The Roslyn miners have been successful and the proposed reduction of thirty-three per cent, has been abandoned by the company.

The examination of the land of the W. V. & C. M. W. R. Co. will be completed about the 10th of November, when all the properties of that company, or its assignee, D. Calm, will be placed on the market for sale or lease.

Oregon is coming to the front this year with a fair beginning of dried fruits. Canning has not yet reached any proportion to speak of, though what canners are at work must be doing well and making money at the low price of fruit.

Hullman & Co. have purchased a tract at Portland between the Narrow Gauge railroad track and the river, comprising about two and one-half acres. The price paid was \$8800.

The big rock cut on the O. & W. T. railroad, one and a quarter miles long, will be completed to-day. The completion of the Touchet bridge will take a week longer.

Albany is unmistakably developing into the railroad center of the northwest. The building of the Astoria & Coast railroad is a settled fact.

It is reported that another valuable strike has been made in the Capital mine, in the Santiam. The shaft has been sunk in the tunnel alongside the main lead. The tunnel has now reached a depth of 22 feet.
