Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

AN INSANE MAN'S ACT.

He Kills His Wife And Babe And Then Shoots Himself.

HELENA, (M. T.), May 3.—This evening, John T. Rand shot his wife, his child and himself. The woman and the murderer are dead and the child is not expected to live. The deed was done with a rifle. Three weeks ago Rand was put in jail for beating his wife, but was released by her giving bond.

This morning Rand again assaulted his wife and then left the house. He returned at 6 o'clock and his first act was to catch his wife by the head and pull her off a chair. Mrs. Rand cried for help. Just as the child left the house she heard a shot. She looked around and saw her mother running across the yard with the baby in her arms. Just then she heard another shot and saw her mother fall, with the baby underneath. A minute later the girl heard a shot in the house.

The shots attracted a crowd, who found that the first shot had struck Mrs. Rand in the shoulder, and passed through her arm. The second shot had struck her in the spine, passed through her breast, and broke the baby's back, while the third shot had carried off the top of the murderer's head. He died instantly. The wife lingered twenty minutes and the baby is still alive.

The murderer was 40 years old and his wife was 39 years old. Insanity runs in his family. Rand was worth a few thousand dollars, but was insanely jealous. He had been married 17 years. There are five children left.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Col. W. J. Finlay, a millionaire brewer of Toledo, Ohio, died on Tuesday night.

The Societe des Metaux, a French mining company, has lost \$1,000,000 by the fall in tin.

In Albuquerque, N. M. on Tuesday night Vincenti Armijo shot and killed Jose Martin in a dispute over a dollar.

It is expected that an opening will be made in the Cascade tunnel today. Yesterday the workmen were only thirty feet apart.

Five hundred union employees in the Buffalo breweries struck yesterday morning. The breweries are still running with reduced force.

The Dominion senate has passed the bill ratifying the fishery treaty. It now waits the signature of the governor general to become a law.

In the McGill University, Montreal several women graduated, on Tuesday, with the degree of B. A. These are the first women graduates from this university.

Second Lieutenant James A. Swift, of the signal corps, has been ordered to proceed from Ashland, Oregon, to San Francisco and Olema, California, to superintend the construction of the Point Reyes telegraph line.

Dr. Simmons, of New York, is suing the estate of Samuel J. Tilden for \$140,000, for professional services he claims to have rendered the deceased. The doctor made friendly calls on Mr. Tilden for many years, these are now put down in the bill as "professional services."

Big House Moving Feat.

The removal of the Brighton Beach hotel on Coney Island has been regarded as a great engineering feat, and thousands watched the operation with great interest. The removal cost \$50,000. It is thus described by a New York exchange: The hotel—an edifice 480 feet long and 130 feet wide, covering nearly an acre and a half of ground, and worth \$250,000—was in danger of being swept away by the sea, whose rapid inroads have made great changes in the conformation of the island. Last winter the hotel was undermined by the waves and it was determined to move it bodily to a site nearly 600 feet farther from the water. Excavations were made and huge beams placed under the building. Under these were placed 112 iron platform cars, which rested on 24 railroad tracks previously laid from the hotel to its proposed site. Heavy cables were on tackles, were then attached to the hotel and connected with six powerful locomotives. When all was ready the signal was given, and the six engines, pouring out volumes of steam, applied their strength to their 5,000 tons burden. There was a straining and snapping of cables, but soon the building was seen to be slowly moving. Before night it had traveled one-fourth of its journey without the fall of a bit of plaster or the disturbance of a board.

Rollo Kirk Bryan.

This celebrated "chalk" gave two entertainments in Salem yesterday. In the afternoon he gave a free talk to the school children, at which a number of adults were present, however, and in the evening he gave a more extended performance, the opera house being filled on both occasions. As an artist he shows wonderful dexterity, sketching figures of every kind with both hands, and then revolving his canvases to display to the beholder a different picture. As a talker he is not a success, but his wonderful feats with the crayon relieved his lecture of tedium, and the musical interludes came in as a refreshment. The cornet performance by two small boys may be set down as phenomenal.

Glorious Rain.

"Allah is good! He sendeth his rain alike on the just and the unjust." The sinners are catching it as well as we. There has been a great shortage in the amount of rainfall this spring, but it is making up for it now. The present rainfall has been general from the Siskiyou to the Columbia. The copious showers of last night and today will prove of great value to the farmers, and especially to the fruit raisers of the state, as it insures excellent crops. The fruit yield for the year, judging from present appearances, will be simply enormous throughout Oregon this season.
