Where the War Wages.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 26.—Ohio and Indiana united to-day again through their delegations in paying their respects to Gen Harrison. The Tipton county visitors numbered over a thousand. It is said the new republican tariff bill which is to be submitted Monday proposes a reduction of nearly \$10,000,000. Sugar and rice are cut 50 per cent.

WORKINGS OF THE WIRES.

James Bewley Shot by Sheridan's Deputy Marshal.

Smallpox Regulations Unobserved—Bright Outlook—Telegraphic Summary.

A QUARANTINE DISREGARDED.

Sheridan's Deputy Marshal Shoots and Kills James Bewley.

McMINNVILLE, Ogn., Sept. 26.—A special to the Oregonian from this place says:

James F. Bewley, one of the wealthiest citizens of this county, and a pioneer of 1846, was shot in the streets of Sheridan last evening, about 5 o'clock, by W. McCune, a young man on the Sheridan quarantine line force, and died early this morning. Bewley lives in McMinnville, and McCune notified him to leave Sheridan, as they were afraid of smallpox. While parleying about leaving or being arrested, McCune drew a pistol and fired into Bewley's face. The ball entered the right cheek and lodged in the brain. Bewley fell backward out of his buggy.

McCune then turned and fired several shots at Roswell Bewley, a son of James Bewley. Roswell ran into a livery stable near by and procured his pistol, and ran out firing at McCune, who ran down the street. Young Bewley pursued him some distance. Meeting McCune's father, who had undertaken to stop him by throwing stones at him, young Bewley turned on the elder McCune, but having exhausted his pistol picked up a rock and struck McCune on the forehead, knocking him down, and he remained insensible for some time.

The wildest excitement prevailed at Sheridan during the night. Between the quarantine and the tragedy there was no sleep. Sheriff Harris went up during the night and arrested McCune, and he was taken before Justice Landon of Willamina precinct for examination to-day.

Oregon Oracles.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Pensions have been granted as follows: Oregon—Original invalid, John A. Putman, Springfield; Mexican survivor, Christian Reininger, Heppner.

Representative Hermann's bill for the relief of the militia of Oregon was called up to-day by the committee on military affairs and passed. It requires the secretary of war to distribute to the state authorities at Salem, for the state militia, a quantity of arms, ammunition, equipments, etc.

The mail service between Canyon City and Monument, Oregon, has been increased from two to three times per week.

The Oregon Traffic.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26.—It is understood here that the Southern Pacific Company has begun an active fight against the Northern Pacific and Oregon Short Line for the passenger business of Oregon to the east. Up to the present time the Short Line has secured a very large per centage of the business, its rates being equal to those of other routes. The Southern Pacific gets a very short haul on the business as it stands, carrying passengers only to Portland. It is now proposed to turn the tide of east-bound travel southward through California.

Convicted of Murder.

JACKSONVILLE, Or., Sept. 26.—The trial of the boy John McAllister for the murder of his father last July commenced on Monday, the 17th, and ended Saturday, resulting in a verdict of murder in the second degree. During the trial he seemed to take but little interest in what was going on, and appeared incapable to comprehend the important bearing it had to him.

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No Mormons Need Apply.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Twenty-one little girls, aged from nine to fourteen years, brought here yesterday by Mormon elders from Europe, en route to Salt Lake City, were ordered to-day by Collector Magone to be sent back to Europe.

The Stricken South.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 26.—Only nine new cases are reported this morning and one death. This is one of the brightest and most pleasant days of the season, cool and refreshing. The belief is becoming general that the epidemic will soon run its course. The deaths reported are one; total cases to date, 2,237; total deaths, 229.

Points For Oregon.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—The senate and house have concurred in the senate amendment to the house bill granting to the O. R. & N. twelve acres of land in the Umatilla Indian reservation, near the town of Adams, for depot purposes, and authorizing the secretary of the interior to reserve from sale pasturage lands on the Indian reservation, in addition to the 120 acres reserved under the act for the allotment of lands in severality. Both houses have also agreed to the senate amendment to the bill providing for additional life saving stations on the coast of Oregon and Washington territory.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

There was a \$100,000 fire at Canton, Dakota, yesterday afternoon.

A boy died yesterday at San Francisco from the effects of a base ball striking him on the head.

Yesterday there was a terrible destructive fire at Truckee, Cal. Losses will foot up \$100,000.

Yesterday was a stormy day on the Atlantic coast. Much damage was done to crops, fruits and houses.

One hundred thousand dollars is the sum appropriated by the house yesterday to the yellow fever sufferers.

Sespegodera a British ship with a burden of 2,500 tons of coal was wrecked off Point Fermin, Cal., yesterday.

Latent reports locate Stanley as established with Emin Bay, in the Bahrel Ghazrt region, and advancing on Khartoum.

Cheering news of frosts in Mississippi lightens the hearts of many. The frost is sure to stamp out the yellow scourge at once.

The house yesterday passed without debate the bill forfeiting certain lands granted to the Northern Pacific; also the bill to donate arms and equipments to the use of the militia for Oregon was passed.
