The Examiner of Sunday has a long letter from Portland which is published as a special dispatch. It gives a candid view of the state of parties in Oregon, if we make reasonable allowance for partisan bias.

SAY NOW, "SHIBBOLETH"

The Statesman has these two utterances this morning: "The way to elect the republican ticket is to beat the democratic ticket."

We will illustrate this discolored logic.

During the war, after the disastrous repulse at Chancellorsville, when the faint-hearted at the north were clamoring against the further expenditure of blood and treasure, when gold was worth \$2.85, and it was a question in the minds of the most hopeful whether the country would survive the throes of rebellion, President Lincoln issued his proclamation calling for 300,000 more troops, and governors of states were instructed, if volunteering failed to fill the respective quotas, to enforce the draft.

Loyal Citizen—I want to enlist. Recruiting officer, (eying applicant with air of suspicion)—Are you an American?

If that had been the policy of the Lincoln administration, how long does the reader suppose it would have taken to suppress the rebellion? Would it ever have been suppressed? Yet here is the republican party of the state and nation in extreme peril, and every loyal and willing hand required to aid in the struggle, and we have such self constituted champions as the Statesman editor placing himself at the polling place with a club in his hand, and refusing a republican ballot to every voter who cannot answer aright his political catechism.

REPUBLICAN CAUCUS

The following dispatch comes to us over the wires, which shows that party lines are to be drawn strictly: WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—At a caucus meeting of republican members of the house this p. m. the advisability of drawing the party lines strictly was considered.

It is reported on the street that a committee of three leading republicans left for Washington to-day, carrying files of the Statesman, and instructed to urge on the republican members of the house the adoption of the plan suggested by the New England member.
