After the Sugar Thieves.

New York, Aug. 8.—Attorney General Taber to-day began action in the Supreme Court against the sugar trust. The service of the summons in the complaint was made on the officers of the trust this morning, and an answer is required in twenty days. The people of the States of New York are named as plaintiffs, and the North River Sugar Refining Co. is given as the corporate title of the defendants.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

THE FUNERAL CORTAGE.

Arrival at New Bedford—Gen. Scofield's Arrangements.

New Bedford, Mass., Aug. 8.—The steamer Monochanett arrived at Vineyard dock, this city, this evening, before 6 o'clock. The funeral train was waiting for the arrival of the boat. Silently and slowly the coffin was borne to and placed in the car prepared for it, while the family party stepped into the private car of Vice-President Thompson. The members of the party who were to accompany the remains to Washington took their places in two Pullman cars and in a few minutes the train drew out of the depot.

COMPLETING THE ARRANGEMENTS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Gen. Scofield and three of his staff arrived here to-night for the purpose of perfecting the arrangements for Gen. Sheridan's funeral. He will issue tickets of admission to St. Matthew's church to the president and cabinet, heads of departments and members of the house and senate, and private individuals. The church will seat about 1000 people, and the invitations will have to be restricted to that number. The military guard of honor will consist of a detachment from the regular army and a detail from the Loyal Legion. The funeral procession from the church to the grave will be strictly a military one. No place will be made in the line for members of the G. A. R., Loyal Legion or any other military organization. This course has been adopted at the request of Mrs. Sheridan.

AT HARTFORD.

HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 9.—The train bearing the remains of Gen. Sheridan reached here at 12:45 A. M. The train will reach Harlem river at about 5:30 A. M., and Washington at 3 P. M.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 8.—At the special request of Mrs. Sheridan, Cardinal Gibbons will preach the sermon at the funeral of Gen. Sheridan on Saturday in addition to giving absolution.

Triple Tragedy.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 8.—William Aukland, from Dayton, shot Superintendent Joseph Baily, Engineer Albert W. Cryer and then himself this morning at the Rockwood Pottery Company. No cause is assigned, but Aukland has been acting strangely of late. He is supposed to be insane. Aukland will die. The other two are in a critical condition.

Tenement Fire Trap Burnt.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Early this morning a four-story tenement house in avenue A caught fire. The family of Gustave Beg, consisting of himself, wife, daughter and mother-in-law, living on the top floor, were burned to death. The other occupants escaped. The financial loss is insignificant.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Ex-Gov. Porter persisting in declining the honor, Gen. Hovey was nominated for the governorship of Indiana.

Larry Donovan, the famous bridge jumper, was killed in London yesterday, while leaping from Hungerford bridge.

Guy Corderlippe, a middle aged single man was killed in Los Angeles yesterday by a pile of lumber falling on him.

All New York is in excitement over the anticipated arrival of James G. Blaine who was looked for yesterday but did not arrive.

In Atlanta, Ga., yesterday, Gov. John B. Gordon and other state officials were nominated for re-election at the democratic state convention.

Wm. David, the well known comedian, died at Cheyenne on Tuesday. He was on his way to San Francisco with Daly's Dramatic Company. He was 75 years of age.

Robert Garrett has become very violent, and escaping from his attendants has tried to injure himself by jumping from the hospital window. It is still believed that if the brain trouble can be overcome he will recover.
