STATE NEWS.

The efforts of the East Oregonian to raise a \$10,000 subsidy for a woolen mill at Pendleton are likely to be crowned with success.

F. A. Bowen has retired from the Baker City Democrat. That paper is now conducted and published by J. F. Bowen and Geo. B. Small.

The Comptroller of Currency has authorized the Wallowa National Bank of Enterprise, Oregon, to begin business, with a capital of \$50,000. R. M. Stick is president and Wm. R. Holmes cashier.

Burglars are plying their trade in Pendleton. The latest mention of this home industry reports a raid on Basler's second hand jewelry store, and \$175 worth of jewelry, pistols, etc., made away with.

A grader's outfit consisting of four cars, left this morning for Ripari, to work on the railroad extension. A large army of men must be employed there at present, judging from the numbers that pass daily through Pendleton.

Rev. G. M. Pierce, pastor of the Albina M. E. Church, received \$500 from Mrs. Maria Smith, to be used in the purchase of a lot for a church building. Now Mrs. Smith kindly contributes \$2,000 more toward the building of the church.

Baker City Democrat:—Persons in from Cracker creek report that section as lively to a remarkable degree. About seventy-five men are now given steady employment at the Eureka and Excelsior mine besides the hundreds of men now building houses and engaged in the various lines of trade.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The Kansas County Seat War.
TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 3.—Attorney-General Bradford and Gen. Myers have returned from Stevens county and made their report to Gov. Martin. After hearing the report and recommendations of the officers, the governor was satisfied that the civil authorities are powerless to preserve good order in Stevens county, and therefore decreed that the Second brigade of the K. N. G. and the Second battery of artillery of Topeka, proceed there post haste, and his order was sent out by telegraph. Eight companies will rendezvous at Hutchinson to-night, and leave there at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning by special train for Liberal. Complaints have been filed with United States Commissioner Wilson, which charge the firing party with the murder of Sheriff Cross and his posse.

OPEN CONFLICT FEARED.
TOPEKA, Aug. 3.—Reports from Stevens county are to the effect that the situation is serious, and open conflict is feared at any time. Both towns are getting more arms and ammunition and are preparing for war. On Wednesday evening a Woodsdale man named Harter and a Hugotown man named Watson met about midday between the two towns and had a duel. Several shots were fired at long and short range, and Harter was seriously wounded.

Revivalist Ordered Out of Town.
An Ottawa, Ont. dispatch says: Rev. Dr. Horner, a revivalist, who for two weeks past, has been holding blasphemous meetings in Fallowfield, twenty miles from here, has been ordered to leave the town by the authorities. He taught that until a sinner was laid out insensible he fell short of sanctification. Every evening scores of men, women and children rolled about on the church floor. So forcibly has this doctrine moved the sensibilities of his flock that over twenty of them are ill from nervous prostration, and of these three are reported to be hopelessly insane.

Fatal Accident.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—A fifteen-year-old boy named Bartholomew Nylman, employed in the rope works at the Potrero, was instantly killed this afternoon. He was engaged in the works when one of the rapidly revolving bobbins was released from its socket and flew through the air with terrific force. It struck the boy on the back of the neck, dislocating the spinal column and causing instant death.

Killed His Son.
DES MOINES, Aug. 3.—This morning at the Ohio & Wisconsin coal mines, two miles west of Albia, Michael Dial, an old miner, killed his son Dick with a shotgun. The son was about 57 years old. The old man is in the custody of the sheriff and nearly crazed with grief. It seems that there was a family row, and the father claims he shot his son in self-defense.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Crop reports from all parts of the province show an average yield of wheat of about thirty-two bushels. A terrible explosion occurred in a fireworks factory near London yesterday. Several women were killed.

Floods are doing enormous damage to bridges and railways throughout Switzerland. Lake Lucerne is overflowed.

It is the talk among society people that the Langtry will retire from the stage when she has filled her present engagements, and then marry Freddie Gebhardt. She has accumulated \$800,000 worth of real estate.
