JEFFERSON.

As Seen by Our Traveling Reporter.

The town of Jefferson is situated in the extreme southern portion of Marion county on the north bank of the Santiam river--which is the dividing line between Linn and Marion counties--and distance about nineteen miles from Salem. The town was laid out in 1854, but has progressed very slowly until within the past few years, during which time it has gradually improved and is to-day one of our most thriving towns.

The town is neatly and substantially built, the houses of the residents being surrounded by a luxuriant growth of foliage, presenting a comfortable and pleasant appearance. The surrounding country is dotted over with well arranged and productive farms and orchards, and is one of the richest sections of agricultural and fruit growing land in the state. There would be little exaggeration in saying that the soil, which is mostly a deep, sandy loam, is equal to any in the world for growing in greatest abundance all kinds of grain of superior quality, and every fruit and vegetable known to the state.

There are thousands of acres in this portion of Marion county, of rich soil, where, aided by the temperate climate, fruits of all kinds attain the richest flavor and largest proportions, when properly cultivated. So far but little attention has been paid to these pursuits, because the populace, almost as a body, have had their interest centered on the wheat industry to a greater or less extent. In the future we have the hardihood to assert, a large portion of the farmers in this vicinity will turn their attention to the cultivation of fruits and vegetables, and as there has never been a total failure from drouth or great damage from excessive moisture, the farmer is always certain of a fair crop.

The population of Jefferson is about four hundred, and the residences which they have erected are in perfect keeping with the location; neatly arranged cottages and tastefully constructed dwellings greeting the eye at every turn. Our population is mainly of a permanent class, those who build up and give a town or county power and wealth, and the large surrounding country depending on it for supplies and mail, makes it the business center of a section of territory about fifteen miles square.

What our section most needs is a good flour mill. This place is one of the best locations in the state for a mill. It would command a fair share of the market of southern Marion and northern Linn. Our production of cereals is increasing each year, and a mill is becoming more and more of a necessity. We have a flour mill here, owned by Corbett & McCleay, of Portland, and leased by Otto Shultz, but the machinery being of old style and badly out of repair, very little flour is made, necessitating the shipment of that much used commodity from Salem and Albany.

We have one of the best WATER POWERS On the coast in the shape of a ditch from the north fork of the Santiam river, about two and one-half miles above town, which furnishes power for the grist-mill and a large saw mill run by Metzger & Holt, who do a large business, and give employment to quite a number of men.

The line of the Oregon and California railroad passes through this place, as does also the main wagon road leading from Salem to California. A daily stage from Seilo connects with the local passenger trains at this point conveying passengers and freight. There is a first class ferry at this point, run by D. B. Allen, whom the traveling public will find one of the most accommodating of men.

This is without doubt one of the healthiest localities on the coast, and sickness is very seldom heard of; only one physician, Dr. J. J. Leavitt, residing here.

The town is incorporated, following are the officers: Mayor, F. Bagley; recorder, G. L. Thompson;

treasurer, A. B. Hudson; marshal, Riley Crabtree; councilmen, Ed. Murphy, Joe Metzger, Ralph Walter, S. T. Johnson, Eli Vaughn and B. Russell. Precinct officers--Justice of the peace, G. L. Thompson; constable, E. J. Hearn.

CHURCHES.

The Methodist Episcopal church has a fine building here, and numbers an attendance of over forty members, with Rev. W. T. Van Scoy as pastor. Services are held morning and evening on the first, third and fourth Sunday of each month. Also a fine Sunday school with over a hundred names enrolled. Members of this church have organized a society known as the Jefferson Aid Society, which numbers about thirty members and meets the first and third Tuesday of each month.

The Protestant Episcopal church also hold services in their own building, on the second Sabbath of each month, morning and evening; Rev. B. N. Longworth pastor. There is a good attendance.

JEFFERSON INSTITUTE.

In school district No. 14, is situated one of the best schools on the coast, and one that the people of this section of Marion county may well feel proud of. Jefferson Institute was established in 1854 upon the endowment plan, \$5,500 being subscribed and the interest, together with the district's share of the public money, proves an ample sufficiency to keep an experienced corps of teachers at work thirty-nine weeks during each year. During the term just closed 171 pupils were enrolled, and all acquitted themselves in a way that reflects great credit upon their instructors. The school is governed by a board of fifteen trustees--selected from the stockholders--five of whom are elected each year. The trustees choose three directors out of their number to serve one year. Directors for ensuing term are Dr. J. J. Leavitt, E. H. Bellinger and A. Weddle. The school is graded on the same method as the public schools of Salem. The fall term will open September 3d with W. T. Van Scoy as principal, and Lewis Barzee in charge of the intermediate department. A third teacher will be employed as soon as deemed necessary. A new feature will be added at the next term--that of preparing men and women to teach. The building is being renovated and the second story divided into more rooms.

SOCIETIES.

The Independent Order of Good Templars have a strong organization here, with a working force of over sixty-five members. Meetings are held in the L. O. O. F. hall every Friday evening.

Chehalpum Grange, No. 68, meets the second Saturday in each month in the Masonic hall, over Smith & Russell's store. There is an average attendance of about sixty.

The Odd Fellows and Masons both have strong lodges, each meeting in their own hall.
