A GAME ROOSTER.

He Attacks a Four-Year old boy and Inflicts Fatal Wounds.

HOT SPRINGS, May 3.—Last Saturday the four-year-old son of Mr. Stringer, who resides in this city, was attacked and severely spurred about the head and face by a game cock. The mother of the child heard its cries and quickly went to its rescue. The little fellow was bleeding from the wounds inflicted by the spurs of the game cock. Shortly after the mother deposited the little fellow on a couch inside the house he swooned.

The best medical skill in the city was summoned, but all to no avail, for the little boy went into convulsion after convulsion until death. The case has puzzled the physicians. The wounds were scarcely discernible, but the child suffered almost the agonies that usually attend that dread malady, hydrophobia. Such a case has never before occurred in this county.

Employment Swindlers Brought to Grief.

KANSAS CITY (Mo.), May 3.—Lacy & Co., who conduct an employment agency at 1023 Main street, and who display placards wanting railroad laborers, brick-masons, etc., have been reaping a large reward from "suckers," but they met their "hoodoo" in James Snodgrass, whom they had fleeced out of \$2 with a promise of a job with the Randolph Coal Company. Upon application he found they wanted no men. He returned and, with about ten others who filed a like complaint, had the whole outfit arrested. They were held in \$500 bail each. There are four members in the firm.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

In the senate yesterday Senator Stewart introduced a bill to execute the stipulations of the new Chinese treaty.

Gen. John C. Fremont, accompanied by his wife and daughter, are making a short stay at San Jose, California.

The senate yesterday passed the bill to perfect the United States quarantine service. It provides for additional quarantine stations at San Diego, San Francisco and Puget Sound.

Henry Peterson of San Francisco, and Wm. Payne of Victoria, B. C., have signed articles for a rowing race, on June 23, over the Victoria course, three miles and turn, for \$2000.

Attorney General Lee has been in Omaha for a couple of days investigating the title of the Union Pacific to lands held in that city, and claims to have found \$200,000 worth occupied by the company to which it has no legal title.

Our New Chief Justice.

The Chicago Journal (Republican) discussing the President's appointment of Melville W. Fuller for chief justice of the United States supreme court, says: The appointment will be approved most heartily by Mr. Fuller's host of friends in Illinois, where for over thirty years he has been in the active and successful practice of his profession in which he stands among the very foremost. Mr. Fuller is a native of Maine and is in the very prime of his physical and mental powers. No one acquainted with him personally will question the wisdom of his appointment to the exalted position for which he has been named. His confirmation by the senate will be a matter of course. In personal appearance Mr. Fuller is unusually handsome. His hair and mustache are silvery, and his features clear-cut and intelligent. In stature he is short and slight, compared with his future associates on the supreme bench. Mr. Fuller is a man of fine scholarly as well as legal talents, and his ability as an orator has won him the title of the Chauncey M. Depew of the west. In politics he is best described as an old school democrat. He was loyal in feeling during the war, is a believer in the advanced doctrine of state rights and an advocate of a simple government. He is a member of the protestant Episcopal church, and has been prominently identified with that religious denomination, and conspicuous in the Cheney and other famous ecclesiastical trials. He is well known in Washington as a practitioner before the supreme court. James W. Harlan, a son of Justice Harlan, is in Mr. Fuller's law office here.

A Yankee Trick.

Geo. P. North, of New Haven, Conn., who has been at the Southern, remarked this morning to a reporter: "One of the shrewdest tricks of which I ever heard was recently practiced on a dry goods firm of our city. Late one afternoon a man, wearing good clothes, but apparently very drunk, staggered up the street and fell against a plate-glass window, breaking it to pieces. The proprietor rushed out and demanded payment. The drunkard, in a weak voice, replied that he had no money, but a search of his pockets revealed a wallet containing a \$100 bill. This the proprietor seized, in spite of the strong protests of the inebriate gentleman that it was a counterfeit, and carried only as a curiosity. Twelve dollars was deducted as the price of the broken window, and the gentleman who had succumbed to the influence of John Barleycorn, reeled off with \$88 in his pocket. On attempting to bank the bill in the morning, the teller threw it out as counterfeit, thus establishing the drunkard's reputation for veracity. The dry goods merchant could do nothing, as he had been told that the bill was worthless, and certainly had no right to pay himself for any damage inflicted on his store from the pockets of a drunken man. He therefore was obliged to submit to the loss of \$88 and a plate glass window, while the drunkard, whose inebriation was probably not entirely complete, had exchanged a counterfeit \$100 bill for \$88 good money, and the satisfaction of having gotten the best of one of the sharpest merchants in the Nutmeg State."—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.
