ED. JOURNAL.—The executive committee of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon met on Tuesday morning in the M. E. church at Eugene and perfected articles of incorporation for that body, in order to enable them to hold the property invested in the Industrial Home in Portland, and other property. They also did such other business as came before them. The evening meeting was open to the public and was the first meeting of the Convention. Mrs. W. E. Edwards of Newberg gave the scripture reading, Rev. Wire made the opening prayer and Mrs. Anna R. Riggs, state president, gave an address. The work of the convention was begun on Wednesday, Mrs. Riggs in the chair. All the chief officers were present. The superintendents of departments were many of them absent. The committee on credentials was then elected, and the president was instructed to appoint the remaining committees, which I will send you at a future time. The reports of Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Belle W. Cooke, and treasurer E. Irvine, were then presented to the union. The afternoon session was taken up with reports from absent superintendents, which were read by the recording secretary, R. M. Robb. Then followed a mother's meeting, presided over by Mrs. M. E. Edwards of Newberg. All the meetings of the convention are prefaced by devotional meetings, presided over by the superintendent of evangelical work, M. E. Edwards.
