What a foolish thing this is to say! Doesn't the Statesman editor know that a sick inmate of an Indian school is under the charge of a surgeon, and if he supposes that the more or less savage parents of his dying patient, living in a wigwam, most likely, can give him better care than the government can, with hospital appliances and medical stores, and he orders the child sent home, the superintendent has no power to refuse? An inmate stricken with mortal sickness is in no condition to remove, and no doctor would order removal. But inmates whose ailments are remediable are sent home at the discretion of the superintendent, and below we give a list of scholars sent home on sick leave of absence taken from the records of the establishment.

It is an indulgence of spite instead of an advocacy of the public good. It is carrying the strife and acrimony of partisanship into a domain where philanthropy should have sole rule. It is an assault on the beneficent design of the nation to reclaim the young rascals and make them useful and progressive, all this is apparent to the unprejudiced mind; but

Destroy his web—his sophistry in vain.
The creature's at his dirty work again.

TRIBUTE TO THE DEAD.

Secretary Endicott, speaking of the public loss sustained in the death of Gen. Sheridan, bears this testimony to the deceased chieftain's genial personal qualities and professional worth:

"His death is a great loss to the army, and to this department. I mean as a practical, energetic man of affairs. He had a wide experience, gathered during an active military life. He knew and understood all the conditions of military life in all parts of the country, and of the people with whom our soldiers have to deal, including the Indians, in whom he took a peculiar interest. He was wise and sagacious, and his judgment was marked by a readiness in decision, and guided by shrewd common sense. He had so long held high command, and been attended by such success, that he elicit a confidence in his administration of affairs, which was rarely at fault. I always found him reasonable, and most ready to look at all sides of a question, and of such impulses as are most open to conviction. As a soldier he, of course, stands quite by himself, differing with a marked and intense individuality from all our distinguished soldiers. He was very interesting and entertaining in social intercourse. He had a fund of anecdote and a variety of information that often was very instructive. His experiences in Europe, when he accompanied the German army to France in 1870, were varied and very interesting. I have heard him describe battles which he saw in a manner which inspired in his hearers some of the enthusiasm with which he told the story. I shall always retain the most agreeable recollections of my intercourse with him, and shall never forget the friendly and valuable assistance he gave to me in the administration of my office."

The fatal shooting of the sheriff and posse from a western county in Kansas, over a county seat dispute, already mentioned in our columns occurred in No Man's Land, an unorganized territory lying between Kansas and Indian territory. Hence the murderers cannot be arrested for murder, but it is thought the fact of the conspiracy can be established against them. The penalty for the offense does not exceed ten years. Six men have been arrested and taken to Topeka to be examined before the United States commissioner.
