Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

CRAZED WITH DRINK.

An Inebriate Assaults his Daughter and Murders his Wife who Defends her.

CHICAGO, April 30.—While defending the honor of her 13-year-old stepdaughter against the fiendishness of her unnatural father, Mrs. Muehlberg was struck down with murderous intent by her husband, at a late hour last night, and is now dying.

Muehlberg returned to his home on Law avenue in an intoxicated condition. He went directly to the room where his three children lay sleeping and attempted an assault on his daughter Eleanor. The child screamed for aid, and Muehlberg's wife rushed in from the next room. The brute was beating the child about the head to silence her cries, and when his wife endeavored to stop him he turned and dealt her two blows, which cut her scalp and her face. She made several attempts to get to the door to call for aid, but was prevented by her husband beating her.

In the meantime all three of the children escaped from bed and endeavored to stay their cruel father's wrath. Mrs. Muehlberg at last succeeded in reaching the steps, where she managed with superhuman strength to cry for help. Muehlberg then shook the children from him and took a small crowbar from a tool chest and struck the woman over the head, crushing in her skull. For the first time he seemed to realize what he had done. He entreated the children not to tell who did the deed, and then taking some money, he fled.

The police have as yet been unable to find the murderer. A Service Pension Bill. WASHINGTON, April 30.—Representative Burrows of Michigan to-day introduced in the house a bill authorizing the secretary of the interior to place on the pension rolls upon application, the names of surviving honorably discharged soldiers and sailors who served at least ninety days in the late war, the rate of pension to be 1 cent per month for each day's actual service. Provision is made in the bill for the employment of a large number of additional clerks in the pension bureau and the office of the adjutant-general, for bringing up the rolls.

A Riotous Mob. SANTIAGO DE CHILE, April 30.—Yesterday afternoon a mob composed of the worst elements of the populace gathered to destroy the cars of the tram company, because the company had not acceded to a demand for a reduction of its rates of fare. More than thirty of the company's cars were burned, the police and military captured the leaders. The tram company loses \$100,000 in cars alone.

Policeman Turned Burglar. NEW YORK, April 30.—Policeman Chas. Rickard was detected in the act of burglarizing an auction store on his post early to-day. He was arrested and dismissed from the force and a few hours later was indicted by the Grand Jury; still later he was arraigned in court, pleaded guilty and sentenced to ten years in the state prison. All was done within ten hours after committing the crime.

An Old Base. PRAGUE, April 30.—To-day in a menagerie here, where a crowd of 1500 persons assembled, a pickpocket raised the cry of fire, which caused a stampede for the doors. During the frantic efforts of the crowd to escape six persons were trampled to death, and many others were seriously injured.

In Des Moines, Iowa, yesterday, the Daily Leader and Homestead, the latter a weekly agricultural paper, burned together with Wear's theater building adjoining. Losses aggregate \$45,000, insurance half.

Clara Louise Kellogg has been ill for about a month, with whooping cough, which has caused her to abandon her concert tour planned for this spring. The cough is severe and extremely troublesome.

Carl Schurz, who is in Berlin, has been invited to an interview with Bismarck. A few years since, had he been caught in his fatherland, our ex-cabinet officer would have interviewed the jailer.

Ignatius Donnelly's Shaksperian cypher story has been indorsed as sound by George Parker Cidder, queen's counsel, one of the most eminent of English mathematicians.

A Presbyterian preacher in White Plains, New York, named Edgar L. Hermance, shot himself in his pulpit yesterday. He had asked an increase of salary which was refused.

Ex-Senator Grover, of Portland, is in New York, after a three months' trip abroad. He declares himself a strong Cleveland man, and predicts his re-election.

Abram P. Hewitt, mayor of New York, is named as a candidate for the presidency. His father-in-law, Peter Cooper, tried his hand, but Abram is still hopeful.

In Sioux City sleighing is the sensation. Three inches of snow and the temperature below freezing point welcome in the genial May.

Emperor Frederic passed a quiet night last night. His fever has almost entirely subsided. His general condition is unchanged.

Minister Pendleton is still suffering from the effects of his paralytic stroke. He is able to ride out, but not to attend to business.
