Seven Presidential Tickets in the Field.

There are so far seven presidential tickets in the field for next November's election, and a voter need not wait for a list to choose from. They are:

Albert E. Redstone, of California, for president, and John Calvin, of Kansas, for vice president, nominated at Washington on February 22, by the industrial reform party.

Belva Lockwood, of the District of Columbia, for president, and Alfred H. Love, of Pennsylvania, for vice-president, nominated at Des Moines, Iowa, on May 15, by woman suffragists.

A. J. Streater, of Illinois, for president, and Charles E. Cunningham, of Arkansas, for vice president, nominated at Cincinnati on May 10, by the union labor party.

Robert H. Cowdry, of Illinois, for president, and W. H. T. Wakefield, of Kansas, for vice president, nominated at Cincinnati on May 17, by the united labor party.

C. B. Fick, of New Jersey, for president, and John A. Brooks, of Kansas City, for vice president, nominated at Indianapolis on May 31, by the prohibitionists.

Grover Cleveland, of New York, for president, and Allen G. Thurman, of Ohio, for vice president, nominated at St. Louis June 5th, by the democratic party.

Benjamin Harrison, of Indiana, for president, and Levi P. Morton, of New York, for vice president, nominated at Chicago June 25, by the republican party.
