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National Guard Convention Proceedings.

There is just being issued from the office of State Printer Baker, the proceedings of the Officers' Convention of the Oregon National Guard Association, held in Portland, April 12 and 13, last. The report was ordered printed by the State Military Board at its last meeting, and makes a book of 52 pages. It is gotten out in handy form, and the printing is very well done.

The compiler has taken his transcript of the proceedings from a newspaper report gotten out by a man whose business does not require that he knows exact military courtesy, and who, of course, has not shown it at all times, instead of from the minutes which the Secretary was supposed to keep of the meeting. The entire report is full of the most glaring blunders, omissions, etc., and is simply a poor newspaper report of what was really a courteous business meeting.
