Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

IMPORTANT WORK.

Geological Surveyors Start for Oregon, California and Montana.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Professor H. D. Thompson, of the geological survey, left last night for the Pacific slope. He said before starting that three parties go to the gold belt of California, under the direction of H. N. Wilson; two to the Cascade mountains, in Southern Oregon, under W. T. Griswold, with Eugene Ricksecker, and three to Montana, under E. L. Douglass.
These parties are compelled to start at an early date in order to finish the work of triangulation before the summer haze sets in. They will have that done by July first, and the time from then to the middle of November will be devoted to topography and working out the details of the triangulation.

The county charts of California are on a scale of two miles to the inch, and of Oregon and Montana, four miles to the inch. The California parties will cover about 2000 miles each, and the Oregon and Montana parties from 3000 to 4000.

Rapidly Sinking.

LONDON, May 7.—The Prince of Wales received a dispatch from Berlin late last night stating that Emperor Frederick was much worse and rapidly sinking.

Prewett's Second Trial.

HOLLISTER, May 7.—The second trial of Prewett, who killed Dr. A. B. Powers in Bear Valley in 1885, was commenced at Salinas to-day.

Another M. P.'s Fate.

DUBLIN, May 7.—Joseph Condon, M. P., was to-day sentenced to a fortnight's imprisonment for citing unlawful assemblage.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Senator Edmunds has submitted an unfavorable majority report on Bayard's fishery treaty.
Secretary Vilas has transmitted the reports of Chas. Shackelford, special swamp land agent, in regard to lands in the Klamath basin.

The Chinese treaty was ratified yesterday without division. Senator Mitchell of Oregon and Teller spoke against the ratification.

The river and harbor bill has passed the house, and Oregon's senators will try and increase the appropriations in the senate.

Indians in the Northwest territory are said to be dying of starvation, and many cases of cannibalism are reported by a missionary.

The old firm of Wm. T. Coleman and Co., of San Francisco, which dates back to 1849, has assigned. The business of the firm, it is said, amounted to fully \$14,000,000 every year. Assets said to be from 4 to 4 1/2 millions, and liabilities in excess of 2 1/2 millions of dollars.

Miss Annie Alderson, a bright and accomplished graduate from the East Salem school, has an appointment to teach in a town near Portland, and started this morning to enter on her duties.
