**LONDON, April 3.**—The Oriental mail brings news of terrible earthquakes in China, and states that 15,000 people perished in four days. A huge chasm opened with convulsions, and engulfed large masses of unfortunate inhabitants. Water of blood red color issued from the fissures.  
**Valuable Records Found.**  
**PARIS, April 3.**—A large amount of correspondence between Napoleon I. and King Louis, of Holland, has been discovered, which will probably furnish valuable additions to the history of the emperor. The discovery was made in a lumber room.

**Inspector Ciprico on Trial.**  
**SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.**—In the trial to-day of Inspector Ciprico, charged with dealing in Chinese return certificates, it was shown that ninety certificates per steamer, went into the hands of the ring.

### Diamond Robbery.

**LOS ANGELES, April 4.**—The police have made public the fact that a tray containing \$3000 of diamonds was stolen from Klage's jewelry store on Saturday evening. There is no clew to the thief.

### Riotous Poles.

**WILKESBARRE, (Pa.), April 3.**—The Poles here yesterday became involved in a drunken riot, and the whole police force was called out. One policeman was badly injured, four Poles fatally wounded, and forty others seriously.

### Santa Fe Men go to Work.

**KANSAS CITY, April 3.**—At a general and secret meeting of switchmen in the yards here last night information was presented to the effect that the Santa Fe road would not force its men to handle "Q" freight. The meeting thereupon ordered that if such be the case the men on that road who went out last evening would resume work this morning. In accordance with this the men all took their places again this morning. The Santa Fe road has posted a notice that their road will receive no freight whatever of any kind to-day. All other roads are working all right except the Burlington.

### Sugar for Philadelphia.

**PHILADELPHIA, April 3.**—It is stated by reliable authority that Claus Spreckels, the California sugar king, now in this city, has decided to build a refinery in Philadelphia, and that the purchase of a site for it on the Delaware river front will be consummated to-day. It is understood \$5,000,000 capital will be put into the enterprise.  
All this is to be supplied by Spreckels himself. Contracts for the erection of a building, machinery, etc., will be placed in a few days.  
The capacity of the proposed refinery is put at 7000 barrels or 2,000,000 pounds per day. The cost of the plant has been stated at \$3,000,000, and the annual output as worth \$25,000,000.

### Democratic State Convention.

**PENDLETON (Or.), Apr. 3.**—In the morning session to-day of the democratic state convention, Col. J. K. Kelly, of Multnomah, was chosen temporary chairman, and C. J. Trenchard, of Clatsop, secretary. The usual committees were appointed. The convention took a recess till one o'clock, to hear the report of the committee on credentials.  
In the afternoon session, the report of the committee on credentials was read and adopted. Col. Irish, of California, was invited to a seat on the rostrum, which he took amid loud cheers. The reports of the committees on permanent organization and on order of business were read and adopted. On motion a committee of nine was appointed to draft a platform. Following are their names: Weatherford, Wager, McKee, Bond, Travillian, Bradshaw, D'Arcy, Walters and Smith. Starr was afterwards appointed instead of McKee and Eldridge instead of D'Arcy.  
On motion the convention adjourned till 4 o'clock, and meeting at the hour named, again adjourned till 9 to-morrow morning. In the opera house this evening Col. John P. Irish addressed a large audience.

### TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Two new cases of small pox have been discovered in Virginia, Nev. The weather is cold. It is feared the disease will continue to spread. The schools are still closed.  
Senator John Hamilton, one of the wealthiest men in the dominion, died in Montreal yesterday.

In Albuquerque, N. M., the republican municipal ticket is elected by a small majority.

### MORNING TELEGRAMS.

**Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.**  
**PROHIBITION IN KANSAS.**  
**Difficulties Encountered by the law Officers in Enforcing the law.**

**TOPEKA (Kan.), April 3.**—Attorney-General Bradford is advised of the failure of the jury to agree in the case brought against a druggist in Blue Rapids for selling phosphatic lemon rye as a non-intoxicant. Eleven were for conviction, but one held out for acquittal.

There is another case of the same kind pending in Greenwood county. It has been proved that this phosphatic lemon rye, a St. Louis compound, is composed of merely lime water, lemon juice and a very inferior quality of whisky, and that it intoxicates just as if it were unadulterated whisky.

Speaking of the liquor traffic in this state, in violation of the law, the attorney-general said all sorts of horrible nostrums were introduced into the state as medicine, when they were in truth liquor of the vilest sort. It was his determination to war against these compounds and to get them out of the state.

The greatest trouble has been experienced along the southern tier of counties bordering the Indian Territory and No Man's Land. Meade county of late has been overrun by a gang of boot-leggers, and the Rock Island people have seriously complained that their work has been retarded by the drunkenness of their men. The peddlers get their whisky in No Man's Land. It is "moonshine" whisky, and undoubtedly it is manufactured without molestation; for the United States collector and marshal of this district claim to have no authority to uproot this violation of the United States revenue laws.

Chautauqua county has had the same experience Meade has undergone, and it is more or less true of every county on the southern border. The most strenuous efforts are now being made by the attorney-general and the county attorneys to prevent smuggling, and it is thought that boot legging and whisky joints will soon be as unprofitable on the border as in other parts of Kansas, where the prohibitory liquor law is enforced.

### The Strike at Chicago.

**CHICAGO, April 3.**—Not a wheel turned in the Michigan Central yards after 7 o'clock this morning. While no strike was declared on this end, the road was completely tied up, the engineers, firemen and switchmen all having deserted their posts.  
The cause of such a state of affairs at the yards was the presence there of the "Q" freight train which was delivered yesterday, and the announcement by the Michigan Central that they would handle all freight delivered.

The statement that no work was done in the yards after 7 o'clock this morning, as explained by the company's representatives, does not mean that the Michigan Central's passenger service was interfered with. All passenger trains this morning arrived and departed on time, as usual. The strike was confined to switch engineers, firemen, and switchmen in the local freight yards of the company.

### Murderous Encounter.

**CHICAGO, April 3.**—At Lima, Ohio, last night Patrick Hughes, Dave Gallagher and James Stokey were stabbed to death in a fight with Dave Crowder and Wm. Goins (colored). The most intense excitement was caused by the murder, and the police were unable to keep the street clear. A mob formed around the police station, and the county jail was visited; but the murderers were not found as the authorities had them in hiding fearing mob violence.
