TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

THE FLOOD ABATING.

The Worst is Past, but Terrible Suffering Has Been Inflicted.

QUINCY, Ills., May 21.—The great flood in the Mississippi is slowly abating, it is thought the worst is past. A trip through the submerged district shows that the reports of loss and suffering have not been exaggerated. Over 250,000 acres of the richest farming lands in the state are covered with water from six to ten feet deep. The damage to farm, mill and railroad property has been enormous. The aggregate will reach \$3,000,000 on crops alone. The damages to levees, houses and railroads will approximate \$900,000. Much sickness prevails among the people, who have been driven from their homes by the floods, owing to want and exposure. Measures, however, have been taken to alleviate their sufferings.

HANNIBAL, Mo., May 21.—For forty miles from here the river varies from six to ten miles in width. Between this point and Kookuk the average width is fully as great. Thousands of people from Kookuk and Illinois inland towns were taken to the submerged village of Alexandria, Mo., to-day.

A Family Burned to Death. CLEVELAND, May 21.—Mrs. Eliza Lewis, an aged woman, and her three grandchildren, were smothered to death Saturday night at the house of William Llewellyn. Mr. and Mrs. Llewellyn were away from home during the evening, leaving their children in charge of Mrs. Lewis, who is Mrs. Llewellyn's mother. Shortly before midnight the house took fire and was partly destroyed. When the flames had been extinguished, Llewellyn and wife discovered that the occupants of the house had perished. The children were aged six years, four years, and eighteen months.

BETTER STAY AT HOME. [An old Oregonian, who desires his name withheld, sends the following communication as a timely warning to those who may think of following in his footsteps.]

DOUGLAS Co., W. T., May 19. ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL.—The Big Bend, the great stock country, is a region of hills, rocks, lakes, boulders, rattlesnakes, etc. Imagine the whole face of a country all dotted over with high, black, rough rugged rocks, from the size of a tub to the size of a barn, and from one to sixty feet high, from two feet to eight rods apart, with now and then a small space of fair looking yellow sandy gravelly soil, bearing nice grass and sage brush, with now and then a small lake and here and there a spring, with a few willows scattered along its branch, and you have it.

There is no crop raised here except the rabbit and fool hen, as a rule, but in some portions of the country there are a number of farms and the owners are doing well as they all have enough stock to live from, while they are experimenting with light crops.

There are a number of horse, cattle, and sheep men in the country the former are already quarreling with the latter, and it looks as if in two or three years there would not be enough grass to feed a goose. Stock will not do as well here now, as on our part of Snake river, and the quality of grass is far inferior to that of Palouse. I think it a risk to go into stock business here and would not undertake to winter without hay.

When her father asked her where she had slept all night the little one answered, "In the woods with a big bear, papa." She was closely questioned, but the child adhered to her story that she had slept with a bear in the woods, and people in Boiceville believe that the little girl did really meet with a bear, and, not knowing what it was, went up to it, and for some reason the bear refrained from hurting the wanderer. There are other people who believe the bear came out of the mountains to the vicinity of Mr. Davis's house, and the child seeing the shaggy brute ran after it and followed it to the ravine.
