

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

The Scott Bill - Morton Accepts - Dispatches, Etc.

Many People Coming.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—It is stated that the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad has sold \$100,000 worth of passage tickets for the Pacific coast during the coming winter.

The New Steamer.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The steamship Yaquina Bay, formerly known as the Caracas, cleared yesterday for Baltimore, where she will coal preparatory to sailing for San Francisco, where she will enter the service of the Oregon Development Co., and run between Yaquina and San Francisco.

The Law Enforced.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—Collector Hager has received orders from Assistant Secretary Hager to enforce the Scott anti-Chinese bill. Surveyor Tinnin will be notified tomorrow to land no more Chinese. The steamer Belgie is due tomorrow with several hundred Chinese, and the custom house authorities report that 30,770 return certificates are still outstanding.

Hurrying Them Up.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Representative Hermann yesterday introduced a resolution in the house, requesting the president to inform the house what occasion, if any, exists for the delay in the establishment of the new public land office in Oregon and the appointment of the necessary officers thereof. The bill creating this new land district became a law in June, since which time the president has absolutely ignored the act, has made no appointment, and taken no steps to put into force the will of congress.

The Signed Bill.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. It is not probable that any action will be taken by the senate toward an enactment of the law to allow the Chinese, who had embarked on their return to the United States duly provided with certificates before the passage of the bill signed yesterday, to land upon their arrival in this country. Among the Pacific coast senators and representatives the feeling is very general that the Chinese now in transit, cannot be permitted to land upon their arrival, and that they must be returned to the port of their embarkation. The law is mandatory they affirm and cannot be evaded.

The Whitechapel Murders.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—Two more unfortunate women have been added to the list of Whitechapel victims. Thousands and thousands of terrified people are hovering about the dead-houses where the victims lie stretched on slabs dripping with blood. In the west end and fashionable part of the city remote from the scene of the murders, the stentorian shouts of news venders with special editions of papers call people to their doors and they go back to their firesides to read a story which makes their blood run chill with horror. Everybody is wondering where the terrible chapter of crime known as the Whitechapel murders, is going to end.

Notaries Must Be Men.

The application of a Washington territory woman to be appointed a notary public brought up the question in the mind of Gov. Semple as to whether a woman had any right to hold the office of notary public in that territory. The question was referred to attorney-general Metcalf, who decided they had no such right. The decision states that inasmuch as the word "citizen," when used in the organic act, is construed by the supreme court to refer only to males, women are, therefore, not only incapable of filling it, but also of holding any office, whether appointive or elective. The office of notary is a territorial office, and women are, therefore, incapable of filling it. This decision affects several women in the territory who have already been appointed as notaries public by previous governors. -Astorian.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The Mahdi is reported dead at Khartoum.

Michigan had a heavy snow all day yesterday.

At Chicago yesterday the Trades' Bank went under for \$900,000.

A patent has been issued to Erik Paulson, of Astoria, on an explosive shell.

Eleven of the Mormon children detained at New York have been sent on to Utah.

Los Angeles had a \$20,000 fire yesterday. The store of Harper & Reynolds was destroyed.

Thurman sees no necessity of writing a letter of acceptance and will not prepare any.

The Walla Walla fair is progressing finely. The attendance is very large and exhibits fine.

At Minneapolis flour has advanced \$2 in two months and it is predicted that it will reach \$10 per barrel.

Terrible storms of rain and wind have been sweeping over the great lakes for several days. Great losses are reported.

The house yesterday passed the senate bill permitting settlers who have abandoned their homesteads to make other entries.

In the house there is now not a quorum of any committee, and what business now comes before them is lost for the session.

Two immense sugar refineries in New York were closed up yesterday. The trust did it, and 1000 men are thrown out of employment.

Levi P. Morton yesterday published a ringing letter of acceptance, in which he declares squarely for protection and the platform.

The state department has been informed by Minister Buck that the treaty between Peru and this country has been ratified by the former.

Attorney General Garland's health is said to be much improved since his attack of sickness in the summer. He expected to resume his duties at the department of justice to-day.

Senator Beck's Condition.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Senator Beck is reported as improving, but not yet well enough to resume active senatorial duties.

More Hopeful South.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 2.—For the twenty-four hours not one death from yellow fever has been reported. This is the first instance of a like record in many weeks. The number of new cases to-day was ninety-eight, of which thirty-two were white and sixty-six colored.

Still in Danger.

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 2.—The vigilance committee held a consultation last night, for the first time in a good many years, and Bryson, the wife murderer, can thank them for saving his life, temporarily. The membership of the committee is not the same as it was in the old days of the road agents.

Terry Wants a Pardon.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—An effort is being made to secure the release of David S. Terry, now confined in jail at Oakland, for imprisonment for contempt of court, on pardon by the president. The thirty day sentence of Mrs. Terry, for contempt of court, expired to-day, and she was informed that she was at liberty to leave the jail whenever she pleased. She is quite ill, however, and in accordance with the orders of her physician remained in her bed at jail.

The prohibition tent is a novel and picturesque feature in the canvases in the rural districts of New York and the eastern states. The tent meetings approach more nearly to the log-cabin agitation of forty ears ago than any campaign expedient of our day. The dwellers in these tents during the cold water encampments exhibit abundant enthusiasm, which indicates that the strength of their protest at the polls will not decrease this year.
