A shoemaker at Atlanta, Ga., has lately completed a pair of shoes that are 14 inches long, 5 1/2 wide and 8 1/2 deep.

The electric arc lights in the United States now number nearly 300,000; and the incandescents number over 1,000,000.

The annual copper production of the world is 275,000 tons, and the French syndicate is said to control 215,000 tons of it.

Sylvania, Ga., has a stalk of corn ten feet high, and which contains seven well developed shoots, six of which have put out silks.

A comparison of the work of English, French and American detectives show the latter to be 12 per cent. ahead all around.

A Glasgow firm has just finished a brass wire for the Glasgow exhibition sixty-five miles long and a copper wire 111 miles long.

The National Telephone company, of Scotland, has several submarine cables of seven, eight and nine miles in length, which give perfect satisfaction.

A farmer near Buffalo, Pa., while plowing a few days ago, came upon a pot containing nearly \$2,000 in gold coin. It is supposed to have been hidden by a miser who lived near the spot many years ago.

A new fire escape in England is a sort of chair that slides down a pole, and the host of a house possessing it often entertains his guests by permitting them to take a ride. At the Italian exhibition in London it is expected to prove a great rival to the switchback railway.

The municipal authorities think the crossings are so unsafe in Paris that an English paper says they have employed surgeons, disguised as policemen, for the purpose of helping the timid people across the perilous parts of the streets and boulevards, and to be at hand in case of accidents.

Ventura county, Cal., boasts that it contains brown stone enough to rebuild the great wall of China, oil enough to float the vessels needed for its transportation and lime enough to make the mortar to build the wall. It says nothing about having gas enough to blow up the whole concern.

Six hundred newsboys were washed, scrubbed, scoured, rinsed off, rolled up in flannel and laid out in the sun to dry the other morning at a bathhouse on West Madison street, Chicago. It required 14,000 gallons of hot water, as much more of cold, 1,300 bottles of "shampoo" and 1,300 towels to do the work.

American have the good habit of going to college. A statement has been prepared at Chicago showing that 14,535,239 words of press specials and other messages were handled at the Chicago office of the Western Union Telegraph company during the week from June 19 to 25 inclusive, while the Republican national convention was in session. This is an average of 2,075,034 words for each day, Sunday included.

Courage of an Army. Discipline, that well spring of victory, is recognized as one of the most potent means of raising the standard of courage in an army. It teaches men that their best reliance is in their own bravery; gives them confidence in each other; removes the fear that they may not be properly supported in emergencies; convinces them that they are part of an intelligent machine moving methodically, under perfect control and not guided by incompetency and establishes that esprit de corps which goes so far toward making armies formidable in war. It was discipline which enabled the commander of the troops on board the English ship, when foundering, to form his men in line on deck, present arms, and go down with the vessel, while the band played "God Save the King."—Gen. Horace Porter in The Century.

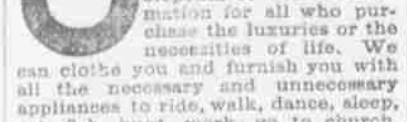
