Diminished Account of Doings in City and Country

TWO VAGRANTS ARRESTED.

How the "Begging Boy" Scheme Worked to Support Two Worthless Vagrants.

Two disreputable characters, who arrived in town on the brake-beams of last night's train, were arrested by Marshal Ross about two o'clock this afternoon for being drunk and disorderly, and using obscene language on the streets. They both objected strongly to being pulled and a little force was required to lodge them in the cooler. One of the fellows has only one arm and that is covered with syphilitic sores. This arm was hurt a little while he was being led to jail and after he had been thrown inside he stood at the window and shoved his naked arm through the bars, while he complained loudly of the brutality of the officer who arrested him. The pair are accompanied by a "begging boy," who works on the sympathies of the community by displaying a frightfully scalded arm. He divides the proceeds of his begging with his pals, who spend their time in riotous living. This scheme is worked by many tramps who fix the "begging boy" for business by blistering his arm with a salve made of cotton oil and cantharides and then remove the blister, leaving a raw inflamed surface, very similar to a burn. Marshal Ross is looking for the boy who is begging for this crowd, and if he can be found the whole crowd will be prosecuted as vagrants.

A Colony Coming.

On the 5th inst. a colony of 70 persons, members of the Evangelical church, left Oil City and Franklin, Pa., for Oregon. Their objective point is Corvallis. There they expect to stop and look through Benton and Linn counties for a favorable location for the colony. It is in charge of F. J. Strayer, and in addition to the colony is announced to leave Western Pennsylvania in September. An effort should be made to locate a part of this colony in Marion county.

C. M. Harding, the confederate of Pearl Page, in the robbery of Dickenson the Alaskan, was brought up from Portland last night, and was taken to the penitentiary to serve out his five years sentence. He is rather a handsome fellow, was neatly dressed, and on the way up laughed and chatted with the passengers just as if the journey was one of pleasure.

Taken to the Asylum.

Frank Duneler, the North Salem sewing machine agent, whose insanity was mentioned in last evening's paper, was examined before Judge T. C. Shaw and committed to the asylum last night. His family is said to be in destitute circumstances and their condition should be looked after.

The Railroad Commissioners.

The railroad commission left this morning for the scene of the recent accident on the narrow gauge near Oswego, to examine into the cause of the disaster and to fix the blame, if any, where it belongs. The commission will return to Salem tomorrow.

Insane Patient's Escape and Recapture.

Eph. Thatcher and Dr. Irvine, of the asylum, went all day Wednesday pursuing a patient who escaped from that institution early in the morning. They followed him to Turner and to Marion, and captured him near the latter place.

Railroad Magnates.

C. F. Huntington, Charles F. Crocker, A. N. Towne and several other railroad magnates, passed through town on a special train about five o'clock last evening. They did not stop here even long enough to admire our depot.

Getting Down to Work.

The board of trade committee, appointed to raise money to advertise the town, has got to work, and has adopted a method that will simplify its labors. The members have prepared a list of 250 names of men who are able to subscribe a small sum monthly, and these names have been divided up and handed to various members of the board to be called on. A monthly subscription of \$1 from each for one year, will provide ample funds for sending pamphlets and other advertising matter abroad, and this to be placed where it is sure to be useful. Yesterday an advertisement was sent to a number of papers in Iowa, Illinois and Kansas, setting forth the fact that a pamphlet descriptive of the Willamette Valley would be sent on application to the president of the board of trade, which notices, it is morally certain, will bring in thousands of letters. We trust that every citizen who may be called on by the soliciting committee will subscribe his share, feeling that he is aiding an enterprise in which he is beneficially interested, and which, if carried through with proper energy, will secure the good of all. Now is the time when a man's personal interest is bound up and identified with an unselfish public spirit. Let each do his part.

Two Plucky Boys.

Frank Gaunt, stable-boy for Gaines Fisher, drove a horse and buggy into the mill pond near the water works last night for the purpose of washing them off. The horse became unmanageable and started to cross the pond. When he struck the main channel of Mill creek, which is about five feet deep at this place, the horse refused to swim and sunk under the water. Gaunt jumped from the buggy and swam to his head and held him up until Harry Minto, who was near by, jumped into the water and came to his assistance. They then cut the horse loose and got him ashore uninjured. The boys suffered no inconvenience from their bath, although it was too cold to be pleasant. They are to be commended for their pluck in saving the horse, which would undoubtedly have been drowned had it not been for their active work and presence of mind.

His right ankle was dislocated and the bones of the leg were fractured immediately above the joint. He will probably be laid up several weeks from the effects of his injuries; but he is to be congratulated upon escaping with nothing more serious than a fracture and dislocation.
