Thomas J. Mountain, resp. vs. Multnomah county, State of Oregon, app. Judgment, appealed from reversed, and the cause remanded to the circuit court with directions to dismiss the writ. Opinion by Thayer J.

G. R. Chrisman, resp. vs. The State Insurance Co., of Salem, Or., app. appeal from Lane Co. Judgment of the lower court reversed and a new trial ordered. Opinion by Strahan J.

County commissioners court in session to-day. Besides auditing a large number of bills, a liquor license was granted A. Jette, Sr., of Champe.

Governor Penoyer turned over \$18,921.55 which he had just received from Washington, that being Oregon's share of the net proceeds of the government land sales in the state for the fiscal year '86-'87, to State Treasurer Webb this morning.

## REPUBLICAN RALLY.

Judge Williams Draws a Crowded Audience—He Delivers an Eloquent Speech.

Judge Williams' able and interesting talk last evening was listened to by a full house, and although he devoted a good share of his attention to the tariff question, still he dished up his figures with more attractiveness than the talker of the previous evening, and thus succeeded in retaining his audience to the end. Senator Slater so moved his hearers with his numerical statements that when he got through there was hardly anybody left.

Judge Williams believes in protection to American industry, and drew a vivid contrast between the comfort of the home workman, and the want and suffering of the pauper labor of Europe. The Mills bill, now before congress, is designed to throw down the fiscal barricade erected to check the inflow of foreign products, and it is insidiously designed to aid the north at the expense of the south. Wool is to be admitted free of tax, while the import on sugar remains untouched. So with other northern products. Lumber, timber, oats, potatoes and other farm products are to be placed on the free list, while the duty on rice, almonds, lemons and other products of the south is to remain untouched. The object of the republican party is to build up manufactures by the side of the grain field, and furnish a home market to the farmer; while the democrats, by admitting free imports, would make Europe the workshop for this country, and reduce our native workman to a level with his underpaid foreign rival.

The speaker then gave the cold water party a friendly tilt. He avowed himself in sympathy with their aim, but he could not approve the method they pursued. There were other forms of intemperance beside that of strong drink. He (the speaker) drank neither tea nor coffee, but he took a glass of claret with his dinner. Because of this habit it was not courteous or just to denounce him as a wine-bibler and a bad citizen, and to hedge around his personal freedom by the passage of repressive laws. There was no need for the third party, it could not elect its candidates and it only confused politics.

Coming down to the candidates for office, he commended the zeal of Binger Hermann in congress and urged his support on his hearers. Judge Lord had earned an honorable record on the bench, and he certainly was deserving of reelection.

The judge closed his address with an eloquent peroration, which elicited a hearty burst of applause.

WHEN you see a little coterie of marsupials with their heads quietly together in a corner of their cage, it is safe to conclude they are hatching mischief, and a vigorous stirring up with a long pole will put a sudden quietus to the plot. The animals will scatter in a great rage and gnash their teeth at the tormentor; but they can do no harm, and to watch their antics is as good as a play. ## CITY COUNCIL.

The Depot Matter—The City Assessment. A Saloon Petition.

The city council met last night, and after reading the minutes, bills against the city amounting to \$796.36 were ordered paid.

An unfavorable report was received and adopted in the North Commercial street bridge matter; also in matter of request for a bridge across Mill creek on Mill street.

The mayor submitted a report in regard to the depot matter. Said that the ground could be secured at Court street for \$5200, and that the street could be vacated, also that the old depot grounds could be secured to the railroad company without any money expenditure. A telegram was read from Mr. Koehler, in which he accedes to the mayor's suggestion regarding the size of the plat, but in which he says he must still require the bond. The whole matter was then left to the mayor to bring before the people as he saw fit.

The city attorney reported that R. S. Wallace had paid his delinquent taxes, and that the matter had been settled.

Recorder Strickler submitted the assessment roll of the city for 1888, which amounts to \$1,033,883, and the same was referred to the committee on ways and means, to whom are also referred all applications for revision of the list.

On motion the street commissioner was instructed to have the two tanks now standing outside Wilson avenue removed by the parties who placed them there.

The codification of the city laws was referred to the mayor for examination.

A petition was presented from the saloon keepers of the city asking that drug stores and restaurants be compelled to pay liquor licenses, or else that the laws be repealed which compel saloons to pay license; also asking the repeal of the Sunday laws or their enforcement against the drug stores and restaurants. The petition was referred to the committee on licenses.
