TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

A New Postmaster for Oregon City.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The
president to-day appointed E. D.
Kelly postmaster of Oregon City,
Or.

Wool-Growers in Council.
SACRAMENTO, Sept. 13.—The
wool-growers of the state were in
session here to-day, and appointed a
committee to petition the legislature
to abolish the law allowing each
county to impose a license tax on
sheep pasturing in the county. All
present with the exception of two
are opposed to the Mills bill.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—A dispatch
from Afghanistan says: The ameer's
troops will attack Ishak Khan on
three sides. Separate corps are ad-
vancing from Badakshan, Cabul
and West Turkistan. There are
continuous skirmishes between the
out-posts. Ishak Khan is concen-
trating his forces near Harbek. A
decisive battle is imminent.

Suffering for Attention.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Miss
Clara Barton received this morning
from Colonel Southmaid, who left
New Orleans Tuesday with eighteen
nurses, the following telegram,
dated Baldwin, Florida: "Left ten
nurses at McClenny. Have wired
New Orleans for doctors. People
are dying at McClenny for need of
attention. The country around is
panic stricken. The situation is
very sad. Much in need."

The President Contemplating a Trip.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Presi-
dent Cleveland is contemplating a
trip by water from Buffalo up
through the Detroit river, Lake St.
Clair, the St. Clair river, Lake
Huron and St. Mary's river to Sault
Ste. Marie. No details of the
journey have yet been arranged,
but it is understood that Postmaster-
General Dickinson is negotiating
for the use of a fine steam yacht
owned in Toledo, but formerly the
property of a prominent citizen of
Detroit.

Grand Army.
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 13.—The
G. A. R. encampment was addressed
yesterday by General Benjamin Harrison
in an effective speech.
Hon. Wm. Warner, of Missouri, is
chosen commander in chief for the
ensuing year. He served in the
33d and 34th Wisconsin regiments.
Resolved, that this encampment
favors the presentation to congress
of a bill which shall give to every
soldier or sailor, who served the
United States between April, 1861,
and July, 1865, for a period of sixty
days or more, a service pension of
\$8 a month, and those whose service
exceeded 800 days an additional
pension of 4 cent per month for
service in excess of that period.

sufferers in the South.
Gen. Harrison attended the reu-
nion of his old regiment yesterday
and was again elected president of
the organization.
The yellow fever is still raging at
Jacksonville, Fla. Nurses are in
great demand and are coming in
from both north and south.
Pennsylvania is reported as being
afflicted with another terrible storm
destructive to life and property.

Osmon Johnson, a wealthy man of
Modesto, California, is found guilty
of re-using postage stamps. Moral,

New York papers have a sensa-
tional and improbable story, that
Indians are starving to death in the
